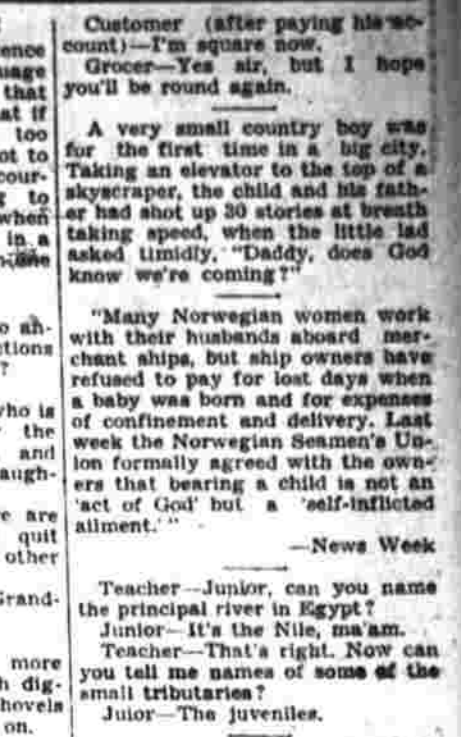

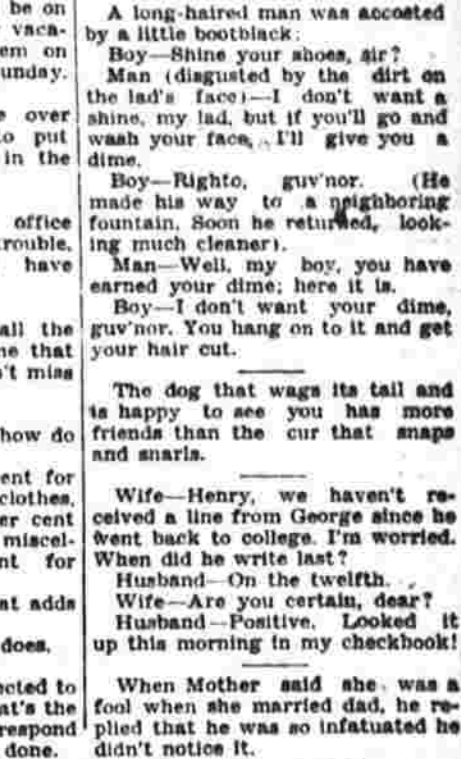

40,000 Textile Workers Walk Out in South

Reive Says Union Is In Position to Stand Long Strike in Five States for More Pay

Charlotte, N. C., April 2.—(AP)—Pickets swarmed outside mill gates today as a reported 40,000 CIO textile workers in five southern states pressed a strike for higher pay.

Management and union sources disagreed as to the effectiveness of the strike in cotton and rayon plants.

Owners of a number of plants halted operations without an effort to stay in production. Others opened the mills as usual and worked with curtailed crews.

Meanwhile, the vast majority of the South's booming textile industry spun busily forward. There are about 425,000 cotton-rayon workers in the South but only about 90,000 are members of the TWUA.

Emile Reive, president of the Textile Workers Union of America, set up strike headquarters at Greensboro, N. C.

"The union is in position to stand a long strike," he asserted. "But we are hopeful we won't have to stand a long strike."

Wire Service Called Major U. S. Enemy

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—Chairman Kefauver (D., Tenn.) of the Senate Crime investigating committee has named the Continental Press, a racing news wire service, as "Public Enemy No. 1."

Kefauver said legislation to put Continental out of business will be the committee's most important recommendation.

Interviewed on NBC's "Meet the Press" television program yesterday, Kefauver said also that, knowing what he now knows, he wouldn't vote in the Senate for confirmation of New York's former mayor, William O'Dwyer, as ambassador to Mexico.

The Senate approved O'Dwyer's nomination to be ambassador by a 42 to 22 vote Sept. 10, 1949.

A firemen's organization official has testified he gave O'Dwyer \$10,000 during the 1948 political campaign.

Senator Hunt (D., Wyo.), a member of the Kefauver committee, said last night the group has received 20,000 letters and telegrams urging continuance of its probe.

Kefauver told a reporter he is studying the possibility of a dual curb on crime by a citizens committee and a watchdog Senate committee.

However, he added that he didn't believe his group should "go on being a policeman."

"In any continuation of our hearings, we can't be anything else but policemen," he said.

There is a larger role in encouraging the revival of local efforts against crime."

Kefauver said in a radio interview last night that one of the main things the probe disclosed is that "this is not only a moral question but an economic one affecting the costs of food, clothing, and other things people have to buy."

Snyder Asks Fast Action On First Round Tax Jump

Secretary of Treasury Asks 10 Billion Boost, Claims 'Second Round' Can Be Postponed Until Next Year, Cites Vast Improvement in Budget Setup; Sees Surplus, No Deficit

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder today called for prompt action on the administration's \$10,000,000,000, "first round" tax increase proposal, but said a "second round" boost can be postponed until next year in view of a vastly improved budget situation.

Revealing new official budget estimates, Snyder told the House Ways and Means committee that: 1. This fiscal year, which ends next June 30, should produce a surplus of about \$3,000,000,000 in contrast with the \$2,700,000,000 deficit President Truman forecast in January.

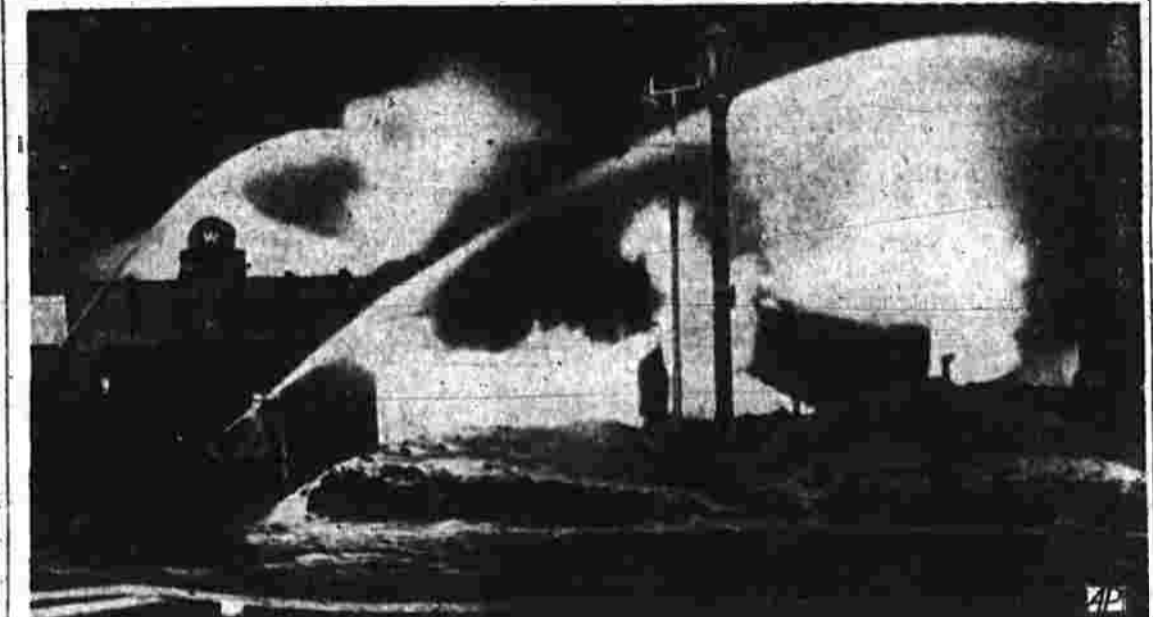
2. Tax revenues next fiscal year, which starts July 1, should be about \$3,000,000,000 above the January forecast, indicating that the previous deficit prediction of \$18,500,000,000 will be more than \$13,500,000,000.

Differs With Administration It was this extraordinary improvement which prompted the Treasury secretary to abandon the administration's earlier demand for a second round \$6,500,000,000 tax hike in 1951.

Snyder declared: "The prudent course now is the prompt enactment of the tax rate

Shopping Center Reduced to Shambles, Loss May Run 1 1/2 Millions

St. Paul, Minn., April 2.—(AP)—Fire and explosions reduced a sprawling shopping center to shambles yesterday. Two persons were hurt.

Damage estimates ran as high as \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000, making the blaze St. Paul's costliest.

Ralph Stacker, one of the owners of the Highland village shopping center, said the loss might reach nearly \$2,000,000.

Nine of the seventeen business places in the block-sized center, were heaps of rubble after the blaze.

Firemen said flames apparently broke out in a supermarket about 2 a. m. (e.s.t.) and spread throughout most of the "L" shaped center.

Shortly after the blaze had engulfed a drug store, an explosion ripped it apart.

Harold Shapiro, 46, was blown across a street and under a parked car by the blast. He was only dazed, Joseph Drexel, district fire chief, was caught under rubble and suffered cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Shapiro, who was across a street from the drug store, was cut by flying glass.

Cause of the fire had not been immediately determined.

San Jose, Costa Rica, April 2.—(AP)—A bomb exploded in a theater here last night, spreading momentary panic among the audience.

The incident followed by 24 hours the announcement by President Otilio Ulate Blanco that four persons involved in recent bombings in San Jose had been arrested and a plot against the government was quashed.

Police checked the members of the theater audience one by one as they emerged after the evening's performance, which had been resumed after an intermission.

President Ulate's announcement Saturday described the plotters as a group seeking to import guns and arms from Mexico for a rising in favor of former President Rafael Calderon Guardia.

The newspaper La Tribuna, which supports Calderon Guardia, printed a paid advertisement yesterday in which Prospero Guardia denied any connection with a plot.

VA to Start Dividend Pay

Eight Million Vets of World War II to Get Funds from Insurance

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—The Veterans Administration is making last-minute preparations to start paying a \$685,000,000 life insurance dividend to some 8,000,000 World War II veterans.

Spokesmen said the data for the start of payments has not yet been determined. However, vouchers for the first checks are expected to go to the Treasury department within a few days.

Initial payments in this round of dividends will be on National Service Life Insurance policies having anniversary dates last January. Others will be paid roughly in the order of their anniversary dates, with a lag of two or three months because of the bookkeeping involved.

The formula for paying the dividends is a complex one, the rates taking up about 300 printed pages. The forthcoming dividend covers three years, from 1946 through the 1951 anniversary. An earlier dividend, paid last year, was for the period from the start of the National Service Life Insurance program in October, 1940, through 1948.

That distribution totaled \$2,800,000,000, and applied to more than 16,000,000 policies. The forthcoming dividend, like the first one, is exempt from the income tax.

Auriol Gives Russia 5-Point Peace Plan

Tells Congress France Must Stand or Whole World, Civilization Will Be in Danger

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—President Vincent Auriol of France told Congress today that if his country falls before the forces of aggression "the whole world, indeed civilization itself, will be in mortal danger."

Addressing a special Senate-House session, he said to prevent such a disaster the West must have its defense strategy on "shielding" western Europe against attack.

The alternative, he said, is to "liberate" Europe, which may once more be occupied, enslaved, exploited and ravaged and whose name, you may be sure, would only recall the final ruin of a civilization."

Auriol's speech climaxed a formal six-day state visit here as guest of President Truman.

In his final appearance here, Auriol cautioned America's legislators of the dangers of "uncoordinated diplomacy and strategy."

The West must stand together, he said, building regional defense pacts "to deter aggression and strengthen the peace."

Auriol specifically mentioned only the 12-nation North Atlantic Pact and did not elaborate on his reference to possible additional "pacts."

Auriol laid down this five point "peace" program for Russia to accept if it wants to end the East-West tension:

- 1. Respect for commitments
