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20,000th Worker Hired By Pratt & Whitney Co.

Pratt & Whitney Aircraft has hired its 20,000th worker, William F. Green, general manager, at its new plant at 350 Broad street, Windsor, Conn. where her husband and teaches at the town's high school. Mrs. Murphy is an experienced stenographer.

Handicraft workers are skilled at the operation of a typewriter and business machine. She will take her place alongside the hundreds of women office workers at P&WA who handle the production of aircraft engines.

"The hiring of the 20,000th worker marks a significant milestone in our expansion program," said T. R. Down, personnel manager. "However, there still exist at P&WA a great need for technical people such as designers, draftsmen and process planners. In the production and experimental departments we still need tool and die makers, machinists, boring and milling machine operators, tool inspectors, gaugers, principally people with previous experience in precision mechanics."

"There is also a need for persons with lesser skills and experience. Opening of a new Pratt & Whitney Aircraft training school in Hartford next month will enable us to train these people for aircraft production jobs."

The shortage of skilled and semi-skilled workers remains the biggest problem now facing Pratt & Whitney Aircraft as it strives to meet accelerated engine production schedules for the military services. P&WA Turbine-Wing engines are being produced in the Hartford area. The Air Force's P-47 all-weather interceptor, the P-51 Mustang fighter plane and the P-59 Mustang are being produced in the Hartford area.

The 19,999th addition to the P&WA employment rolls was Dora A. Rank, a twenty-six year old engineer, from Des Moines, Iowa. A fighter pilot in World War II, Rank took an Aeronautical Engineering degree at the University of Kansas. He comes to P&WA installation engineering group after holding a project engineer's post at the Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Maryland.

Miss Mary Geigner of 52 South Haven street, a freshman at Hartford College, attended a United Nations Conference entitled "The U. N. in Action," this week at Connecticut College for Women in New London. This was the fourth conference of this type to be held at Connecticut College. Students, both foreign and American, participated from various colleges in New England. The foreign students represented an countries including Canada, Turkey, Italy, China, Britain, India, Czechoslovakia, and Saudi Arabia.

Four points discussed at the conference were: West, East, North and South America; U. 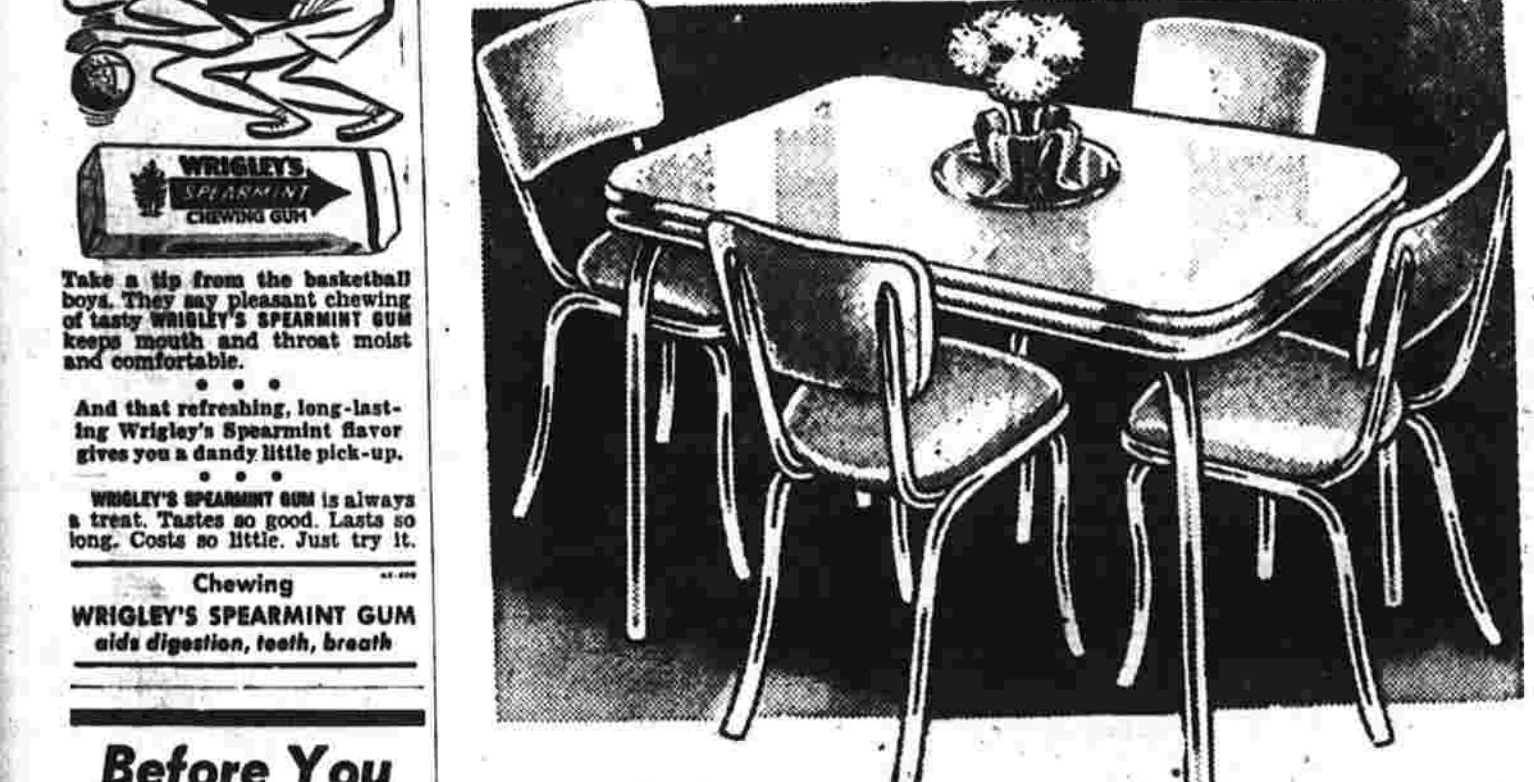

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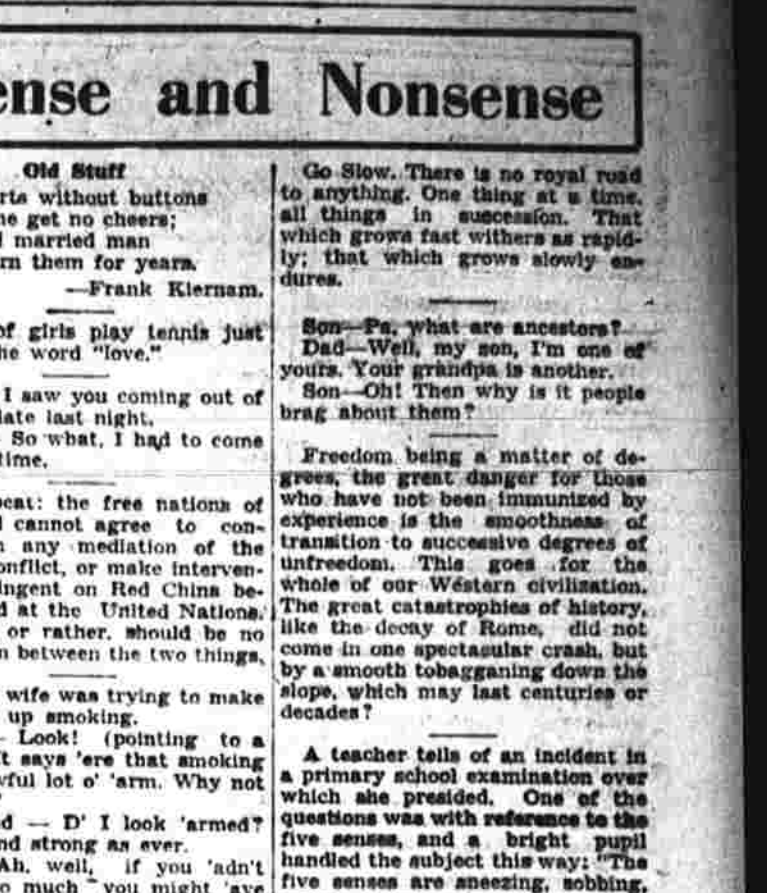

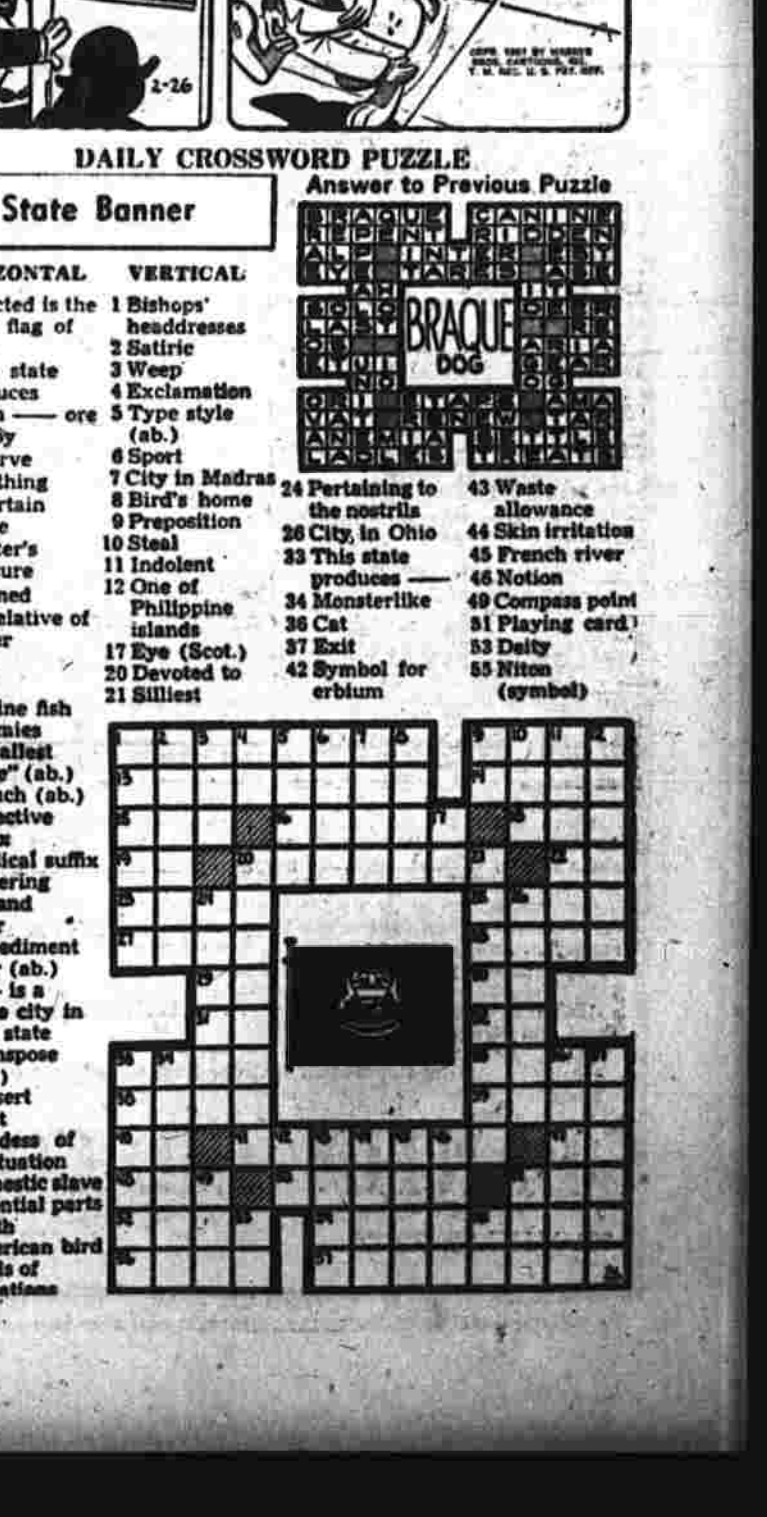
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
