Truman Signs Grain Measure

Provides for 2 Million Tons on Credit to Aid Fight Famine

Washington, June 15 -- (P)-President Truman signed today a sill providing up to 2,000,000 tons of food grain on credit to help In-dia fight off a famine.

In a statement, the President noted that the United States already is sending grain to India at the rate of 250,000 tons a month. The new shipments, he said, will bring the total up to two-thirds of all the food India is buyng from outside "to meet its emer

Mr. Truman's statement was apparently designed to offset Russian sales of much less wheat to India.

Johnson Tells Probers Of Staff Differences With MacArthur on Allied Inchon Landings

Washington, June 15 -- (P)-Louis Johnson testified today that as Secretary of Defense he feared the United States was moving toward recognition of Red China.

Johnson told the Senate's Mac-Arthur inquiry that he "never knew of any decision by the State department, despite the British talk and the British recognition, for us to recognize." Then he added:
