## Rumors of Differences Over Town Insurance

General Manager Waddell Gives His Views On Action of the Local Agents' Association

Rumors of differences between the town insurance committee of local agent members of the Manchester Insurance Agents' Association and General Manager George Waddell were heard today as an interest was aroused over the manner in which the public insurance business will be appointed. An attempt, made directly by the insurance committee, to appeal to local public approval work was rejected by the General Manager, it was stated today.

Asked this morning if the insurance committee had sought to take direct action, Waddell said this was so and that he did not feel it was the proper procedure. He said he so informed the committee. Waddell indicated he did not object to the attempt at explanation but he considered the committee should have communicated through his office. Left with general Manager originally it was left with the General Manager to arrange for the details of an appraisal and the Hartford firm of Bliss and Cole was retained. Due to reasons which it is expected will be explained at a special meeting next Tuesday night, the appraisal was not finished until just recently. The General Manager has reported from time to time on his inability to get the firm to act, and the local insurance committee finally decided to take a try at it. Waddell holds that since the hiring of the firm was done through his office, negotiations should also be carried on there.

This is the first of several attending propositions that promise a hot Tuesday session. Lappen's Statement While the Insurance Agents' Committee may not make formal reply until Tuesday to the statement of Director John Lappen, printed in The Herald last night, Director Melvin Hathaway today issued a statement in which he questions the legality of Lappen's interest in the situation. Director Lappen himself an agent, has proposed that one agency handle the town's business, retaining 35 per cent of commissions for his work, the remainder being divided among all the agents on a point system basis. The committee plan, on the other hand, would let a five-man group of local agents handle the direct business, with commissions divided on a 25-75 per cent basis. All qualified agents including the committee would share in the 75 per cent, and the committee members, in addition, would each get another 5 per cent. The committee plan would be a rotating one, with one member going on each year and a new agent going on. Thus, under this plan, eventually all agents would share in the full percentage splits.

Director Lappen is accused by Director Hathaway of making a direct raid on the public business with assurance from General Manager George H. Waddell that if it is left to the general manager, Lappen's agency will get the account. Hathaway further challenges Lappen's right to "dual benefits" as a director and an agent under the town charter. The question is touchy all around and appears to have crossed party lines and became largely an issue of personality and merit. A Democrat, Director Walter Mahoney, second the plan of Director Lappen, a Republican, at last Tuesday's directors' meeting. A Republican, Director J. J. Crowley, in the insurance business, is understood to be ready to renounce his personal interest in division of the town insurance business.

Another statement heard today was to the effect that if the charter doesn't bar public officials dealing with or soliciting business directly from the town, it had better be changed to do so or Manchester will get insurance directors, lumber directors, sand and gravel directors and others whose main interests will be personal rather than public. Into this picture, it has been indicated, will eventually come a legal opinion from Town Counsel


