Also winning parliamentary membership were the Free Democrats, 12 seats; Centrists, four; German Empire party, three; and German Social party, one.
It was not yet clear today what sort of coalition might be formed to set up a new state government.
The Socialist Reich leaders gleefully acclaimed their showing as a triumph and immediately began talking of extending their power into other states.
They selected to spearhead their expansion drive Otto Ernst Remer, who was promoted to major general by Hitler for his decisive role in crushing the anti-Hitler revolt on July 20, 1944.

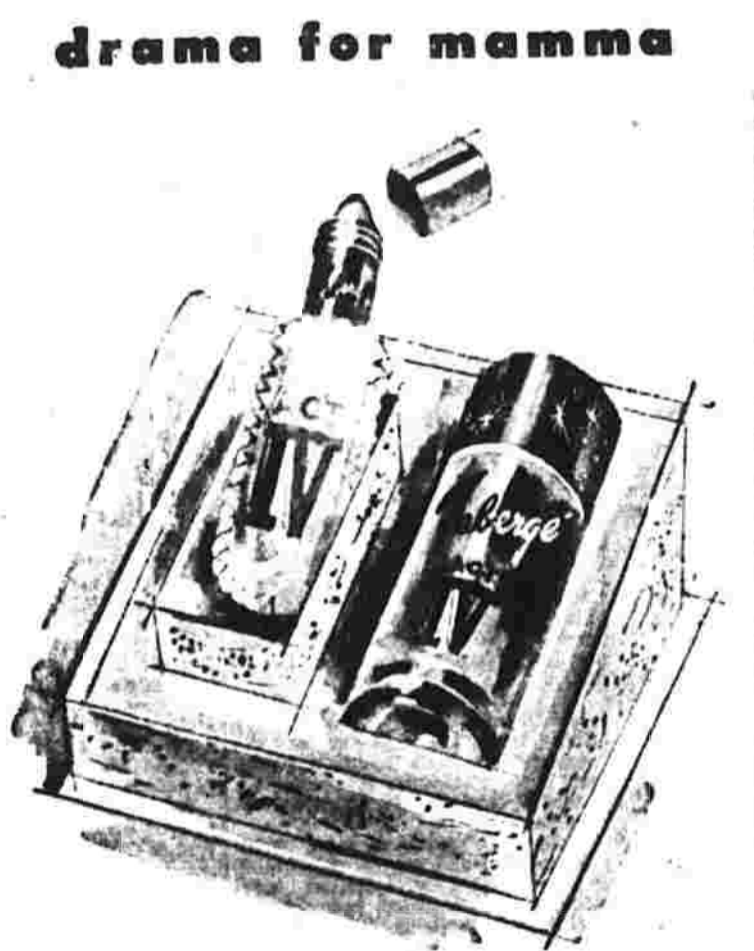

Charge Favoritism In U. S. Tax Plan

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—Senate Banking committee members renewed charges today that big business is being shown favoritism in the government's defense tax program. The program is designed to speed up expansion of defense industry by permitting a five-year amortization for tax purposes of the cost of constructing new plants. A bigger chunk of the cost, this can be taken from profits. The committee, opening the second day of hearings on extension of and revision of the Defense Production act which expires June 30, questioned Manly Fleischmann, administrator of the National Production authority. Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) charged that applications from big companies and other large corporations were granted with "supernatural speed" while small firms "rode on a bicycle." Chairman Maybank (D-S.C.) questioned, also, whether the tax benefits were being concentrated in a few highly industrialized sections. Douglas added the suggestion that the government "set no stopping-place on the total volume of tax-amortization certificates to be granted. Fleischmann, who made it clear at the outset that he had no authority over amortization policy, protested nevertheless that all companies were being treated fairly. The processing of industry's applications is his job. While Fleischmann was before the Senate group, the House Banking committee opened similar hearings on extension of wage-price controls.

Truman Raps Mac Far East Policy as Leading to "Death Blow" Atomic Attacks on U. S. Cities

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—President Truman sought to convince his countrymen last night that Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Korean war proposals might provoke another world war and "death blow" atomic attacks on America's great cities. Today he observes his 67th birthday and the sixth anniversary of his proclamation of victory over Nazi Germany awaiting reaction to his declaration of the Korean war. The first comment from Republican Senators was that in the effect they will be shown. Rep. John Kee, 77, Victim of Heart Attack

Chairman of House Foreign Affairs Group Was In Routine Hearing, In House Since 1933

Washington, May 8.—Rep. John Kee, 77-year-old chairman of the House Foreign Affairs committee, died today of a heart attack. He collapsed during a routine session of the committee and was pronounced dead by Dr. George W. Calver, Capitol physician. Kee had been ill for some time and only recently returned from the nearby Bethesda Naval hospital. He had been a member of the House since 1933. He became chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee in March, 1949, following the death of the late Rep. Sol Bloom (D-N.Y.). Bloom, like Kee, collapsed at a committee meeting. He died several days later. Kee was born in Greenville, Va., on August 22, 1874. He represented West Virginia's Fifth Congressional district and lived in Bluefield in the extreme southern part of the state.
