Rockville Voters Adopt Building Code

Considerable Discussion Precedes Action at Rockville Meeting

At a largely attended special town meeting held last evening at the Town Hall, the adoption of a building code for the town was voted.

Herbert Pagani was named chairman of the meeting and Town Clerk Kerwin Elliott read the warning. Following the reading of the first item, a resolution was presented favoring the adoption of the code presented by Robert Marham. Before the matter was voted there was considerable discussion. Fire Chief H. H. Hulse, town engineer and other members of the committee were present.

The Building Inspector for the City of Hartford, explained the manner in which the building code was carried out and brought out the information that it was to protect property owners against fire by night contractors and to provide a safety device and give additional fire protection by fire testing, hazardous construction methods. Town Council Harry Hulse explained that it was the State building code which would be adopted, which had to do with building material and the like and was not to be confused with zoning. Inspector Fisher informed the voters it would cover barns and chicken coops or other structures where there was electricity.

The second item was to take action upon a proposed agreement with the state relative to further construction on the Wilbur Cross Highway, the transfer of maintenance of certain roads from the State to the Town and town to state. A representative from the State Highway department stated that four overlays are to be built in connection with the four mile road, at Dalton Avenue, Turn Bolton and Banforth roads over the Wilbur Cross highway. He stated that while the original plan was to abandon all of old routes 10 to the Town, the State had now agreed to care for the section from Hartford road to the Tolland Lane. The second item was also voted.

The item to sell to Maxwell M. Belding, Snake Hill road which has been closed for a long period of time was voted without discussion, as was the final item authorizing the Board of Education to appropriate the sum of \$58,500 to be used as specified.

Wider Tours For Margaret?
When President Conant of Harvard told graduates there is every day to expect peace in their world, I thought he was being rather careless with his prestige as a prognosticator. Not many people put themselves out to keep him nowadays.

But the speech caused us to think a little about what kind of anticipation would be best for us and for the world. If we could choose, and our thinking was stimulated again, a day or two later, by a travel schedule new to us in the New York Times.

This news story said that Margaret Truman's tour abroad was having a healthy effect on a large European tourist business. People who had been holding back from vacations in Europe because of their fear that war might be imminent have been changing their minds on the assumption that if the President lets Margaret go traipsing about the continent, the "inside dope" must be that there isn't going to be any war immediately.

Here, apparently, a number of people are changing their expectations with regard to war and peace simply because one headline female is making a tour of Europe. Actually, Margaret's journey has absolutely nothing to do with the chances of war or peace. All it does illustrate is the comparative ease with which the mood of the world might be shifted toward what President Conant recommended.

Suppose we could then, decide to expect peace rather than war. Would that be a good thing to do? The first consideration that comes to mind, of course, is a risk—the risk that, in such complacency, we might let our preoccupation guard down in the world, the risk that we might relax into a state of mental and physical softness which would make us easy prey to an unrelenting enemy. Strangely enough, although this is the typical worry of many orators and writers of the day, we do not share their concern. We think that military strength and preparedness are causes which do very well for themselves—perhaps too well for themselves, at some times. If such a thing could be imagined, we are not worried about this nation's strength in the world. The Russians, we think, are the only ones who are really worried about that.

The second question is that of how important mental attitudes and atmospheres are in the affairs of the world. Do we help produce war or peace by thinking war or peace? Is our expectation in itself something in the nature of a prediction which has force of its own? When we expect war do we make war less or more likely? If we should act as if we expected peace, would we diminish the chance the real chance of peace?

We happen to think there is a real relation between what people expect and what they get. We think that expectation of a certain thing tends to influence actions in the direction of that thing. We think that the acceptance of a certain thing as inevitable tends to give that thing some inevitability. We think that a world which assumes that it is going to live has a better chance of summing it up as going to die.

We think, therefore, that President Conant is right—that we should expect peace, and behave as if we expected the world to work through its troubles without outside. Perhaps this would be straining the point a bit—but why doesn't Margaret visit all the capitals of Europe?

On The Stump

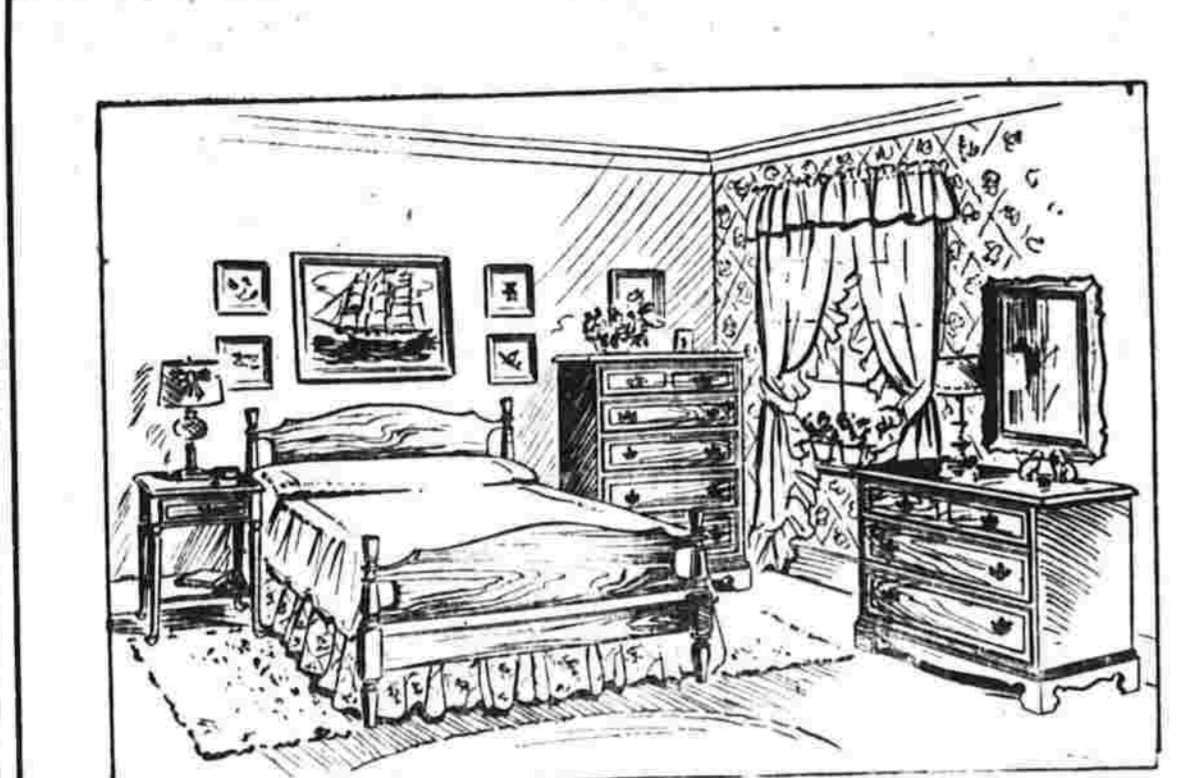

Perhaps An Empty Victory

Both Senate and House committees have now voted to prohibit the rollbacks in beef prices scheduled by price stabilization authorities. This means, if Congress follows the lead of its committees, that the recent adjustment of coming prices on beef, which in many cases resulted in an increase—will stand without the eventual reduction for which the new adjustment was supposed to be preparation.

Perhaps, beyond showing once again the redoubtable power which the most lobby perennially possesses at Washington, the decision is academic. Present indications are that the nation's housewives are holding to a course which will enable them to set their own price on beef. The shorter strike in the meat industry seems to have broken with a new flood of cattle to slaughter. Even during the period when scarcity might have been felt beef went begging for buyers. If the nation's housewives hold to their instinctive policy—which is simply not to pay prices they know they cannot afford—the meat industry in the end might be pleased indeed to get the prices the Washington stabilizers would arrive at after their two scheduled rollbacks.
