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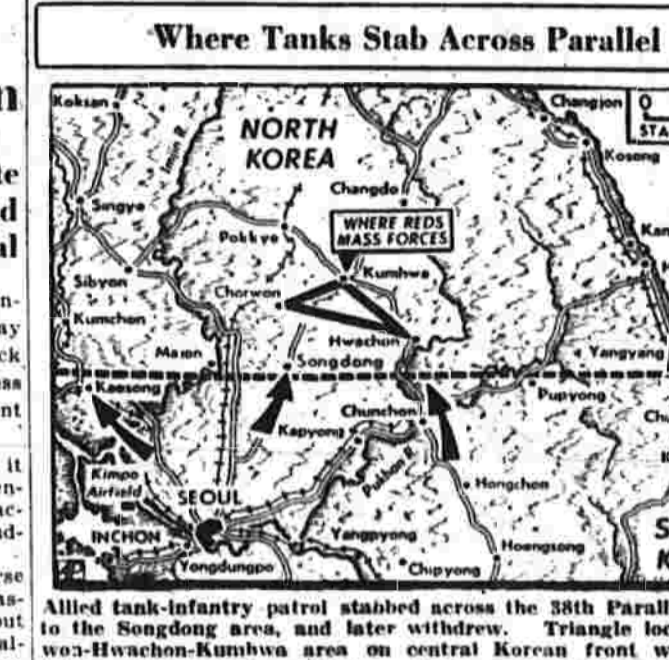

OPS Lifts Price Curbs For Hospitals, Schools

Washington, April 3.—The government removed from price control today the fees and other charges made for services by hospitals and educational institutions.

The big part of the drop—\$410,000,000 of it—has centered in debt for installment plan buying. Government controls have been in effect since last September.

Installation plan debt, down in February for the second straight month, has shrunk to \$18,000,000, about the same level as prevailed shortly before credit curbs were applied last fall.

Says U. S. Has Peace Threat

Harry Bridges Blasts Truman Regime, Korea War, Marshall Plan

San Francisco, April 8.—Harry Bridges, Australian-born Communist agitator, defiantly charges the United States government is a threat to world peace.

The controversial labor leader made his charge Monday at the opening session of his International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union convention.

Bridges has appealed the federal five-year sentence he got on conviction of falsely swearing he never was a Communist. He said he was convicted from the CIA on charges that it follows the Communist party line.

He said the attitude of the United States government is a threat to much of the world as the greatest threat to world peace.

Denounced the Korea war as a needless slaughter, noted the Chinese Red "war" against the United States and pointed to the standing of its troops in Korea by pointing to our Monroe Doctrine.

Amplified the Marshall aid program, the Defense Production Act of 1950 and the National Security Act, which he said is a "deliberate attempt to Americanize our country under which questions and criticisms of American policy from the ordinary people become grounds for Red-baiting and charges of treason, espionage and sabotage."

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Cancer Cases Control Seen

Number Increasing But Disabling Factor Is Now Said Decreasing

Cancer cases in Connecticut are increasing, but the state's cancer control program is helping to minimize the length of time a patient is disabled and maximize his chance of recovery, says Charles Wilder, research associate of the Connecticut State Department of Health.

In the current issue of the Connecticut Health Bulletin, Mr. Wilder points out that cancer is found with an increasing number of people in the state living longer.

Over half of the state's 3800 cancer cases are now diagnosed in 1948 were 35 years or older.

To date, there is no known preventable cause of cancer.

However, Connecticut's four-point cancer control program of education of the general public and the medical profession; early detection of the disease; adequate treatment; and follow-up, is reducing the seriousness of the situation, according to Mr. Wilder.

He points out that "with each of the four parts of the cancer control program working smoothly and continuously, cancer becomes less of a problem than formerly."

The education and detection parts of the program are aimed at finding cases at an early stage of the disease. The best available methods of treatment are instituted to maximize the chances of recovery. The best available information to those engaged in scientific cancer research.

That the Connecticut cancer control program is successful can be demonstrated by the fact that more Connecticut people with cancer are being diagnosed at an earlier stage, and the female death rate from cancer shows a declining trend.
