should contain a provision permitting such arrangements.
 This provision in the United Nations charter has subsequently become the legal basis for other regional security arrangements, like the North Atlantic Pact, and like Russia's system of alliances with her satellites.
 There is an inevitable conflict between such regional organizations and the United Nations organization, even when, in some cases, they are loyal to the United Nations and profess themselves to be organized only to carry out a defense of United Nations principles.
 The conflict is essentially this: that if the United Nations organization should be superfluous, and that, conversely, the organization of regional organizations detracts somewhat from the prestige of the United Nations and tends to crystallize the character of policy in the United Nations.
 And, in the main, the same reasoning applies to regional security as applies to the effect of any individual nation to attain security for itself. Security, in our kind of world, is no longer a luxury, but a necessity. The United States policy pretends that it is. Eventually, if the world is to be made really safe, these regional organizations will cease to be a luxury, but a necessity.
 The second dilemma confronting the United States policy at the Pan-American conference is one of principle. In this association we proclaim our purpose to be a defense of freedom, resistance to totalitarianism. Yet inside this regional association we have soon rather choice dictators, and it takes a rather bland talent for us to be able to talk about defending freedom with governments which are conspicuously deny freedom of various kinds to their own American hemisphere citizens. In our quest for hemispheric unity, we feel compelled to tolerate things we would denounce if we were speaking our national mind freely. Our strategic toleration of unpleasant details of freedom among our neighbors helps prolong and buttress the regimes responsible for such details of freedom, even while we organize in defense of freedom.
 "These are the two troublesome undertones in our Pan-American association. There are many things on the plus side. Even our toleration of things we don't like constitutes a civilized advance beyond the venge when we did try to dictate to our neighbors. Our partnership by example, to which we are now largely limited, is certain to be more effective for good, in the long run, than attempted leadership by pressure or compulsion. As we grow in our capacity to respect our neighbors for their own cultures, instead of rating them merely by our own values, we find our neighbors growing in willing capacity for cooperation with us.
 And if a regional association is theoretically good, it still may be somewhat true that practice of cooperation and mutual respect in a regional atmosphere is in itself preparation and groundwork conditioning for that wider and stronger cooperation which must eventually feature the United Nations itself.
 This hemispheric association, with its handicaps and opportunities, is going to have to be lived and worked through. The important thing is that as a whole, member grow in its capacity to regard it as an association of equals.
 The Realm For Infallibility
 It is one of our pieces of good fortune that our fallibilities locate themselves in relatively unimportant spheres, such as war and peace, and the outcome of elections, leaving us a really grand concentration of accuracy and presence in the things that really matter.
 Thus, last Thursday, we wrote that the snow then falling would melt away and be followed, within a few hours, by the music of spring. And it was late Friday afternoon when, from the low places, the first peepers cried their throats, found the air mellow, and launched a chorus which kept the whole evening bright with song.
 We won't say how we knew this would be so, but we suggest, ourselves, that we actually knew nothing at all, but merely hoped, from a great need for some overt greeting from spring. We suggest that our prediction was not so much a prediction, as it was a desperate refusal to countenance any more of winter.
 Whatever it was, it was so powerful that it frustrated all the weatherman's predictions for the week, so that the chorus from the low places continued even when Sunday afternoon, we climbed to

the high place where the clanking blades of the arbutus were almost ready to show color.

 A gubernatorial presence which is dedicated to an emphasis on dignity and accomplishment rather than like political badinage or propaganda froth cannot afford any light open touch.
 But, although we haven't the slightest way of knowing whether Governor John D. Ahearn realized that he was venturing into straight Gilbert & Sullivan when he adopted the "Yankee," creating a scene which, in many respects, would put most professional Statesmen to shame, we suspect that even though forewarned, he would nevertheless repeat the decision and the scene, whatever the danger involved.
 The dangers involved, as some gentle wit about the state and the Capitol were quick to sense, are dangers of contrast between the mood and atmosphere the Governor's office is trying to create for itself in its every day conduct, on the one hand, and such an overt theatrical gesture on the other.
 It's all right—in fact it's fine to have the Governor's office staff itself with dignified and dignified. But it wouldn't make too much sense to keep on holding such qualities of atmosphere, if they were going to be squandered away again on light and airy extravaganzas. All Must Take Loyalty Oath
 Firemen and Police Included in Civilian Defense, Ruling Declares
 All of Manchester's police and firemen will have to take the Civilian Defense loyalty oath which is administered to civil defense workers, regardless of whether the police and firemen may have taken oaths when they assumed the duties of their present positions, according to a recent ruling by State Attorney General George C. Conroy.
 The ruling dealt with the question of whether it is mandatory for individuals who are employed by the State or municipalities, such as regular police and firemen, to take the oath. The attorney general pointed out that these employees are practically a part of the civilian defense organization, since they "will be engaged in a considerable degree in the organization."
 All Must Take the Oath
 All auxiliary police and firemen in the local civilian defense organization have already taken the loyalty oath, and some of the regulars have also. All other regular firemen are engaged to take the oath as soon as possible. There are 80

men in the Manchester Fire department and 155 men in the M.P.D. The ruling concludes that "it is our opinion that it is mandatory for individuals who are employed by the state or municipalities on steady duty, and who will be engaged to a considerable degree in the civilian defense organization, notwithstanding the fact that many of these individuals have taken an oath at the time they assumed the duties of their present positions."

The Purpose in Korea
 Washington's consternation over General MacArthur's now famous statement becomes a little more understandable today, if now develops that just before the MacArthur statement calling upon the Communists to admit defeat in Korea and meet for a military truce was issued, the United States government had handed to the governments of the thirteen nations which have proposals for a future policy in Korea.
 This official proposal of the United States government, submitted to the other thirteen nations for their study and for subsequent discussion, had just reached these other governments when the MacArthur statement was issued. So these other nations were confronted with a dilemma. What was United States policy? Was it represented by the official memorandum of the United States government? Or was it represented by the statement of General MacArthur? Who is the government of the United States? The constituted office at Washington? Or a general in Tokyo?
 That poses the dramatic clash which has apparently caused the Joint Chiefs of Staff at Washington to send General MacArthur an order, instructing him to clear all future statements of a political nature with Washington.
 Meanwhile, if there is consternation at Washington over this conflict of authority, there is a certain dismay at Lake Success, where the great question is one of whether or not this new angle in American policy is going to produce the very world war United Nations action in Korea was designed to prevent.
 The British representative at Lake Success said yesterday that the present situation needs to be referred to the highest levels of western diplomacy, to get it settled in a manner no one could misunderstand.
 And the representative of France expressed, again, the principle General MacArthur's statement and the dangerous resultant action in American policy threaten to abandon and destroy.
 "The one purpose of the United Nations when entering into that Korean action," said France's representative, "has been to resist aggression, not to win a war."
 That is the whole issue. If that purpose is not clearly established, and the course of action which is harmonious with it followed, we are going to convert Korea from an accomplishment for peace into the breeding ground of world war. And if that happens, the blame will not be solely upon General MacArthur, for so boldly asserting his own views but also upon the leadership at Washington, including that of President Truman and Secretary Acheson, which does not dare do better than authorize on such a crucial decision. MacArthur at least does not straddle his issue. We think he is strong, but at least he is a little backbone in Washington too.

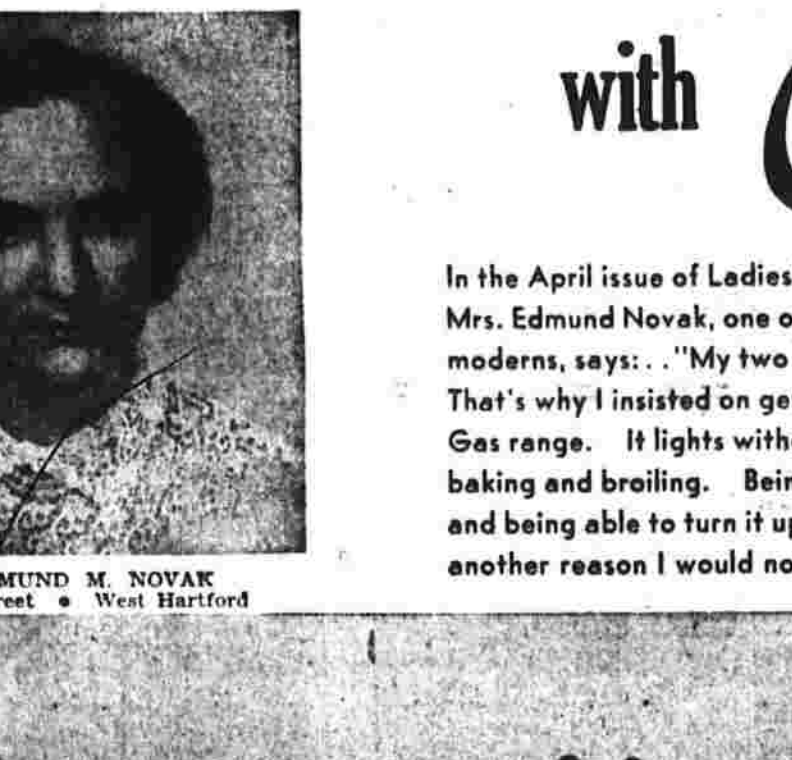

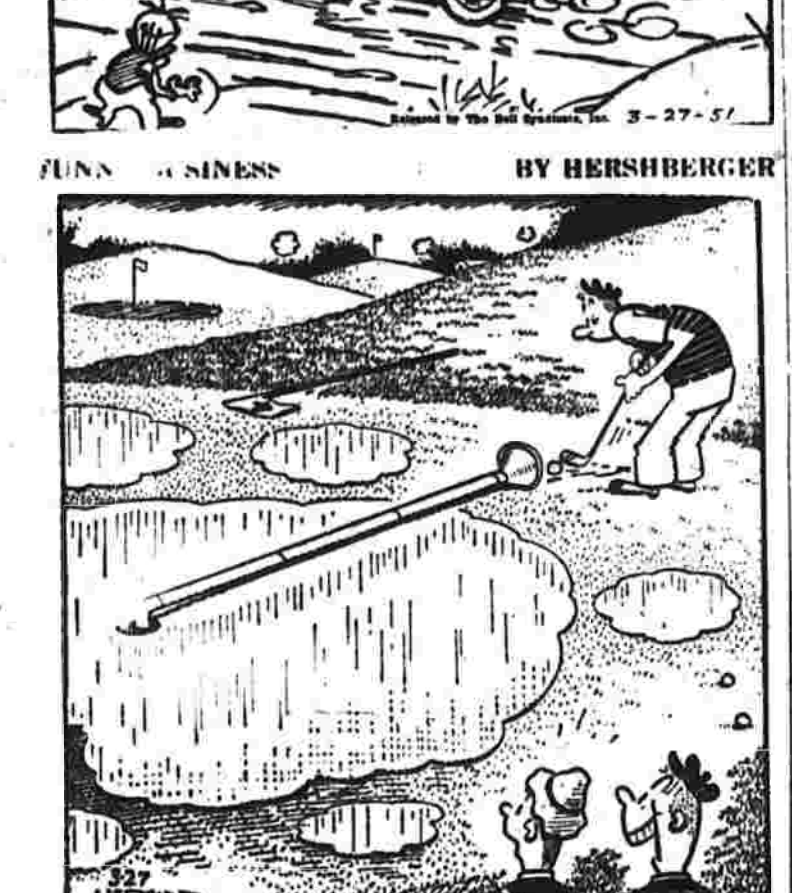
