The scientifically accurate facts and suggestions for protection are stated in simple language for clarity.

Select an area in your home which will be a shelter for the family. Supply it with a first aid kit containing ointments and bandages. Lay that there are two general im-

mediate effects; the generation of heat, and blast or pressure. Heat causes fire, and both the heat of the bomb and the possible resulting from it cause burns. The factor, and causes buildings, trees and other objects to fall or blow over. The damage caused by bomb blast directly, or from its effects in suddenly causing buildings to collapse is purely mechanical when translated into terms of human injury. The effects are similar to jury. The effects are similar to those seen in any automobile accident. News releases in World War II made us accustomed to saturation bombing, where in the course of one-half to three or four hours a whole section or area of a city was reduced to ruins. This was accomplished by a series of localized explosions as the result of pattern bombing of the area.

In the main, an atomic bomb accomplishes the same effects with three differences. First, there is one center of explosion instead of

several. Second, the effect is in-stantaneous instead of requiring several hours to accomplish. Third-ly, radiation is released during the period of explosion. It should be understood that approximately 85 per cent of the casualties which result are like those of conventions. esult are like those of conventional combing, or are burns or mechanidue to this new factor of radia-tion. he new factor of radiation is somewhat complex, and its very complexity has led to unreasoning fear. The effects of blast can be immediately seen, and burns can be felt. Radiation is not detectable must be understood through com-mon sense. Three forms of radia-tion are released by the atomic explosion. Two of these are very tiny particles traveling at high speeds, called alpha and beta par-ticles. The third form is the gam-ma ray, which is a form of energy ticles. The third form is the gamma ray, which is a form of energy or force, and may be compared to a beam of sunlight. The common effect of all of these particles is to damage human cells to such an extent that they may die. Alpha particles can be stopped by paper, clothing or skin. Beta particles require a metal shield. Gamma rays are the most penetrating, require a foot of concrete to stop them. Or in general plain everyday terms, six feet of common earth will stop all forms of radiation. Radiation is not an unknown hazard. X-ray is a common form known to most people. Radiation illness has been studied by medical science for many years. Briefly stated direct radiation occurs when an atom bomb explodes, and

stated direct radiation occurs when an atom bomb explodes, and lasts only as long as the explosion. This is the greatest part of the radiation produced. Secondary radiation occurs after the bomb burst and is due to particles of mist and dust falling out of the sky from the bomb burst or to radiation coming from structures exposed to the direct radiation effect of the bomb. The latter is called secondary radiation. Of practical importance is the fact that the main danger from radiation is at the time of explosion.

Military authorities expect that any use of the bomb will be in the form of an air burst.
