Deny Firemen Shorter Week
Commissioners Say Time Is Inopportune

Full-time firemen in the South Manchester Fire district were unsuccessful in an attempt to gain a shorter work week. The firemen petitioned the Board of Fire Commissioners last October and on January 11 received a reply denying the petition.

A 56 hour week was asked. At present the men are working 60 hours and most are working longer. Other communities have made similar requests, some being granted and others denied.

The Board of Fire Commissioners answered the request by mail as follows:

"We have discussed at some length your suggestion regarding a 56 hour week and have concluded that it would not be in the best interest of all concerned to make this change just at present.

"It seems to be a difficult thing to schedule properly and we are unable to justify the disadvantages by the single advantage you would gain.

"Just at present the general talk of most of the economists of the country is to the effect that if we are interested in retaining our unrivaled American liberties, it will be necessary for all to work more hours rather than less hours per week.

"We regret being unable to grant your request at the present. Yours truly,

Migration Adds To N. E. Population

New England and the three Middle Atlantic States of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania registered a population increase of 3,201,000 between 1940 and 1950, of which 3,175,000 represented natural increase—excess of births over deaths—and 226,000 represented immigration, according to an announcement by Dr. Roy V. Peel, Director of the Census.

In New England alone, the net increase during the decade was 877,000 and the natural increase of 862,000. The three states in New England which had net gains through migration were Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. In New Hampshire the net increase and the natural increase were approximately identical, and in Vermont natural increase exceeded the net increase by about 60,000, and in Maine by about 26,000.

New York State's natural increase of 1,073,000 was approximately 278,000 less than its net increase, indicating immigration of that amount. New Jersey's net increase of 673,000 consisted of a natural increase of 375,000 and a net migration of 298,000. Pennsylvania's net increase of 588,000 was 847,000 less than its natural increase of 1,435,000, indicating an out-migration of that number.

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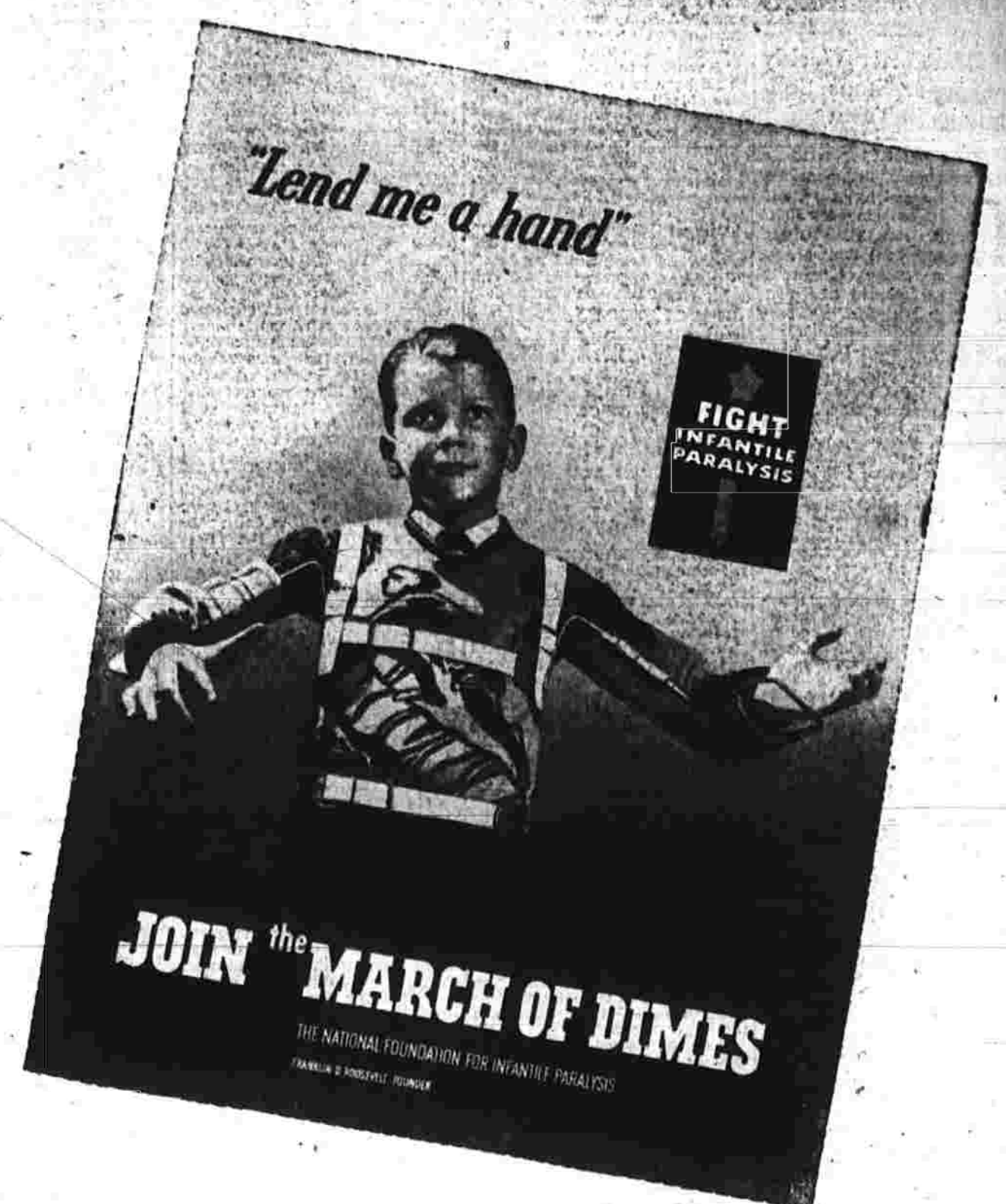

though they may not stop the legislation.

"They still resent the fact that it is sold and packaged like butter and made to look like butter," he said.

"Although the butter production of New England is negligible, Calhoun said they feel a stake in any proposal that would force down the competitive price of that commodity.

"The price Connecticut farmers get for Class Two milk is based on the Chicago price of butter," he said.

Meanwhile, getting the "Farm Blue" line before the legislature, oleo bill appeared a matter facing Governor Lodge and top G. O. P. leadership.

Democrats, however, have no such problem as virtually all their strength comes from cities and the larger towns.

Once a color bill is introduced by the Republican-dominated 277-member House, passage of the 26-member Democratic-controlled Senate is assured.

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Canada's View
 The first western diplomat who seems to have read the Chinese note before he formed an opinion of it is Lester B. Pearson, Minister in External Affairs for our neighbor, Canada.

His conclusion is that, although there are phases of the Chinese note which seem distinctly unacceptable from the United Nations point of view, there should be no haste toward calling negotiations at an end.

At his news conference in Ottawa yesterday, he reaffirmed many times that there could be no beginning of real negotiations unless the Chinese Communists agreed to a halt in the fighting in Korea, "but," according to the New York Times, "he conceded that he had found the note a much more complicated document than it appeared at first reading and that in some ways it was very ambiguous."

"It seemed to him, he said, that 'helping intended to reply to be interpreted as an acceptance of the United Nations communication as a basis of discussion. However, it had attached conditions that were in some respects not clear and in others plainly unacceptable, he added.

"For instance, it was not clear to his mind, he said, just at what point in the negotiations the Chinese Communist Government considered it should be admitted to what it called 'the great game' in the United Nations. For himself, he could not accept or consider that such action could be taken while Chinese Communist troops were fighting United Nations troops in Korea."

Foreign Minister Pearson's point of view, obviously, is a considerable variance from the position of Secretary of State Acheson, who would seem to have rejected the Chinese note totally on the basis of the first radio reports of its content, which described it merely as a flat rejection of the United Nations position.

Secretary Acheson's quick rejection of the note—his announcement of mounting criticism in the United Nations proposal in the first place, but, from its international aspects, must be considered something of a blunder. From it, some of the other members of the United Nations judge that we are still afraid to try for negotiation and peace. By it, the chance that they might agree with our position voluntarily has been postponed once again.

There appeared, at Lake Success yesterday, an improvised effort to undo some of the damage done by Mr. Acheson's precipitous ignoring of the complex contents of the Chinese note. This was the sudden attachment to the United States proposal for condemnation of Communist China of a fifth point, reaffirming the United Nations desire for a peaceful settlement and asking that a United Nations group be designated to be the channel for further diplomatic action toward peace. This point was obviously intended to repair somewhat, by creation of a new loophole in the Acheson declaration that there was now no opening in that direction. In other words, we have acted first and thought afterwards. It would have been better for our own position of world leadership, and better for whatever slight chance of peace there may be, if we had reversed the process.

Outlines Need For Engineers

Hartford, Jan. 19—Defense preparations are again dramatizing the need for competent personnel with engineering training.

Dean Harold G.D. Hunter, dean of men and chairman of the division of engineering, told colleagues at Hillier College yesterday.

Reporting on a combined study of statistical data and an informal survey of local industry, Dean Hunter said:

"For a period of over a year extending through last summer, the Bureau of Labor Statistics had been warning that the supply of available engineers in this country was becoming too great for the demand. In order to relieve this 'so-called' large surplus of engineers, the Bureau disseminated information designed to discourage prospective college students from electing engineering courses."

He recommended Liberal Arts education and preparation for other professions.

Dean Hunter explained that several leading universities made independent studies of the facts involved and questioned the conclusions of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. They felt that if the Bureau's line of reasoning were followed then the country stood in danger of suffering a certain shortage of trained engineers.

The universities brought their findings to Washington. The Bureau reviewed the entire problem and accepted the conclusion of the educators. It is now...
