Phone System Speeds Alert

New Warning Plan in Event of Emergency Is Adopted

Precious minutes will be logged off the time it will take for an Air Force "alert" to be transmitted to the 160 Connecticut towns and cities in the event of an attack or emergency, as the result of a new warning system developed by the telephone company.

The new system will take a warning from the Air Defense Control Center on Long Island to be sent to all civil defense control centers in the state by a series of chain telephone calls over a private-line telephone network functioning out from key-points.

The warning is then relayed to local fire and police, business and industry, hospitals, public works and radio stations, police and water agencies as well as to public and private schools, which usually consist of a number of areas.

Under the new system a signal light apparatus with a large dial will be used to transmit the warning signal. A single twist of the dial, "White" or "Yellow," will send out a series of electrical pulses which will be received simultaneously at all local civil defense centers where receiving equipment will flash a red, white or yellow light and code a bell for the degree of alert.

The local control point will then operate a similar system to alert the various points within the community. The alert will be sounded over the entire state as the warning code.

The various color signals indicate the degree of alert as already described by the Federal Civil Defense Administration. "Red" for imminent attack and "White" for all clear. "Yellow" is a conditional signal for limited reception which indicates that an air attack might take place in the near future.

Already approved by the Federal Civil Defense Administration, the new warning system is expected to be adopted nationwide as the standard method of alerting the country in the event of an emergency.

The equipment was perfected at the Bell Telephone Laboratories, the Bell System's research center. The Western Electric Company, supply and manufacturing unit for the Bell System, will produce the equipment in mass quantities for delivery early in the fall.

New Insurance For Disabled

Hartford, June 28—Disabled veterans recently separated from service may be eligible for a new type of Government Life insurance, as a result of the enactment of a law by the House of Representatives.

The new insurance will be available to any person with or without pay as an incident to their military or naval training.

All of these groups may apply for the new insurance within one year from the date that VA finds their disabilities to be service-connected.

Another group also is covered. This group includes those who were disabled on their way to report for induction or for active military service on and after June 27, 1950 and were separated or otherwise released from further military service on and after April 25, 1951. This group may apply for the new insurance within one year from the date that they suffered their disabilities.

All of the foregoing groups may apply for any plan of National Service Life Insurance, term or permanent, with certain differences from the regular NSLI contracts.

For one thing, the new insurance, whether term or permanent, is non-participating; this is to say, no dividends will be paid on it. And, the law stipulates that no waiver may be denied on the grounds that this service-connected disability became total prior to the effective date of such insurance.

Veterans Recently Out Of Service Provided With Special Coverage

With Special Coverage

The present Congress authorized this insurance by Public Law 25, to provide special coverage up to \$10,000 for certain disabled veterans.

Basic requirements are established by law for veterans to qualify for this insurance. They are:

1. The veterans must have been disabled in active service or while in VA compensation status for which VA compensation would be payable if ten per cent or more in degree.

2. VA also must find that, because of these disabilities, the veterans would not be insurable under the good health standards of National Service Life Insurance.

Under these conditions, the law covers many groups who were in active service or special types of service on and after June 27, 1950 and who were separated on and after April 25, 1951. These groups are:

1. Those who served in the active service of Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard.

2. The branches of the armed forces, including the National Guard when called or ordered to active duty or active training duty for fourteen days or more.

3. Cadets and midshipmen at the United States Military, Naval and Coast Guard Academies.

4. Commissioned officers of the

Public Health Service and of the Coast and Geodetic Survey while assigned to certain specified duties.

Reserve components of the armed forces, including the National Guard while engaged in aerial flights in Government-owned or leased aircraft for any period, with or without pay as an incident to their military or naval training.

Under the new system a signal light apparatus with a large dial will be used to transmit the warning signal. A single twist of the dial, "White" or "Yellow," will send out a series of electrical pulses which will be received simultaneously at all local civil defense centers where receiving equipment will flash a red, white or yellow light and code a bell for the degree of alert.

The local control point will then operate a similar system to alert the various points within the community. The alert will be sounded over the entire state as the warning code.

The various color signals indicate the degree of alert as already described by the Federal Civil Defense Administration. "Red" for imminent attack and "White" for all clear. "Yellow" is a conditional signal for limited reception which indicates that an air attack might take place in the near future.

Already approved by the Federal Civil Defense Administration, the new warning system is expected to be adopted nationwide as the standard method of alerting the country in the event of an emergency.

The equipment was perfected at the Bell Telephone Laboratories, the Bell System's research center. The Western Electric Company, supply and manufacturing unit for the Bell System, will produce the equipment in mass quantities for delivery early in the fall.

Grady talked for 90 minutes with Mossadegh, then told reporters that chances for ending Iran's oil crisis "don't look too bright" despite Mossadegh's promise to suspend Anti-Sabotage legislation proposed by the British.

Grady said he would propose to the British that they keep their technicians on the job at Abadan. A British embassy spokesman said employees of the Anglo-Iranian Oil company, which operates the refinery and produces virtually all of Iran's oil, would not be withdrawn so long as the refinery stays open.

Will Not Budge

Grady called suspension of the Iranian Oil company, which has crossed the frontier into Iraq on the admission of the British and American governments, a "red line" that he would not cross.
