In 1916 she managed the famous suffrage parade in Chicago and later got the first suffrage plank in a Republican national platform. She has been active in the League of Women Voters since its birth and is a former vice president of the National Board and a former president of the League of Women Voters of New London. Interested in World Peace, Mrs. Morrison has been a member of the League of Nations and served the League of Nations at work and was present at the signing of the Kellogg Pact in Paris in 1928. She has attended many conferences on international affairs. At present she is a member of the International Relations Committee of the League of Women Voters of Connecticut and a trustee of the Connecticut College for Women.

This was some six hours after the union, the Textile Workers Union of America (CIO), said the man was being questioned by union officials at the TWU hall.

Washington, April 17.—The Railway Express agency has a government authority to add a new 20-cent charge on virtually all its shipments of less than carload size.
