### Racial Issue Brings Debate

Hartford, March 15.—(AP)—Do Connecticut educational institutions practice religious or racial discrimination in selecting their students? If so, should the state attempt to prevent it?

These questions provoked sharp debate at a legislative hearing yesterday. Before the Education committee was a bill to strip the State Inter-Racial commission power to prohibit racial or religious discrimination in the selection of students to educational institutions.

The commission now has this power in regard to discrimination in employment and in places of public accommodation.

College administrators, denying that their institutions are guilty of discrimination, urged the committee not to establish an "educational OUP."

The reference to the dreaded Bolshevik secret police came from G. Keith Funtun, Trinity college president who was among the leading spokesmen for the colleges.

Argue for Legislation

Representatives of about a score of religious and racial organizations argued for the legislation.

While few of them accused colleges of discriminatory practices, they did charge that there was prejudice on racial and religious grounds in private preparatory schools, in nursing and other vocational schools and in day nurseries.

In the latter group, said former Lieut. Gov. Wilbert Snow with respect to the "Suzanne Anglo-Saxon, Caucasian" institutions.

None of the schools thus accused was represented at the hearing.

Hartford, March 15.—(AP)—Do Connecticut educational institutions practice religious or racial discrimination in selecting their students? If so, should the state attempt to prevent it?

These questions provoked sharp debate at a legislative hearing yesterday. Before the Education committee was a bill to strip the State Inter-Racial commission power to prohibit racial or religious discrimination in the selection of students to educational institutions.

The commission now has this power in regard to discrimination in employment and in places of public accommodation.

College administrators, denying that their institutions are guilty of discrimination, urged the committee not to establish an "educational OUP."

The reference to the dreaded Bolshevik secret police came from G. Keith Funtun, Trinity college president who was among the leading spokesmen for the colleges.

Argue for Legislation

Representatives of about a score of religious and racial organizations argued for the legislation.

While few of them accused colleges of discriminatory practices, they did charge that there was prejudice on racial and religious grounds in private preparatory schools, in nursing and other vocational schools and in day nurseries.

In the latter group, said former Lieut. Gov. Wilbert Snow with respect to the "Suzanne Anglo-Saxon, Caucasian" institutions.

None of the schools thus accused was represented at the hearing.

Snow, U. S. district judge at the college Funtun heads, conceded it is impossible to legislate tolerance. But he said, "you can at least ease intolerance."

Mrs. Patricia Ritter of Hamden, deputy chairman of the inter-racial commission, told the committee that all ten members of the commission are "clearly convinced" there is discrimination in Connecticut education.

Other supporters of the legislation included such groups as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Anti-Discrimination League, E. N. Britch, a lawyer, and the American Jewish Congress.

Lined up against it were Yale, Trinity, Wesleyan, Connecticut College at New London and all the Roman Catholic schools in the state.

Their chief contentions were that they did not now practice discrimination and that, because students must be accepted from many more applicants than can be accommodated there would be ungrounded complaints. These, the college spokesmen said, would require the colleges to submit to an elaborate "trial" before a state agency.

Perhaps the most curious misadventure in the whole curious steel mill situation—the mis-play which has at once brought sudden disaster to the project and which also contains whatever small seeds of future hope still exist for it—was one made by the very New England Council businessmen who originally launched the project.

How It Came About... Down in New York City, the Senate Committee investigating Communist activities is hearing lurid testimony from people who are rather generally considered rats—wicked, cunning and gambling fellows who reach into the political field and their corruption.

They can, perhaps, be found to have violated some law, and they do receive punishment. At any rate, they will be labeled for what they are.

But there is just as much moral in something like this as there is in something which was disclosed at Washington last week—something that was apparently, completely within the day's reckoning that it more likely to be considered smart political and business strategy rather than a violation of any code.

This was the story of former Congressman Joseph E. Casey of Massachusetts, who made some \$250,000 this way. He organized a corporation which arranged to buy five tankers from the United States Maritime Commission, and then arranged to lease these tankers to a large American oil company.

He made his \$250,000, in other words, for a little bookkeeping and a little finagling which took five people of this country and put them to work for a private company. And quite legally, he used corporate procedures to avoid paying income taxes on his profit.

Case Ends, Curiosity Lives... The refusal of the United States Supreme Court to entertain the appeal of Alger Hiss represents the legal end of the matter, and he must serve his time for having in the judgment of the federal jury, lied about his connections and transactions with Whittaker Chambers, the admitted Communist spy.

There have been mistakes in this effort, which have led to gobs of trouble, and which have gotten it into unnecessary difficulties. There have been diplomats and generals who have failed to grasp the true significance of the actions and positions in which they were engaged.
