Two Local Teachers Killed in Plunge Off Bridge Ramp

Miss Ida P. Mindel, Mrs. Dorothy Secord, Victims in Accident On Way to Hartford Yesterday Afternoon; Skidding Seen Cause

Two Manchester school teachers plunged 45 feet to their deaths at 3:40 yesterday afternoon after their car skidded off an exit ramp of the Charter Oak Bridge, turned over in the air and landed on its roof on the ground below. The teachers were Mrs. Dorothy F. Secord, 23, of 1953 Broad street, Hartford.

To retake Hoengsung Friday, the Marines used a series of hillside and ridges to the south and west—sometimes at bayonet point. By noon Friday they had won a sea-saw battle for a 1,000-foot barren ridge after being stopped on its steep slopes Thursday.

Units that ridge taken, the Marines strongly supported by aerial and artillery bombardment. The Marines have been in the area since they swept through Hoengsung toward high ground to the north.

Other Americans charged the Reds on the 25 and 40 of the Reds were killed before they were captured after an hour-long clash.

Stone said the latest fighting was a matter of a half dozen counter-attacks on the division's position.

Long an Objective

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correspondents have taken to identifying actions in Korea as "Operation Killers."
 "The object in Korea is to kill as many Communists as possible," this sort of statement has been made because it is indeed a plausible, if harsh, summation of the military strategy in the present phase of fighting.
 Even these columns, our readers may have noted, have commented favorably on the military strategy involved. The logic is quite simple: Kill enough Communists and they will get tired of fighting. That was, presumably, all that was in the minds of the generals who first expressed this military strategy, and all that was in our mind as we held it. It was something that was workable, well, but some terrible poison has entered into the existence of this military policy. In the atmosphere in Korea, in the new strategy in Korea, in the new thinking of the American soldier, every military means employed, the strategy involved, has come to be seen as being the whole objective. The military means to become the end. And in that status, it is so unspicable that we tend to question it seriously. It is not that we are not in favor of the means, and to regret that we did not question it when it did first appear.
 For the truth is or should be, that it is not our object in Korea to kill as many Communists as possible. We are not in Korea in any kind of righteous blood thirst. We are in Korea as an American citizen, who is told that our object in Korea is just to kill Communists as being betrayed and invited to share in the degradation of an objective which is brutal and false.
 What is our objective in Korea? It is to enforce law, to repel aggression, to make peace.
 It is not to run as many "Operations Killers" or "Operations Crusades" as possible, it is to spill as much blood as possible. It is not to reveal us Americans in our power to kill. For we know, and the world knows, that the men who are killing are individually as innocent of aggression and as innocent of Communism as so many children.
 Actually, our best accomplishment of our objective of enforcing law, repelling aggression, and making peace in Korea will be that course of behavior which kills as few Communists as possible.
 And, for Korea, we need a generalship which has the moral and political intelligence to say something like this and say it before the idea of killing as an end in itself shapes the world's opinion of us, or gets into our own hearts. We need a generalship which we cannot answer. All we know is that it cost two lives yesterday which should not have been lost.

Credit, Loans For Veterans

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Why No Margin For Error?
 The Charter Oak Bridge has operated since 1942 without, until yesterday, the kind of accident the nervous kind of driver is always imagining as possible on the structure. But yesterday that very which has hit so many drivers during their own use of the bridge was given some tragic justification. It was proved, in tragic fashion, that what such drivers have feared was possible—that a car gone out of control could end up in a plunge off the structure.
 Why a structure of this kind should ever be built, in the first place, in a way which leaves any margin of possibility for this kind of accident is difficult to understand. It has always seemed to us that the retaining walls on such bridges and ramps should be so high, and so substantial, that it would be an absolute physical impossibility for any vehicle to find its way over them. That is, that it had been completely safe, structurally, what would have occurred would have been a sliding accident, and nothing more.
 Why modern engineering, which is supposed to be concerned with the safety problem, and is supposed to be making continual progress, should design things actually less substantial than those our horse and buggy grandfathers insisted upon—that is a question we cannot answer. All we know is that it cost two lives yesterday which should not have been lost.

Why Labor Walked Out
 The two great parties of the American scene, capital and labor, have not yet gained one even mutually deserved, that full confidence in one another in which the one would trust the other voluntarily to observe the fair interests of both. And this fact that labor has not been represented in the top level of Washington's defense mobilization effort, being a fact, automatically means that labor distrusts the complete fairness of that effort.
 That is the basic factor behind the walkout organized labor has taken with regard to the mobilization effort.
 One can be quite sure, too, that business and management would also walk out of the defense mobilization organization if it were being headed by Walter Feather or John L. Lewis, as being operated with the quick efficiency of cardroom, that this democracy has to operate. It costs us speed; it costs us efficiency. But, on the other hand, it does give us staying power, it does give us operational effort that of free, co-ordinating nature. And, quite clearly, we shall have to go back to this slower, more troublesome, but still sounder way of doing things if we want our mobilization effort to be a success.
 Beyond this general principle, there is too much validity in labor's specific charge that the only factor in our economic life which

State's Jewish Leaders Call Emergency Parley
 With nearly 100,000 Jews facing migration deadlines within the next 100 days in Eastern Europe and Moslem countries, outstanding community leaders of Connecticut have called an emergency "Rescue" conference of the United Jewish Appeal for Sunday, March 18, at the Yacht Hotel in New Haven.
 In announcing the emergency conference, Morris M. Gottlieb, United Jewish Appeal National Chairman for Regions, pointed out that "The Iraq government has set a May 31 deadline upon further Jewish emigration to Israel. About 54,000 Jews in Iraq must be moved to Israel by that date, or perhaps never. Furthermore, thousands of Jews living in the United States and other Moslem countries and in Eastern Europe also face migration deadlines in the next 100 days. To bring these oppressed people to safety in Israel is a most urgent task for everyone of us."
 "American Jews," Mr. Gottlieb stated, "must advance before May 31 the major part of the United Jewish Appeal's 1951 requirement of \$203,884,577 in order to make possible the U.S.A. rescue movement in the next 100 days. At this conference, I am confident, the Jewish communities of Connecticut will map their all-out participation in this emergency task."
 The six main objectives of the United Jewish Appeal for 1951 are: (1) The transfer to Israel of 200,000 Jews from Eastern European and Moslem countries; (2) The establishment in Israel of 120 new agricultural settlements and the expansion of 250 other farm settlements; (3) The building of rural housing for 40,000 new immigrants; (4) The care of 50,000 immigrants in reception camps; (5) The provision of welfare aid to 400,000 distressed Jews in Europe and Arab lands; and (6) The resettlement in the United States and other western lands of 25,000 displaced Jews from Europe.

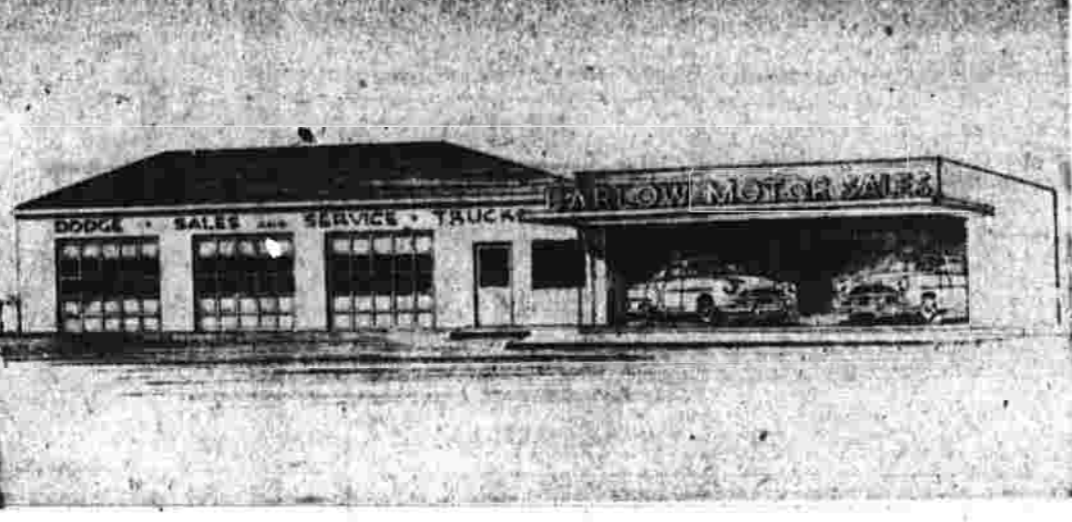
