The attack of "constitutionalists" which Governor John Davis Lodge suffered rather early in the session apparently had a strong force immunity effect. More recently, the Governor seems, by contrast, to have been suffering from a brusque lack of concern for the legal soundness of the measure he signed into law.

In the following days, the military news from Korea has told of "furious Allied advances," of new attacks, of continued loss of prisoners about the "38th parallel" toward the prepared lines of the Communists. In other words, it would seem that having ended our "pursuit" in an official pronouncement, we are still pursuing in fact.

Conceding that both the world diplomats and generals are new at conducting a world police action, it still seems to us that they ought to be able to realize that there is no advantage in keeping their goal to "keep a secret." If they have really decided how far they intend to go, it seems to us they should announce that fact, let the United Nations soldiers and the United Nations public know what the goal is—and let the enemy know it too. It goes back to our old bromide—that if you want to satisfy of things, the thing to do is to limit it.

"It is said that you can obtain a free beer any night in the week except Sunday. In some of these establishments, for the mere signing of a petition, since the extension would, if successful, extend the sale of intoxicating beverages to Sunday as well, the free beer flows for a purpose.

We doubt that the forces which believe in keeping Manchester's Sabbath free of at least one of the "leaky modern" infringements on the spirit and character of the seventh day, have any enticement as momentarily pleasant and stimulating. As we have laid their argument, it is pretty dry stuff."

In these certain establishments, as you drink your free beer before signing the petition, you will also be greeted with placards urging your attendance at the public hearing to be conducted on the issue of Sunday sales for Manchester, at Vershlock school next Monday night, June 11th. Your patronage will be excused, for this one night, as a part of the noble effort to add 52 new nights a year to your quaffing opportunities.

We doubt, as we say that the forces of temperance, the forces which have some lingering respect for the character of the Sabbath Day, can any such inducements to the opposition to Sunday sales, we are sure, is a dull and colorless cause, old-fashioned and stolid. It believes, wastefully, in a Sabbath from which at least one evil is eliminated. It concedes that some people will, no matter what the law is, still drink on Sunday, and drive too, and yet it is quite willing to have Manchester forego the dubious privilege of supplying them. It is not touched with any envy for towns which do make a thriving, if poisonous, business of supplying the Sunday thirst. It doesn't get excited because some drinking dollar may spend its way through town without stopping here.

Yes, it is merely the old-fashioned virtues which are against Sunday sales. They have nothing free to offer. They offer no round of enchanted evenings for Manchester's "Men of Din-tinction."

But we think and hope, that these old-fashioned virtues may prove unexpectedly strong in the showdown the Sunday sale interests seem to be seeking. We think and hope, that a great majority of Manchester people will decide that the sale of liquor is one thing the Manchester Sunday does not need.

In advocating this view, we have nothing free to offer. We merely hope and recommend that all those interested in emphasizing and protecting the decent values of Manchester life will appear and make their own convictions known publicly. In our opinion, our liquor interests have been most ill-advised in raising the issue. But, since they have raised a test of Manchester sentiment, we hope that sentiment is clearly and fully expressed. As for the Herald, it opposes, and will continue to oppose, Sunday sales in Manchester.

U. S. Casualties In Korea Up 925

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—Announced U. S. combat casualties in Korea climbed by 925 last week to a total of 68,352, the Defense Department announced yesterday.

The total, based on notifications to next of kin through June 1, included 10,108 killed, 46,541 wounded and 11,613 missing.

Of the wounded, 1,202 have since died and 103 of the missing are known dead, raising total combat deaths to 11,503. The missing included 1,254 who have since returned to U. S. lines and 121 known prisoners of war, leaving 10,135 currently missing.
