French Urge MacArthur Be Replaced as Europe Fears Outbreak of World War III. London, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Criticism of Gen. MacArthur came from several sections of Western Europe today in the wake of United Nations speeches in Korea.

There was talk in official circles at Paris of making an "informal suggestion" that MacArthur be replaced. French criticism centers around what is described in Paris as MacArthur's "tendencies to military and political affairs."

In Britain's House of Commons, Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin said there had been "some mismanagement" about MacArthur's actions. He added: "The objectives of Gen. MacArthur are no more and no less than the objectives of the United Nations."

"I cannot for obvious reasons—would not in the public interest—disclose in detail the directions issued from time to time to Gen. MacArthur's command. It has been necessary to leave control of operations very much in the hands of the United Nations commander, provided always that where his plans might involve questions of general policy there must be proper consultation on such matters."

State Is Set to Ask \$10,000,000 Loan. Bowles Authorizes Adorno to Borrow Sum To Enable Payment Of Current Expenses. Hartford, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The State Government, whose financial condition was the subject of considerable argument during the stop-gap session of the Federal Rent Control law on an agreement to borrow \$10,000,000 from the Federal Reserve Bank.

Adorno, a Republican who has been in the State Treasury since August, made up his mind to make up the deficit in the general fund and to pay its current bills. He said he would ask the Federal Reserve Bank to loan the money.

Mayor Clears His Position

Was Not Alone in Seeking Legal Opinion in Town Council Case

Mayor Harold Turkington today stated that since there appears to have been some misconception of the view regarding the current discussion over the appointment of a town council, he would like to clarify and explain his position. Turkington said that to begin with, he is not the only person on the Board of Directors who after consideration, sought a legal opinion as to the validity of the action of the Board of Directors in naming John D. LaBelle town council. In seeking a legal opinion on the matter, the mayor said today, he was joined by Directors Lavin, Bailey and Pirato.

The mayor said that the legal opinion obtained does not imply that the general manager, having the power to select a candidate for town council, has the right to dictate this choice to the directors for their confirmation.

Mayor States His Opinion As he understands it Mayor Turkington said, the general manager's recommendation may be rejected by the Board, and any subsequent recommendations may be rejected until the candidate is named who is mutually acceptable to both the general manager and the Board. The mayor does not think that the Board has the right to name a town council not first recommended by the general manager.

That is the burden of the legal opinion the four directors obtained from the Hartford law firm of Shipman and Goodwin, he said. Special General Manager Wadwell, whose position is non-political, will recommend a candidate for the position. The immediate question would be activated, said, but the mayor still feels that if there is question on the interpretation of the charter provision, it should be legally settled to avoid future controversy.

proceedings for a judicial determination. I feel that such a procedure would be unfortunate for the orderly conduct of the Town's business.

Therefore, for what I consider to be the best interests of the Town, I hereby resign as Town Counsel, to take effect immediately.

"I realize that this resignation will in no way assist in a final determination of the proper interpretation of the Charter, and I feel very strongly that to avoid the problem in future appointments, the question should be resolved.

"I would like to express my sincere personal appreciation to the four Republican members of the Board who supported the recommendation of the General Manager in voting for my reappointment."

Question Unsettled

The resignation of Attorney LaBelle may still not entirely clear the way for the unquestioned tenure of Attorney LaBelle as town counsel.

If it legally is left to the General Manager to recommend and enforce his choice as town counsel, and should he refuse to recommend Attorney LaBelle, the House resignation would have only the effect of removing him from the picture but would not solve the asserted problem of illegal procedure.

But meanwhile, another overlooked side to the proposition exists.

Concerned that it might have tripped up in correct procedure in the appointment of Attorney John

APL Union Wins

Bridgeport, Nov. 28—The Bridgeport Brass Company's 3,000 employees voted yesterday to retain the Federal Brass Workers Union (APL) as their collective bargaining agent. John Ward, company industrial relations director, said the union received 1,657 votes to 618 for the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.).

At its organization meeting early this month, the Directors adopted Robert's rules of procedure as governing conduct of Board meetings. However, the Directors did not discard previous special rules that have been in practice for a long time.

Washington, Nov. 29.—The House Ways and Means Committee today agreed on a compromise excess profits tax bill estimated to yield \$3,000,000,000 a year. It would be retroactive to last July 1.

As drafted, the bill's estimated revenue falls short of President Truman's goal of \$4,000,000,000 annually. This results from easing of the tax rate originally proposed by the Administration.

Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) told reporters the measure, designed to lighten off what Mr. Truman called "abnormal" business earnings, will be introduced in the House tomorrow.

Defense Line Short Of Yalu; Peace Talks, British Plea to U. N.

London, Nov. 29.—A worried U.N. enforcement action. This assurance apparently was provided. "Wait and see" was the attitude of U. S. Ambassador Ernest Bevin who told the House of Commons that he still hopes to "stabilize" the military situation in Korea and to talk peace with the Chinese Communist.

Beyond meeting the military needs of the moment, the British are counselling their western friends right now to wait and see. One possibility mentioned is that the Chinese aim not only at splitting and entering the U.N. forces, but also at linking up with the North Korean guerrillas far to the south.
