Traffic Safety Record Of Town Exceptional

National Survey Is Released Showing Comparisons With Other Same Size Places

New York, Feb. 27 (Special)—Manchester turned in a better traffic safety record for 1950 than most communities in the country. This is shown in the report of the National Safety Council, based on its annual survey of auto accidents covering 400 cities.

The traffic deaths in Manchester during the year, which resulted in two deaths, represent a rate of 5.9 fatalities per 100,000 population. This rate compares favorably with national returns of 23.2 killed per 100,000, and with the return from the other cities of the size group, 25,000 to 50,000, of 8.2 killed per 100,000 population. For the state of Connecticut as a whole the rate was 12.9 per 100,000.

Safety comparisons were also made by the council on the basis of the number of cars in use in each community. From this standpoint Manchester was also ahead. Its 1950 record was 1.9 traffic deaths per 10,000 registered cars, as against an average of 3.1 for all the cities and of 2.4 in the other cities of its size.

The year's auto accidents, reported in two deaths, represent a rate of 11 per cent increase over the previous year, when the total was 21,500. The increase occurred principally in the rural areas where the deaths were up 15 per cent.

The overall picture, however, is not one of poorer or more reckless driving according to the council, which points out that the increase in fatalities was proportionate to the increase in total mileage traveled by cars.

Manchester's improved traffic safety record may be the result of the recent census, it was said today, which disclosed that the town's population is approximately 34,000. For the period of 1940 to 1950, Manchester was classified in the 23,000 group although its population was much over that figure for most of the 10-year period. Trying to fit "city" traffic regulations on a permanent basis throughout the two years of the census apparently obscured Manchester's good traffic safety record.

Pupil Expense Under Average

Well Below Cost Per Attendee Listed in Other State Towns

Manchester's per pupil cost of schooling last year was considerably lower than the average of other Connecticut towns of comparable size, according to figures compiled by the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council and the Connecticut Education association.

The per pupil cost here in 1949-50 was \$171.36 against \$209.23 for the state average. The figures quote an average daily membership in local schools of 5,499 with a total of 217 teachers.

Of the 18 towns compared, Greenwich had the highest per pupil cost at \$244.44 per capita cost. The lowest was Stratford with \$170.82 per capita. Figures for some of the other towns are: Bristol, \$191.91 and \$222.14; Meriden, \$191.91 and \$222.14; Middletown, \$191.91 and \$222.14; West Hartford, \$191.91 and \$222.14.

Some other towns in the Hartford area, not comparable in size with Manchester, are the following: average daily membership and per pupil costs: Glastonbury, 1,470 and \$206.23; Hartford, 20,066 and \$219.95; Vernon, 12,968 and \$190.00; Bloomfield, 9,000 and \$211.23; Waterbury, 2,066 and \$181.65; and South Windsor, 645 and \$181.23.

Eugene Wilson's Answers
 To the Editor,
 Manchester Evening Herald:
 I am glad to reply to the pertinent questions raised in your splendid editorial of February 17th. In doing so I will take it for granted that we Americans will face up to the vital decision which now confronts us, and abide in the Faith of our Fathers.
 For as we stand today at the spiritual crossroads, two courses are open to us: first, we may continue on down the road to Stettin or, second, we may reaffirm the creative precept of individual freedom under just law. Should we elect the first course then another world war is inevitable. And in this one, even though we gain military victory we must surely lose our souls. On the contrary, should we choose the second course, I believe we may win war, but even so we will still save our souls. Perhaps before answering your questions, which lie in the hearts of so many today, I should offer my own estimate of the current situation.
 As I see it, we are today in the midst of a world revolution, or rather three revolutions. First there is the technological revolution, second the moral revolution and third, the political revolution. The political revolution has already shifted the world's axis to an East-West direction, with one pole in Washington and the other in Moscow. Instead of many separate world powers, capable of checking and balancing each other, through alliances and other means we now have but two hemispheres locked in mortal combat to determine which brand of socialism is prevailing. For, these two spheres are based on utterly conflicting appraisals of moral valuations.
 For example, Bolshevism promises men salvation, not in this world here and now, but in this world here and now, but upon what it calls "justice." In fact it purports to be the only social system which can tell a man with absolute certainty what he is and what he is going to be. This is the Soviet's new instrument of political and military warfare, its fifth column of spiritual subversion.
 Of course, we now recognize that behind this facade lurks the same old Russian slavery linked with the same old Russian imperialism, with the same old aims it has pursued for the past two centuries. We can stop Russian imperialism in Europe, just as earlier imperialism was halted there, by physical force, but in Asia, the problem is different. There the revolution against the white man has been induced by Western ideas, self-determination and social justice. These we cannot successfully oppose with force; we must rather go along with the change and, hopefully, let it work out to our common advantage.
 Fortunately for both these problems, we possess the perfect instrument in the Faith of our Fathers. Unfortunately, however, we have neglected it of late and even fallen victim to the blandishments of varying degrees of socialism. In Europe, men have drifted far on the wave of what they call Fabian Socialism. Italian Fascism and German Nazism were conceived by Russian Communism. Whatever else may be said of these things, they are wholly responsible for the state of "cold" war, "hot" war and

 2. In the next step, we should prove difficult at first, it would, in principle, place air bombardment, our principal weapon, on a sounder moral ground by focusing our efforts on declared primary objectives to an inadvertent.
 B. Convene an international congress of scientists for the purpose of exchanging atomic and other scientific information along lines conducive to promoting the public welfare. It is absurd to suppose that we possess any monopoly on scientific development so that it can be kept secret without retarding the program. Under complete spiritual leadership we can enlist the support of all men of good will and thus safeguard the public interest. The two concrete actions suggested are intended to evidence our own good will and thus gain the support of those disillusioned as to the motives of our enemy.
 Finally, the answers to the questions above are not based on fuzzy theory but upon personal experience with these practices as they are practiced during the quarter of this century before Stalinism subverted individual freedom by using a pseudo social science to undermine spiritual values.

 What we asked of Mr. Wilson was that he attempt to translate the moral and spiritual stand which we think we understand, and which we endorse, into concrete and specific policies which might illumine and implement Mr. Wilson's answers to our questions are bold and strong on the concrete level, in which he gives practical translation to his theory that America should offer the world good will rather than destruction, and act from confidence in its own high purposes rather than from vegetal fear of what some one else may be plotting to do.
 For our part, we are quite sure that this country is already moving away from its absorption in destructive, materialistic power toward an anxiety for a higher level of existence and policy wherein it may find true purpose and true safety, and we are pleased to have extended our own limited forum to Mr. Wilson whose thoughts are at once a reflection of this trend, and a stimulant to it.

House Lumber Not Restricted
 Credit Control Is Only Limitation to Home Building Yet Placed
 Pointing out that "as yet no restrictions have been placed on home building," other than the credit control of down payments and mortgage amortization, G. Gordon Rice, The Manchester Lumber & Fuel Co., Inc., a director of the Lumber Dealers Association of Connecticut said today that if everyone uses scarce building materials wisely, more homes can be built in the local area during the emergency.
 "Production restrictions adopted to meet the needs of the rearmament program have been modified to meet some of the housing requirements, but it is building products are likely to be restricted for some months to come," the local lumber dealer said.
 "By limiting the use of these scarce products wherever possible in new construction or reconstruction, the available supply can be made to stretch over a larger amount of construction work. There should be plenty of lumber, wallboard, cement, brick and other non-critical building materials in the months ahead, but the amount of building that can be done will be determined largely by the care with which materials containing critical elements are used."
 "With the partial elimination of copper and aluminum for construction purposes, steel now is the material which must be carefully conserved in building until such time as expanded production makes it possible to meet both defense and civilian needs."

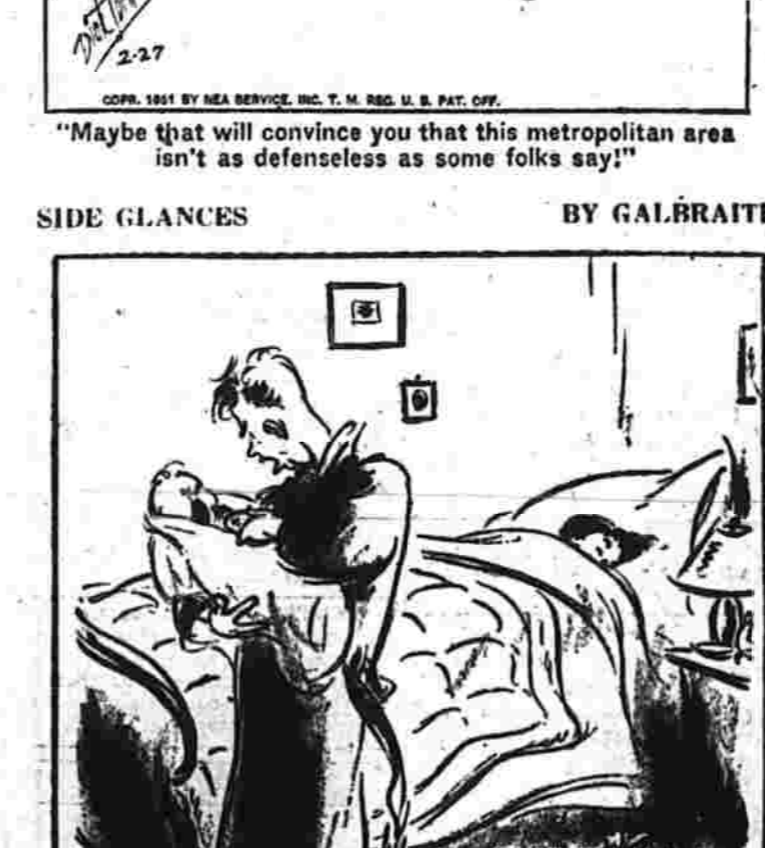
