By The Associated Press Twenty-two persons met violent deaths in New England over the three-day holiday week end. The toll was 23 in the corres-

ponding period a year ago.

Twelve of the 22 were killed in highway accidents. The others died in miscellaneous accidents. Massachusetts and New Hampshire topped the list with five each. Maine and Connecticut each had four. Two met accidental death in Vermont and two in Rhode Island.

The dead in Connecticut: Margaret Ann Bothur, 7, of East Hartford, and David Coe, 12 of Naugatuck, killed in coasting ac-cidents; Mrs. Mildred Simmons Zinovies, 63, of East Fairfax, Va. highway accident; and Samuel Hampton, 83, of New Haven, killed in a fire.
