Bring In \$8,703

Collections of property taxes for September were \$8,703.44, bringing the total for taxes collected in the fiscal year which began August 15, to \$121,217.70, according to a report submitted by Paul Corvino, collector of revenue, to the general manager today.

The uncollected balance on taxes for previous years is \$74,821.87 while the unpaid balance as of September 30 is \$39,308.94, the report showed.

Water collections amounted to \$10,668.50 for September, increasing the total for the current fiscal year to \$21,188.16 with an uncollected balance from last year of \$18,083.67.

Giant Gold Strike Near Sutter Creek

Jackson, Calif., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Central Shasta Gold Mines today reported its biggest gold strike in more than 10 years near Sutter Creek.

Arthur Kendall, general superintendent and engineer for the mines, said assays showed a gold content valued at from \$400 to \$700 a ton. About \$14 worth a ton is necessary to extract the precious metal profitably.

J. D. Swift, president of the mines, described the strike as the richest since the mines were discovered in 1938 and 1939.

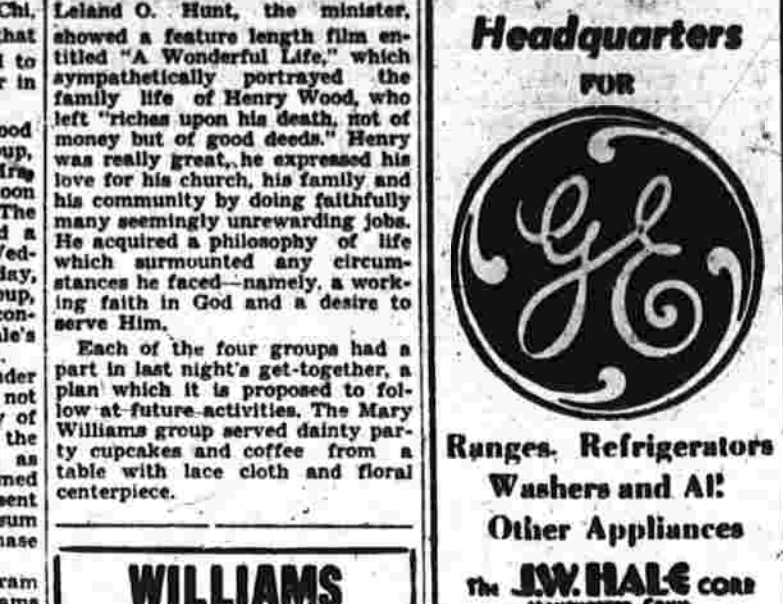
