

### Allied Forces Start Big New Offensive; Nearing Hongchon

#### Three-Pronged Spearhead Is Hurling at the Heart of Red Resistance; Believe Foe Will Make Last Ditch Stand Before Important City

Three-pronged spearheads of Allied troops today hurled a three-pronged spearhead at the heart of Chinese Red resistance in Korea. The center prong stabbed to within five miles of Hongchon, a huge Communist troop marshaling point and once reported to be the Communist general headquarters. Red rear-guard fighting stiffened and Communist leaders would make a last-ditch stand before Hongchon, an important highway town. Allied field officers expected a counterattack from the Red staging area.

British, Canadian and Australian troops advanced to within five miles of Hongchon from the south. They were 22 miles south of the 38th parallel. That is the northernmost advance of the current Allied major offensive.

Six Miles From Town  
The U. S. First Cavalry and the U. S. First Marine Divisions drove on the Red supply center from the southwest and southeast. The cautiously advancing Marines were reported about six miles from Hongchon. The cavalrymen were reported about seven miles southwest of the town.

On the right side of the 70-mile United Nations front, Red resistance evaporated suddenly. Allied troops quickly captured towering Mount Taem, a mile-high strategic point. Not a shot was fired. #### Lower Draft Age Approved

### 181-2 Years, 26 Mos. of Duty Voted by House Armed Services Group

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—The House Armed Services Committee today approved lowering the draft age to 18 years and six months and lengthening of the service term to 24 months.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) said the action was final and was taken "without objection."

The committee in closed session considering sections by section revised version of the bill introduced by Vinson for cutting the draft age below the present 16-year limit, extending the period of service, and setting up a universal military training program for the future.

The House bill differs in several respects from the one which the Senate passed Friday.

Vinson has predicted speedy committee approval, with the hope of getting the bill before the House Wednesday and obtaining passage before Easter.

#### Chain of Red Naval Bases Erected on Estonian Coast

Frankfurt, March 12.—(AP)—Soviet bases on Baltic waters was practically finished by 1950, the ABE report said. It named Tallin and Paldiski as the major Russian naval bases in Estonia, and said they now surpass Leningrad in importance.

Paldiski is a major submarine base and has been made headquarters of the operations division for some time. According to these reports, the Soviet chain of naval bases extends the length of the Baltic coast from Finland to eastern Germany.

Moffett failed today to win a Supreme Court hearing on his once-successful suit to collect more than \$1,000,000 from an oil company for his influence with the late President Roosevelt. By its refusal to review the case, the highest tribunal will stand a lower court's finding that Moffett's actions were contrary to public policy.

### Peiping Irks Britain Over Malay Trade

#### Insists on Admission of Red Mission to Probe Conditions; Editorial Hits at Propaganda

Singapore, March 12.—(AP)—Communist China's steady propaganda blasts against the British in Malaya are finally beginning to rile the usually placid Britons, who would rather do business with China than argue with her.

Peiping radio's insistence that Britain admit a team of Chinese field investigators to probe the persecuted overseas Chinese and other circles is still America's craving to purchase tin because of "gouging" by producers here.

#### Senate Crime Probers Open N. Y. Hearings

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—The Senate Crime Committee opened its climactic series of hearings today, with a host of politicians and members of the nation's underworld figures on tap.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, (D-Tenn.) the chairman, said his investigating group will try to determine if any "solid links" exist between crime and politics in New York City.

He noted that charges of such links were made in the last Municipal election.

Reporters, clerks, stenographers and lawyers jammed the tiny hearing room in the federal courthouse. Television and several cameras covered over the long committee table.

Kefauver said the committee was interested in any local corruption, as it affects the national picture.

Waiting in the ante-room to testify were a motley aggregation of witnesses, including petty officials, gamblers, nondescript businessmen, and a number of reputed underworld leaders.

The New York hearings, to last a week to 10 days, will be the last major sessions before the end of the month.

Kefauver said that by reserving New York City as the final site of its investigations, the committee has been able to accumulate data that will aid in pushing the probe more effectively here.

He said this schedule was followed because "the city is bigger and the tasks of our committee is bigger here."

Six more witnesses were listed for today. Gambling appeared to be the main topic before the week-long hearings.

However, Alfred Klein, committee counsel, told newsmen yesterday that during the week more than 50 witnesses will appear. These he said, will include underworld figures, politicians and criminal lawyers.

It will be the biggest and probably the most spectacular series of the public hearings held by the committee since it began looking into interstate crime.

Senators Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) committee chairman, argued last night with a bundle of documents under his arm.

Kefauver was to be joined by Senators Charles Tobey (R-N.H.) and Herbert O'Connor (D-Md.) at today's sessions. The other committee members—Senators Lister C. Hunt (D-Wyo.) and Alexander R. Wiley (R-Wis.)—are expected tomorrow.

#### Strike Closes Big Steel Mill

Pittsburgh, March 12.—(AP)—Steel production vital to the nation's defense was shut off today at the Pittsburgh works of Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation by a strike of 800 members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

The trainmen are employees of the Monongahela railroad, an inter-connecting line which served the steel plant. It is a subsidiary of Jones and Laughlin.

Nearly 12,000 employees of the steel company were furloughed.

For every 24 hours the shut-down continues the nation will lose 4,500 tons of finished steel products a day. The company is reported to have been producing some armor plate for tanks.

The steel company, fourth largest producer in the country, continued to operate its plant at nearby Alquippa. It is served by another subsidiary railroad, the Allegheny and Southern.

#### Hearings Due On 300 Bills

Hartford, March 12.—(AP)—Bills for the first time in the history of the House are scheduled for hearings today on 300 bills.

The bills include 11 non-flying Air National Guard units which the executive committee of Local 2188, TWU-IO, voted into active duty within the next nine months.

Court Refuses to Review Moffett's Case  
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### U. S. Supreme Court Refuses to Review Conviction of Hiss

#### Ruling of Highest Tribunal Lets Stand Sentence of Five Years for Committing Perjury in Denying He Gave Government Secrets to Russia; Other Rulings

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to review the perjury conviction of Alger Hiss. The refusal lets stand Hiss' conviction and five-year sentence given him in a jury's finding that he lied in denying he fed government secrets to Russia from his high State Department office.

Justice Reed, Frankfurter and Clark disqualified themselves from considering Hiss' appeal. Reed and Frankfurter testified as character witnesses for Hiss at his first trial in Federal court in New York but not at the second trial which resulted in the conviction.

Clark was attorney general at the time the government prepared its case against Hiss.

Was Free on \$10,000 Bail  
Hiss was convicted on Jan. 21, 1950, has been free on \$10,000 bail pending Supreme Court action on his appeal. His first trial ended July 8, 1949, with the jury disbelieving his story. He was ordered to reconsider its refusal to accept his appeal.

If that request is turned down—and the court's agreement to reconsider is rare—the former high-level State Department official will have to go to prison and begin serving his sentence.

Hiss was a high-ranking policy adviser to President Roosevelt at Yalta conference, secretary-general at the San Francisco conference that created the United Nations in 1945, and later was president of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Hiss was convicted on the outgrowth of Congressional investigations into the operation of a pre-war Red spy ring in Washington.

A federal grand jury took the inquiry after Hiss and Whitaker Chambers, avowed courier for the spy ring, told directly opposite stories.

Chambers said Hiss was a source of many of the government secrets he fed out of a pumpkin on his Maryland farm after the former State Department official had threatened to sue Chambers for libel.

Hiss repeated his denial of Chambers' testimony before the grand jury and his indictment on perjury charges followed.

Hiss appealed to the Supreme Court after the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York had unanimously upheld his conviction.

In his appeal, Hiss made much of Chambers' testimony and told "Chambers' motive in fabrication of evidence for future use against petitioner (Hiss) may have been to cover his actual espionage sources in the State Department in the event of discovery or to protect himself with evidence designed to incriminate an alleged accomplice, or he may have suffered from the mental ailment of 'psychopathic personality,' in which case no rational motive need be sought."

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#### 103rd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron to Report for Active Service Sept. 1

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—The 103rd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, Connecticut Air Guard, will report for active federal duty on Sept. 1 according to Senator William Brewster. The squadron is the only remaining unit of the Air Guard which was called from Connecticut since the start of the Korean war.

Senator Brewster's announcement closely followed one by the Air Force which stated 19 non-flying Air National Guard units will be called into active duty within the next nine months.

The 10th is commanded by Lt. Col. Ruel M. Luckingham of Manchester, and temporarily based at the Manchester armory. The unit could be used either as a control squadron working with an infantry division or as a part of the radar sector for aircraft warning being built up around the United States.

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#### 19 Non-Flying Guard Units Called to Duty

Washington, March 12.—(AP)—The Air Force announced today it is calling to active duty in the next nine months 19 non-flying Air National Guard units composed of 10,000 officers and men.

The first of the Guard units will be called into service within two months. The others will be brought into service during the following seven months.

The Air Force did not disclose either the identity or the future assignments of the units.

The 19 units include 11 aircraft control and warning groups, five signal light construction companies and three communication squadrons.

This call to non-flying units is in addition to the mobilization orders that have gone out to 22 fighter and light bomber wings of the Air National Guard. More than half of these flying wings already are on duty, the Air Force said, and the remainder will be in service within a month.

The call up of the 19 units will complete the mobilization of the Air National Guard's aircraft control and warning groups. One such group was ordered into service several months ago.

All officers and men brought into service under today's order will stand a lower court's finding that Moffett's actions were contrary to public policy.

#### Russian Made Jet Planes Meet, Explode Over Korea

Frankfurt, March 12.—(AP)—Two Russian-made MiG-15 enemy jets collided and exploded today as they attempted to follow an American F-80 jet through a tight turn.

Four MiGs were reported damaged by four F-80s in a 10-minute battle high over northwest Korea. Three other MiGs were reported damaged in daylight this F-80 pilot, Lt. Arthur Walton of 5522 MacKinnon street, Bethesda, Md., one of the pilots, described today's daylight as "the best damn show I've ever been on."

Walton said the two MiGs got on the tail of one of the planes in his flight. He instructed the F-80 pilot, 2nd Lt. Charles Blomberg of 2212 Second avenue west, Diddens, N. D., to break away from the MiG. He made a light turn to the right and the MiGs tried to follow him. They just could not turn that sharp.

"When they came together there was a big explosion and two less MiGs."

Blomberg said "I did not know the MiGs were behind me until Walton called. So when he said break away, I broke away."

The MiGs were first spotted by Lt. Richard A. Baldwin of Air Force base, Salt Lake City. The fourth man on the flight was Capt. Paul L. Cellia of McCure, Ohio. Earlier this afternoon a flight of 14 F-80 Sabers jetted slightly to the east of the MiGs. The Sabers were engaged in the same area but could not engage them.

### Auto Plunge Injures Two

#### N.Y. Women Hurt Close To Spot Where Local Teachers Were Killed

Hartford, March 12.—Two Brooklyn, N. Y., women were injured yesterday when an automobile plunged off the Connecticut highway here and dropped 21 feet to the ground. The girls, ages 16 and 18, were on their way to school from 100 feet from the spot where two women lost their lives 10 days ago.

The two women, Mrs. Lillian Bernstein, 46, of 1548 East Main street, and Mrs. Edith Kahn, 45, of 1040 East 28th street, were taken to the Hartford hospital for chest and rib injuries.

Four other persons, who were in the same car, escaped either unhurt or with minor lacerations. The auto, driven by Hyman Bernstein, 47, husband of Mrs. Bernstein, was nearing the point where the highway merges with the Charter Oak bridge exit when it hit a concrete abutment, smashed through the highway's iron railing and crashed to the ground.

On March 1, Mrs. Dorothy F. Scott, 23, and Mrs. Ida P. Mudgett, 36, both of Hartford, were killed when their auto plunged off the bridge exit ramp and dropped more than 50 feet to the ground. They were returning to Hartford from Manchester, where both were teachers.

New emphasis was placed today on a study of bridge accidents on Connecticut's elevated highways as the result of the rail crash Sunday noon.

State Highway Commissioner G. Albert Hill said today that the department is making a thorough check-up of all bridge guard rails on elevated roadways.

Commissioner Hill said he was "mighty concerned" about the accidents. He said the department is procuring data from the State Police on the causes and if the department will try to determine what action seems best.

Rolling on elevated highways, he said, always have been regarded as a hazardous activity.

Mr. Hill said he has conferred with departments in other states on guard rails and that Connecticut appears to afford as good protection as other states.

Winter Park, Fla. March 12.—Students and faculty members of Rollins college are up in arms about an economy-minded board of trustees and president who would disband a part of the teaching staff.

Dr. Paul Wagner, 33-year-old president of the little central Florida school, told a student meeting last night the situation does not exist merely at Rollins. About 22,000 college professors around the nation have been dismissed in view of world conditions, he said.

One faculty member—mathematics professor George Sault—told the student meeting that he held a similar position in the past and that he had been visited to suit the board.

Wagner said in answer to the question of how he was reporting he is letting out faculty members to bring in his own men, that he was not. He said that the trustees voted Saturday to make a considerable cut in the budget for the 1951-52 school year, including abolishing inter-collegiate athletics and letting out about 18 of the 53 faculty members.

Rollins, with a student body of just over 600, has a conference plan of teaching small groups.

Krollinger will be given about 25 per cent of the total faculty. They also pointed to inflationary operating costs and said they had no hope of getting a salary increase.

The faculty met to ask the board to reconsider the action and asked for suggestions for lowering a deficit. A response to a conference was held off and another meeting scheduled for tomorrow.

#### It Happens Again

The problem of safety on the Charter Oak Bridge and its associated ramps and by-pass involves a factor which is not present on ordinary highways—the factor of height.

When an accident happens on an elevated highway, it can be no worse than an accident on any other highway providing there is no possibility that the car involved can leave the ground at some distance below.

That any such possibility of an accident car leaving the elevated highway or bridge involved should not be the unpardonable sin of engineering.

As often happens in such things, the Charter Oak Bridge and its associated ramp system, which had enjoyed a complete safety record since 1942, has now, within a short space of time, had its first serious accident followed by another.

In both accidents, the retaining rails at the edge of the elevated highway proved too weak to withstand the crash of a car out of control.

In both accidents, the weakness of the rail structure allowed height to be an additional danger factor.

These accidents merely confirm the fears which have been felt over the years by many users of the bridge. Many ordinary drivers have become more apprehensive over the low and weak character of the rail guards than have, apparently, the engineers who designed them.

There is only one thing which will satisfy every one and satisfy common sense, too. It is that the guards at the side of the bridge and its ramps be made so high and so strong that it will be absolutely physically impossible for any car to get through or over them. Perhaps this can be done as suggested by one bill introduced in the Legislature, by the addition of steel cables. Perhaps it will involve more expensive measures. But whatever it involves, it ought to be done, and it ought to be done quickly.

#### Trieste

When, in the Big Four meeting at Paris, we said we wouldn't discuss the liberation of Germany unless the liberation of Austria were first discussed, we thought we were putting the proper emphasis on Russia's power politics designs.

We were a little careless, for when Russia retaliated by agreeing to discuss Austria if we would discuss Trieste, the squeeze was put back on us. For Trieste is where we are caught in a very naked brand of power politics quite on a par with Russia's own.

Our concern with Trieste began in the post-war period when Russia still held Tito, and we were rather inclined to award it to Austria. But the Italian and the Russians seemed to agree on only one point—that it should belong to Italy.

#### Missing B-29 SOS Reported

Wiesbaden, Germany, March 12.—Faint SOS signals heard by Air Force officers here, on a B-29 search for U. S. Air Force B-29 missing with its crew of 12 in the Mediterranean area since Friday.

U. S. Air Force officials here said the plane, based at Lakenheath, England, was last heard from Friday afternoon, March 12, en route to the Mediterranean area.

It reported the sighting of a plane in the Mediterranean. Planes of the 1st S. British, Fifth Bomber, Air Force, were joined in the biggest aerial search since the war.

The search plan was to cross Spanish seas. The search plane, a B-29 Superfortress, was reported to have been seen in an emergency landing aboard a ship.

Following that report, the search center moved northwest toward the French gulf. Officers said it had been put on a round-the-clock basis. The weather was reported excellent.

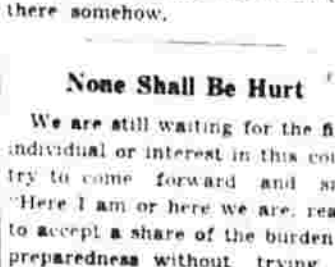

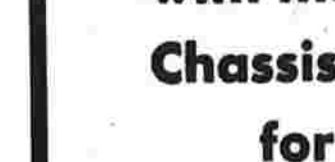

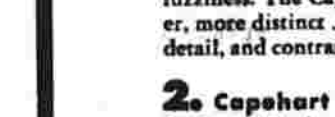
