Despite of some holidays when factories were down, the weather and the business upsurge probably will show a November consumption of 40,000,000 or better.  
One industry source figures that the total to be used by the year's end will be around 470,000,000 tons. On a 500,000,000-ton production basis, this would leave a stockpile of 24,000,000 tons.  
There were a few weeks this year when output got up to 12,000,000 tons but they represented peaks. In some previous years 12,000,000 tons weekly was the rule rather than the exception. One industry spokesman said it could be done again very quickly if freight car shortages weren't troubling various areas.  
**Europe Wants More**  
Aside from the demand created by industrial speed-up, Europe has started asking for more coal. The National Coal Association in London is sending coal here, and this is business that we have not heretofore enjoyed. There are several other countries making inquiries about coal and some are in the market at this time.  
"Our government defense program will see reflecting 'it self' in a greater use of coal."
