They are rather proud of the fact that the first city to be Abombed was theirs. They want to make their city a center for real peace effort. Canadians are helping them rebuild the Hiroshima parish church, which will be renamed "The Church of the Resurrection," a significant name for a church in a significant name for a church in that devastated community.
