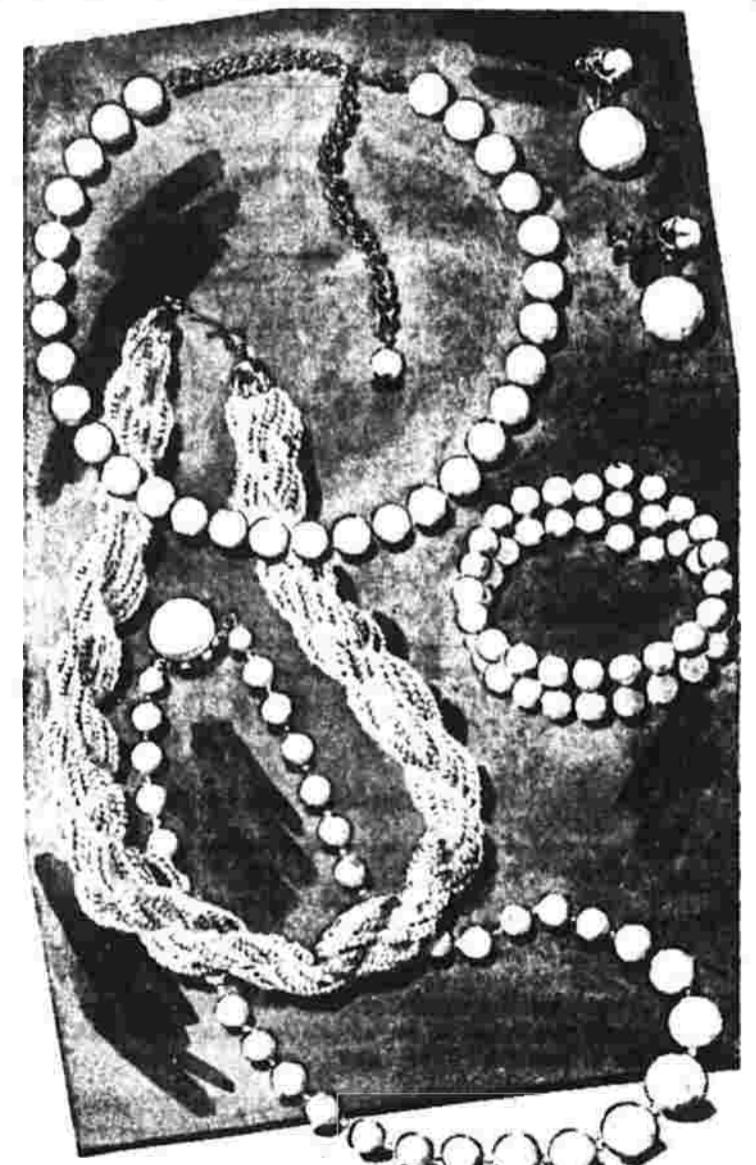

and now they foresee us producing ourselves straight into a bust.

"We will have a stockpile of arms so ample and so large that an aggressor anywhere will count ten before he speaks and then bite his tongue before he speaks at all.

Signs of the new inflationary pressures already are visible, Johnston said.

That's why we must continue to strengthen the dam against inflation.

Senator Robertson (D-Va.), a member of the Senate Banking committee which framed the Defense Production act, said in another speech in committee.

Halt Growth Of Polio Germ

(Continued from Page One)
was the so-called "lansting" strain, one of the several known types of the virus.
They said the chemical inhibited growth of the germ by interfering with a complex chain of chemical reactions which place within tissue cells where the virus itself, but prevents the virus from getting substances necessary for its growth and multiplication.
They said the technique for growing polio virus in a test tube culture of human tissue is in use throughout the country and is itself an important development in polio research.
They pointed out that prior to four years, polio virus research was restricted to studying the growth of the virus in animals, such as monkeys.
They said that other researchers have grown polio virus in such test tube cultures of human tissue, but, to their knowledge, there has been no report of inhibiting such growth with a chemical without destroying the tissue itself.
The research, part of a large project at the university, was sponsored by grants from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Hits at Slowness of Report by Group Given Job of Coverage Study And Makes Proposal

Highly critical of what he terms the "lack of attention to business" of a committee of local insurance agents appointed to study the town's insurance problems and the disposition of town insurance business, Director John Lappen last night expressed himself as opposed to the whole present procedure.

Lappen said he has personally benefited in getting town business done in the "slowness" of the study committee. He brought in his recommendations. But the public interest isn't being served, Lappen said.

In a measure which has drawn the immediate criticism of the insurance agents in town, Lappen proposed that all of the town's insurance on public buildings and its health insurance be put to one agent.

The proposal was similar to one Lappen made when the insurance proportions came up for consideration over a year ago and which then was voted upon.

Asserting that the Lappen move is "strictly personal, political maneuvering," Edgar Clarke, secretary of the Manchester insurance agents' study organization, stated he would judge the division of local business among agents as "all the other agents," Clarke said that other agents with whom he had discussed the Lappen move "are flabbergasted."

The history of the difference of opinion over insurance coverage has been several years. There has been at least one agent should "grab" the town's insurance coverage, as equally as possible among the agents. Sometimes the division was based on the business activity of the agents with part-time agents not deeply in the picture, sometimes there were charges of favoritism. Growth of the town and increasing numbers of active agents finally brought the question to a head some months ago when the insurance agents association proposed a study of the problem, followed by a formula division of the business on a rotating, equitable basis.

It appears that there is for the town, no great price advantage since rates are set for the whole insurance industry and are generally applicable.

This at least has been the general contention of the majority of the local agents.

The agents therefore suggested that from their number a committee

of five be selected to set up and handle the working of the overall town insurance plan. It was further suggested that on the basis of the number of employees the business be set out into two groups, the one 25 per cent of the town's business, and the other 25 per cent. All of the agents would equally share in the 25 per cent division. In addition, however, because of the greater public good involved, would each get five per cent of the 25 per cent portion.

Further, it was provided that this five-man committee should be a rotating one, with one member going out each year and a new man coming on. Thus, it was held, every agent eventually would get the full benefits of the plan.

Lappen previously objected to the study committee, but he has not been serving the best interests of the town. He thought that one man should have all of the business.

Strained feelings have developed over the issue, and last night at a late hour, Director Lappen presented his memo on the situation which terminated with a resolution that one man get the business. This measure was tabled.

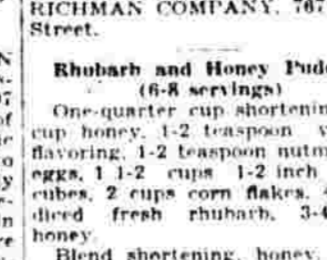

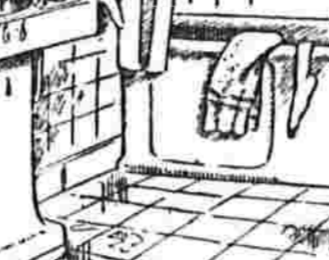

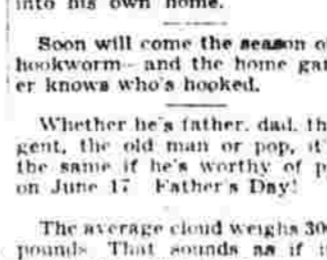

Since he was never allowed to carry this out, MacArthur said he "assumes" the Joint Chiefs were overruled by President Truman or Secretary of Defense Marshall.

MacArthur told Senators in testimony behind closed doors that the Joint Chiefs had presented to the Secretary of Defense on that date the exact recommendations he made to Congress April 19 for prosecution of the Korean War.

MacArthur said he understood his views were fully shared in the past by the chiefs of staff from the military standpoint.

The Defense department later issued a statement saying the Joint Chiefs had authorized the President to carry out his commands was unanimously approved by his principal military and civilian advisers.

MacArthur testified to the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations committees. They are making an inquiry into his dismissal and into Far Eastern policy.

Israel, Syria Renew Battle on Frontier

Jewish Military Claims 20 Syrians Killed In Fight; Forces Swap Artillery and Mortar Fire

Tel Aviv, Israel, May 3—(AP)—of Lake Galilee between the Israelis and Syrian forces battled again today in the tense frontier zone north of the Sea of Galilee. This was reported by an Israeli military spokesman who claimed Israeli troops killed more than 20 Syrians in driving them out of the disputed area yesterday.

He said that some 100 armed Israeli troops attacked Arab forces in the demilitarized zone yesterday and four Israelis were killed and several wounded. Inhabitants of the region returned Israeli gunfire, he said, and forced the Israeli troops to withdraw. In the exchange of fire two Arab were wounded.
