Icy Sidewalks Cause Hazards

Clear Weather Aids in Sanding; Traveling Conditions Still Bad

Icy streets and sidewalks today still present extreme hazards to those driving or walking as the same type of ground conditions prevailed as on Friday. However, unlike yesterday when continuing freezing rain made the travel conditions more and more difficult, clear weather today gave road men a chance to sand and clear the streets. Sun and higher temperatures also helped.

Today some of the toll of yesterday's blizzard was reported. There were many traffic slips and slides, but no major accidents, since cars had their headlights on and drivers were more alert. In one case, a car hit and fractured the wrist of a young girl, requiring treatment at the hospital. There, this morning, it was said that he was the only hurt that required hospital care. People who received no broken bones today, for these were many who lost their balance.

Yesterday the traveling conditions were generally worse in the country areas than in the city. This morning it seemed that Manchester was more "frozen up" than the outlying sections, with heavy ice loads tending down under the weight. The ice caused some power interruptions. At the spinning mills in Taftville, operations were halted yesterday afternoon when a tree limb fell across power lines. Elsewhere service was temporarily affected in a few places. No major line breaks were reported here.

On Main street the traffic lights remained at the "caution" stage in order to avoid the need of stopping and starting which, with lead coats, is more likely than the threat of intersection collision.

While the layer of ice hampered traffic more than snow usually does, the freezing rain instead of snow spars the tops of the roofs of removal that occurs after a snowstorm. Continued cold weather to couple with the highway danger made many cars unusable, and wreckers and towing machines were having a busy day.

The road conditions, improving toward noon, did not seem to greatly check the week-end traffic, which was swelled for the holiday and at the center a continuous stream of cars passed in all directions.

The explanation offered by Postmaster Olin Grant for the lateness of Christmas mail delivery doesn't satisfy the large number of persons who called The Herald to complain. They pointed out that mail delivered on December 20 was not delivered until December 23. It doesn't seem reasonable to blame the embargo on mail shipments, due to the threatened railway strike, for delivery right within the town itself. It also doesn't sound reasonable to blame late mailing for the delay since in previous years mail was all cleaned up in the lobby post office before the holiday.

It does seem unreasonable that the lobby at the office was not kept open at night so that mail could be dropped through the mail slots. Many street mail boxes were so jammed it was impossible to get mail into them. Why not keep the lobby open for those who could not use street mail boxes? That shouldn't have entailed any extra expense. This column has heard frequently, not only at Christmas time, but through the year, that there seems to be dissension at the post office between employees and the postmaster. We don't know whether or not that is true since one hears reports of such differences in almost all government offices. However, we have heard it quite often, and many complainants cited this as a possible reason for the slowness of delivery of Christmas mail.

Reports from all over the country indicate that mail this season was the heaviest on record so that may be why out of town mail was late. However, that still

doesn't explain the lateness in delivery to local addresses of mail deposited right here in town. One of the bad features of the delay was the fact that in many cases important business mail was held up. Wonder if President Harry wrote any of his choice personal letters during the Christmas season. If he did we bet they were delivered on time.

There hasn't been any real big Christmas decoration in town this season. Many people have strung lights on trees in the front yard or on porches. For this reason there probably won't be any arguments as to who had the biggest display.

Over 21 million Christmas trees are harvested in this country each year. There seems to be some dispute over who has the largest tree in the country. Pathfinder magazine this week says Seattle, Washington claims to have the largest tree—a 212-foot evergreen trimmed with 3,000 lights. But, Wilmington, N. C. countered with the claim that it has the world's largest "living" tree—a 300-year-old live oak decorated with 5,000 lights.
