**In 1951 Or Not At All**  
 It is with some skepticism that we have been reading a considerable flood of so-called expert opinion which holds that Russia will not launch war in 1951.

Let us look directly at this prediction in 1951. What does this prediction involve?

First, it involves an assumption that the Russians are determined to launch war in 1951. What does this prediction involve?

Second, it argues that 1951 is not the strategic time for Russia to do it. It argues that Russia, in 1951, will content itself with indirect aggressions and alarms, like that in Korea, but not make any major move, as in Europe, for instance.

It seems to us that the two assumptions do not join well together. It seems to us that it is something exactly the contrary which is the truth—that if Russia is determined upon war, Russia will make war in 1951.

All one has to do is look at American production plans in order to know that Russia cannot gain any military position which will be better than it is right now, in 1951.

If the Russians are determined upon war, and they do not fight in 1951, they are the most foolish warmakers in all history.

We will go further than that. This year, 1951, is not, by any means, the most favorable year which has been open to them.

If the Russians are determined upon war, they should have marched in 1950, or in 1949, or in 1948. In any one of those years they were far better off, militarily, than they are in 1951.

We are quite aware, in such statements, that we seem to be ignoring the importance of the atomic bomb, which is given credit by some for being the one thing which has held the Russian back. We do not consider the atomic bomb a decisive weapon against a country like Russia. We believe that in the event of war with Russia, the main military targets for the atom bomb would be Berlin, Prague, the Ruhr, Paris, Rome.

We think those who assume that Russia is determined upon war really have an impossible task of trying to explain why, if that is so, we are not already at war.

What, then, is our theory of Russian policy?

In the first place, we hold that Russia has never had any positive intention of creating full war with the West.

In the second place, we hold that Russia has been, and is, intent upon picking up whatever expansion of power and influence it can short of full war.

In the third place, we hold that Russia has been dismayed by the success of the free world in erecting barriers against the extension of Soviet spheres of influence and domination. **Rockville Dial Phones For Rockville**  
 Starting to Install in Homes and Business Places This Week

Rockville, Jan. 12.—(Special)—The telephone company this week began installing dial telephones in homes and businesses throughout Rockville in preparation for the conversion of the exchange to dial operation next April.

Company installers will visit all those subscribers who do not already have dial sets, remove their present telephones and install dial telephones.
