Thugs May Be In Ambulance
Suspect Jail Break Pair Using Vehicle to Fleer From Pursuing Police

Wichita Falls, Tex., March 8.—Two tough Texas brothers who broke out of an Oklahoma jail may be using a stolen ambulance to elude police.

Roadblocks were thrown up in this area last night after reports the big, black ambulance had been seen at a night spot here near the home of Chester, Lee and Norman Davenport.

The Davenport's overpowered a jailer, took his gun, and fled the Mayes County, Okla., jail Thursday. They fled in the jailer's ambulance, later found abandoned.

They had been held on an arrest robbery charge in connection with the abduction Feb. 13 of Oklahoma Highway Patrolman Loyd Francisco. He was released unharmed after a six-hour ride at gunpoint.

Dallas police first broadcast the alert last night for the ambulance and said it was believed occupied by the Davenport's.

About 10:15 p. m., police here received the report that an ambulance had been seen at the night spot. Witnesses said it had been one of the favorite hangouts for the brothers.

Witnesses told police two rough looking men got out of the ambulance, but as soon as they saw they were being watched, jumped back into the vehicle and sped away.

A black 1948 Cadillac ambulance belonging to the Burgess Funeral Home of Bowie had been reported stolen. Police officers said the ambulance was stolen early Wednesday at Mustang, near Wichita Falls and not far from the Oklahoma line.

Roads leading north into Oklahoma were blocked and roadblocks set up on highways in all directions from Wichita Falls.

The brothers had eluded a posse in the hill country 25 miles south of Pryor, Okla., Tuesday. Bloodhounds had picked up a trail that led to some caves in the area, but no trace of the men could be found.

Oklahoma officers described the pair as dangerous.

Reds Speed Up Verbal Attack
Russians Trying to Start Trouble Within Japan; Officials Not Worried

Tokyo, March 8.—Communist propaganda has intensified their attacks on occupied Japan. Some circles here predict a new, strong effort may be made to stir up the country.

But informed American officials say there is little chance at present for the Russians successfully to use Japanese war prisoners to infiltrate their homeland.

General MacArthur's headquarters, it is understood, views with skepticism recent reports of large troop movements to Sakhalin and the Kuril Islands. One unconfirmed report said new troops included a division formed from World War II Japanese prisoners. The terrain of these islands and the bad winter weather prevent much movement at this time," said one informed officer.

Red propagandists have opened a widening series of attacks on Japan in the past three weeks. The triple theme: Japan is being used as the springboard for aggressive war; the Japanese are being converted to war, both militarily and industrially; and Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's Cabinet is collaborating with the western Fascists.

The timing indicates the Communists have begun their long anticipated verbal assault on Japan in advance of the projected peace treaty with western powers.

The campaign could also herald a renewed effort to disrupt the steadily smooth flow of supplies through this vital United Nations staging area for the Korean campaign.

Japan's Communists have been virtually inactive since the outbreak of Korean hostilities resulted in the purge of their leaders and the suspension of party newspapers. Top party leaders have been missing for months. Few officials here interpret this inactivity as capitulation.

Before long arrival of two U. S. National Guard divisions will give Japan its first occupation force since last summer. Opportunities for sabotage will decrease. The

American officials say the Russians could not smuggle significant numbers of Japanese prisoners back into Japan for sabotage. They say sea communications are too limited and Japanese vigilance too tight.

American officers say Communist indoctrination of Japanese prisoners has been a failure. Few of more than a million men who returned from Red camps arrived with evident faith in Communism.

Finally, there is considerable doubt here that the Japanese prisoners remaining in Russian hands total anywhere near the official claim of 200,000. American officers say this number remains unaccounted for, but express belief the majority may have died in imprisonment.

Probe Mutilation At Louisiana Pen

Angola, La., March 9.—What caused 37 convicts at the Louisiana State Prison to slash their heels with razor blades.

An attractive prison nurse gave answers to a citizens investigating committee here yesterday.

Miss Mary Daughtry, the only registered nurse available to care for 2,700 prisoners, placed the blame on the prison.

"Sex offenders, steel pigeons, homosexual degenerates of every type, psychopaths and neurotics are huddled in bedside companionship," Miss Daughtry said.

"I do not believe the hee string cutters mutilated themselves simply to escape being whipped or beaten. These acts were the culmination of many things joined together to destroy their morale and warp their minds."

A native of Beaumont, Texas, with almost eight years service at the prison, Miss Daughtry added: "Angola is still in the dark ages, isolated and remote. Convicts suffer their freedom slaver in a strange world outside, which they cannot cope with."

As evidence of deep trafficking and immorality in the prison, Miss Daughtry produced an envelope of letters which she had brought from the prison for \$5.

She added that brutality was common.

The investigation was touched after 37 convicts cut their heels in protest against prison "brutality."

Reds Purge Chief German Leader

Frankfurt, Germany, March 9.—West German Communists, grappling with the party's worst crisis since the war, booted out another state party boss last night.

Latest and seventh such to get the ax was Ernest Buschmann, state chairman of the Rhine-land-Palatinate district in the French occupation zone.

Allied intelligence leaders predicted the party would lose their jobs in the purge of suspected "Titonians."

Allied officials said Buschmann apparently was held guilty of the same feelings which caused the firing of state leaders in Wuerstemberg-Baden, Wuerstemberg-Hohenzollern, Hesse, Bremen, Lower Saxony and Hamburg. All were accused of "Titonism," "Opportunism" and failing to seek out "American agents" in the party ranks.

Officials said Buschmann was replaced by Georg Gampfer, a political unknown. They said the sweeping purge is aimed at bolstering the party with young leaders faithful to the Kremlin line.

The old leaders have been blamed for mass defections which have taken 25,000 members from the party rolls in the past two years.

Sportsmen's Feud Appears Settled

Hartford, March 9.—A long-standing feud about how to finance fish and game activities in Connecticut appeared to have been settled today.

The Connecticut State League of Sportsmen's Club and the State Board of Fisheries and Game reported to a legislative committee yesterday that they had settled their differences.

A compromise bill was up for hearing. It would require that all funds derived from sportsmen's license fees be used for the purchase, production and propagation of fish and game and for purposes of conservation.

The state's taxpayers, through the general fund, would foot the bill for administrative expenses of the Fish and Game department.

Iranian Crisis Flares On Nationalization of Demonstrations Rise

Tehran, Iran, March 8.—(AP)—Crowds of leftist "peasants" participated in a demonstration today, sprayed demonstrators loudly for two and a half hours in front of the U. S. embassy today. They shouted "Down to MacArthur" and other anti-American slogans.

The demonstration came in the wake of new demands by Nationalist factions that the government take over the oil industry here.

Premier Gen. Ali Razmara, assassinated Wednesday, was a foe of all industry nationalization.

The British-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil Company now faces a fight for their nationalization of the oil industry.

The parliament petroleum commission is reported already to have approved the measure in principle, the nationalization of the industry. A big demonstration for the measure was announced for this afternoon.

The leftist, acting ambassador of the turbulent situation, paraded through the streets. Diplomats and some Iranian officials expressed growing concern at the political turbulence.

An Embassy demonstration, an anti-Communist demonstration, there have been reports that the demonstration might be ordered to forestall violence. Gen. Mohammed Darfari, commander of the Tehran police, said that troops would not take action unless disturbances broke out.

U. S. Ambassador Henry P. Grady watched the demonstration of leftists from his embassy window. The crowd, estimated at 8,000, shook fists at him, shouting "we want peace."

The demonstration was organized by the women's movement to support the Communist-backed "Kilobach Peace Appeal." Women and children carrying placards moved up and down in front of the embassy while men formed lines three blocks long. One man said: "We don't want tanks—Give us bread." Recently 25 American tanks were shipped to the U. S. military aid program for Iran.

There was no unusual police turnout, but as a show of strength, a truckload of troops moved down through the street.

Informants who disclosed the parliamentary vote on nationalization of the oil industry said the committee avoided an outright commitment — which parliament would have to vote — but asked the government to give it two months to work out details.

The group's decision came yesterday, barely 24 hours after Premier Ali Razmara, who opposed nationalization, was assassinated. His death was attributed by many to his stand on the oil question.

The 18-member commission had debated the takeover heatedly for the past two months. Razmara favored bigger oil royalties for the company, which is 51 per cent British owned, but urged the committee to consider legal experts before reaching a decision.

A big demonstration against the government's order is, of course, designed to aid the country's mobilization for defense since electric service is as vital to our Nation at war as it is to America at peace.

Buenos Aires, March 8.—(AP)—Leaders of Argentine workers' movements-backed labor unions met today to study a plan calling on the government to seize the independent newspaper La Prensa, leading critic of President Juan D. Peron's policies.

The ruling was in reply to a question by Mexican Delegate Gilberto Lopez, who referred to a statement by the Santiago Press Association denouncing "persecution" of the paper by the Peron administration. Santa Cruz explained the council could not act since the press association has no official status with the council.

La Prensa has enjoyed an international reputation for 81 years for its political independence. Its present editor and publisher, Dr. Alberto Gaitaniz Paz, was charged with the task of reopening the newspaper as anti-Peron.

Union leaders have blamed the government for the seizure of the paper's supporters claim it is politically independent and has often supported labor causes against Argentina's government.
