Zone Changes Up Tonight

Hearings Scheduled to Be Held Before the Town Planning Board Five proposed zoning changes and one building line change will be up for discussion when the Town Planning Commission holds a public hearing in the Municipal building tonight at 8 o'clock. An area on the northeastern side of Green road, near its intersection with Spruce street, is proposed for change to Business Zone I from Residence Zone B. It is proposed for a distance of 45 feet. A zoning change to Business Zone II from Residence Zone B is proposed for an area on the northern side of the eastern side of Main street from the north side of Hollister street to the south side of Washington street to a depth of 125 feet.

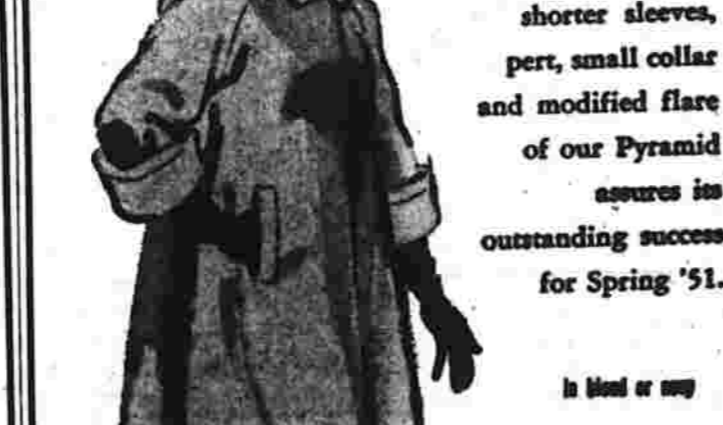
