In the State Town Is 5th Down the List; The Costs Elsewhere

Manchester's general relief costs rank considerably lower than most Connecticut towns of similar population, according to a review of the state costs prepared by the Research Division of the Public Welfare Commission...

This state per capita average relief cost was \$7.75 for the past year, while Manchester stood at \$2.84.

Other towns in the population group which includes Manchester are New London \$6.16, Norwich \$5.24 and Middletown \$3.35, all much higher than Manchester.

The figures represent actual expenditures within municipal limits before any reimbursements from state funds or repayment from other towns.

In this section, Vermont's cost was \$2.30 per capita, Gloucester \$1.24 and Andover 50 cents.

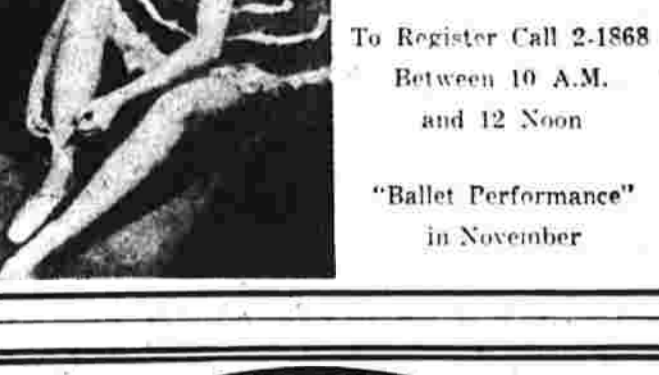
