Health Dept. On Full Time

Town Calls Public Meeting to Discuss Subject On May 1st

Manchester may set up a full time health department, thereby doubling its present aggregate \$23,000 health services expenditure. The Board of Directors has called a public hearing for May 1 to discuss the possibility of a full time health department and to determine the balance of the fiscal year which would cost about \$18,000 per year.

The approximate public health combined services now on a part time basis figure at \$1,200 per capita. Under the new arrangement, the bill would be \$1,200 per year.

Long under consideration the setting up of a full time health bureau in Manchester has been under consideration here for a long time and under various proposed arrangements. Several years ago an area health department was forwarded for consideration under a plan sponsored by the State Board of Health.

The area plan would have included several nearby towns in a health district. Manchester's officials turned this down on the basis that town would be paying a highly disproportionate share of the area costs.

Then, more recently, it was proposed that Manchester combine its several part time and school medical care facilities and establish a full time health department. At present the various health activities here expend some \$24,000 yearly.

At the time the subject was raised some months ago, the Board of Directors asked General Manager Washelli to bring in a budget for a full time department with a trained public health officer at its head. This was done, and the cost of a setup of this sort is found to be about \$48,000 a year.

Complication also developed in trained health officers available. They were being taken up by the military forces and by towns and cities which, paying for special training of the candidates, held an option on their services.

Rockville Resume Work In Rockville

About 400 Are Back on Jobs as Mills Reopen To Finish Goods

Rockville, April 19.—(Special)—Textile workers of the Rockville Mills returned to work yesterday. About 1200 went out on strike February 8 and only around 400 returned to work.

It was explained that the 800 had found other employment and try work in the mills, finishing up materials that were being produced when the strike occurred last month. Most have secured jobs elsewhere.

M. J. Stevens and Sons, Company, owners of the mill, plan to sell their properties and properties they have been looking over the plant.

Five of the mills reopened yesterday with one shift. George T. Coleman, office manager of the company, said the company expects to run two shifts in some departments to finish up work in progress when the strike started. Jobs were returned according to seniority and some workers who had joined the strike were temporarily laid off. It was estimated that the work will be completed in the week or so.
