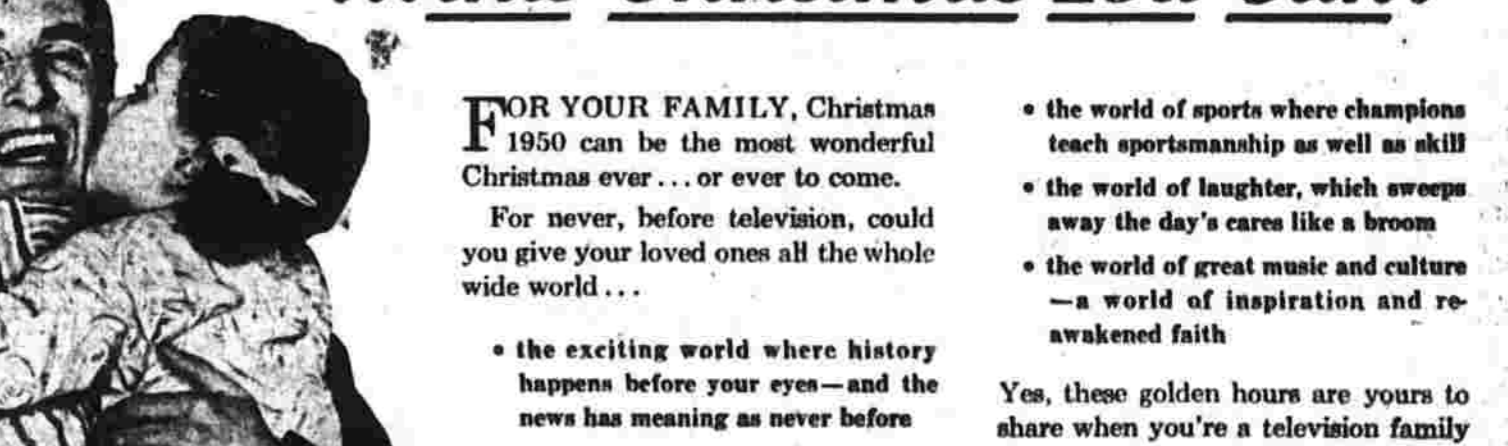

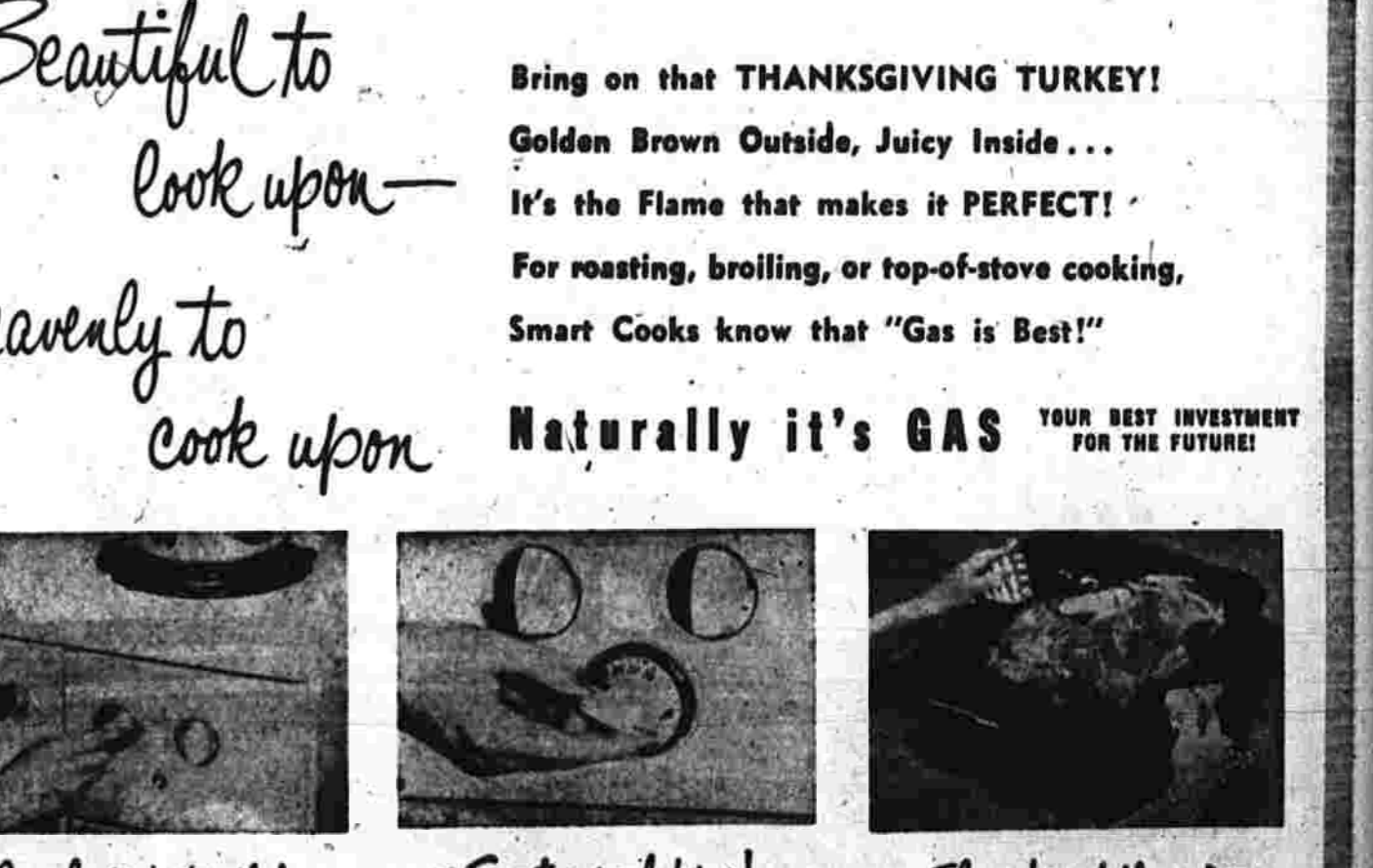

### Education Seen Basis In Maintaining Peace

#### Dr. Frank C. Laubach, World Missionary, Is Speaker on His Work Before Rotary Club

A telegram he had sent to President Truman in which it was suggested that he make a Christmas present to the people of Korea in the form of food and warm clothes which they so much need. It was suggested that America act now to express to Korea and the people of the Far East our good intentions by this expression of good will and not to wait until after the war is over before we begin. In the telegram was suggested that the American railroads and shipping companies cooperate in this rehabilitation endeavor in Korea.

Dr. Laubach was brought here by the Manchester Council of Churches where he and Mrs. Laubach will speak a number of times during the day and evening. Dr. Laubach will speak at a women's meeting at Center church at 3 o'clock today and to a Youth Rally at 7 p.m. at South Methodist church tonight. Dr. Laubach will be the speaker at a giant Missionary Rally at South Methodist church at 8 p.m. tonight. Meetings are open to the public.

Guests of the Rotary Club last evening were Fred Belton, Stanley Drenzel, and William Pop of the Manchester Council of Churches; Dr. Laubach will be the speaker at a Women's League in North Africa, the Near East and in Indonesia early next year. With three-fifths of his life's race unable to read and write, Dr. Laubach pointed out the necessity of raising the literacy level of the world. He said that if we would win the peace, "The Communists appreciate the good to be received in teaching people to read the lies they want them to believe. There are making vast inroads in those countries where a program of education such as we need. We can spend \$50 billion for guns and tanks and we have it will prevent this situation. That is only part of the picture, however. We must convince the people of the world that our way of life and not the Communists is the one they should follow," stated the speaker.

"The people of the world are anxious to learn to read and when they are given the opportunity they will do so. In some of the countries where we have worked the people have almost stamped us in their efforts to learn to read." Dr. Laubach spoke in detail of the educational work he had done by him and which has proved so successful. It involves translation of the various languages into a simple phonetic alphabet which is turned to the people. The teacher usually concentrates on one learner or pupil who as he progresses in his learning is given the task of teaching others. This method many of these people are taught to read in as short a time as one week. Thus far the plan has been worked out for use in 200 different languages.

"The second thing needed to save the peace is to send top flight men and women who are specialists in farming, education, science, engineering in large numbers to show the peoples of the world how they can help themselves. These specialists must be selected with care as to their moral integrity and high moral resolve to do something about the mess the world is in today. They must be supported by towns and cities, clubs, schools, churches and philanthropic agencies. "In a day when people are turning communistic because they are hungry and cold and sick we must let them know that we will help them and can help them," stated Dr. Laubach.

Furnished by state Health Dept. When we are sick and our doctor advises it, we go to the hospital. If we are severely injured in an accident, we go to the hospital. Our community hospital is a haven for us and our families at such times. In recent years, however, many of us have had the experience of illness requiring hospitalization when no beds were available. Why does this happen?

Years ago, people went to the hospital only when everything else had failed them. Friends practically started to sing the funeral dirge when the "ditties" went to the hospital to die.

But times have changed. Medical science has made vast strides—diseases considered hopeless only a few years ago are now curable—surgery is performed with a minimum of discomfort and a maximum of safety and women face childbirth without terror.

Last conditions have changed, too. Today we live in apartments and smaller houses. We don't have domestic help as we did. Our neighbors and our relatives go to work every day and nurses are scarce so there is no one to care for us when we are ill.

Many people anticipating the need for hospital care, have wisely invested in prepayment plans. This lessens the economic problems of illness and joins forces with the changes outlined above to increase the popularity of hospitals when we are sick or injured.

### Not Enough Beds

But the increase in the number of hospital beds has not kept pace with this increased demand for hospital services. That is why we cannot always get a bed when we need it. Recognizing the shortage and the difficulties involved in raising money to build new hospitals and additions to existing hospitals, the U. S. Congress passed a law—the Hospital Survey and Construction Act—providing funds to assist in the building of hospitals. Connecticut is now in its fourth year of participating in such funds. With the help of these federal grants two public health centers and between 300 and 400 additional general hospital beds are under construction. The state, however, is still short over 2,000 beds necessary to meet the needs of the various communities.

Program Curtailed  
In order to reduce the cost of operating the federal government,

it has been found necessary this year to cut the appropriation for a 9 1/2 p.m. to 11 p.m. construction fund. This will curtail the building program in Connecticut as in other states. It is sincerely hoped, however, that it may continue even if at a slower pace, until there are enough hospital beds in Connecticut so we can all be admitted for diagnosis or treatment when the need arises.

### What We Can Do

To carry on effectively with the reduction in funds we shall have to plan very carefully. A re-study will be made to determine the places where the need is greatest. It is up to each community to raise enough money to match the federal funds because no grant may be made under the law unless there is assurance that the new hospital can be completed and properly equipped according to standards for good service to patients.

At the recent annual meeting of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers, it was resolved that the Congress be asked to reallocate the full appropriation for this year and to appropriate similar amounts for the next two years so advance planning will be possible. If this cannot be done, we must build as much as we can with the funds available and all work together to plan the best possible use of the beds we now have.

### Extra Service On Railroad

"New Haven" to Run 49 Additional Holiday Rush Trains

New Haven, Nov. 22. The New Haven Railroad will operate 49 extra trains over the Thanksgiving holiday weekend to carry New Englanders to and from traditional family gatherings. The road also will be prepared to add extra cars to regular trains as the need arises, officials said today.

Seventeen extra trains will be run on Wednesday, including second sections of the Yankee Clipper, the Senator and Merchants Limited in both directions. The Connecticut Yankee, the Gilt Edge, the Puritan and the State of Maine will have two sections leaving Grand Central Terminal. There will be two extra trains on Thanksgiving Day itself.

The busiest day for the railroad will be the Sunday following Thanksgiving, when the New Haven will operate thirty extra trains to get the holiday workers back home in time for their return to normal activities Monday morning.

With the Merchants Limited and Yankee Clipper each running in two sections on Wednesday, the usual radio-telephone service of those trains will be available only on the parlor car sections.

In several instances where trains are being run in two sections, the diner or still car service will be available on only one of the sections, but the railroad is arranging to have train salesmen board the cars of the other section to sell sandwiches, coffee and other items. Dining service will not be included on Thanksgiving Day on several trains, but then thereof train salesmen will
