Dock Strike Grows, May Tie N. Y. Port

New York, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The waterfront strike of dock workers spread today to Staten Island and threatened to tie up the entire port of New York by nightfall.

Police headquarters reported dock work almost at a standstill in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Staten Island. General work stoppage also was reported on the New Jersey waterfront, but the full impact of the strike there was not immediately clear.

Same Two Issues Face New Congress Session

Washington, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The second session of the 81st Congress convening Jan. 8 will face a crowded work docket, topped by two continuing major problems—national defense and how to pay the vast money bills.

In the orderly closing hours of the first session of this Congress, three bills carrying \$13,135,000,000 were sent to the White House. One provided \$7,328,000,000 in foreign aid—military and economic—to bolster friendly nations abroad against Communism. The amount was slightly less than President Truman requested.

London, Oct. 22.—(AP)—British election campaigning moved into the closing stages today, and political forecasts were almost unanimous in predicting victory for the Conservative Party led by Winston Churchill.

Voters go to the polls at 7 a. m. (2 p. m. est. Thursday).

Latest reports today from political commentators all over the United Kingdom, as reported by London newspapers, hold the same story with varying details—a forecast the Conservatives will defeat the Labor party.

Parley May Resume on Wednesday

Munsan, Korea, Tuesday, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Everything was set today to resume Korean truce talks as soon as Red negotiators ratify a security agreement.

Allied and Communist liaison officers completed the pact Monday, detailing ground rules for renewing armistice negotiations after a two-month break. The United Nations command promptly ratified it and called on the Reds to reopen talks "without further delay."

The Reds didn't answer Monday.

The general view is that truce talks would be underway again by Wednesday, at the latest.

Temblors Kill 2 on Formosa

Taipei, Formosa, Tuesday, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Earthquakes, which have killed at least 22 persons and injured 100 or more, shook this Chinese Nationalist island for the second successive day today.

Taipei, Formosa, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Superstitions Chinese popped off thousands of firecrackers tonight trying to appease spirits they blamed for a day-long series of earthquakes.

Britain sent fresh troops into the disputed Suez canal zone and Cairo newspaper said an Egyptian guerrilla movement was forming to drive the Britons out.

Washington, Oct. 22.—(AP)—White House sources said today there is little likelihood of a recess appointment for Gen. Mark W. Clark as United States Ambassador to the Vatican.

Supreme Court to Hear Pleas by Red Lawyers

Washington, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today reversed itself and agreed to hear an appeal by six attorneys who got contempt sentences for their conduct during the New York trial of the 11 Communist party leaders.

They left the States in September. Army engineers gave them battle dress and food for the 126-mile hitch-hike to the Marines' sector.

Call For Special Town Meeting

The legal voters of the Town of Bolton are hereby warned and notified to meet in a special town meeting in the Community Hall in Bolton on the 22nd day of October, 1951, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, for the following purposes:

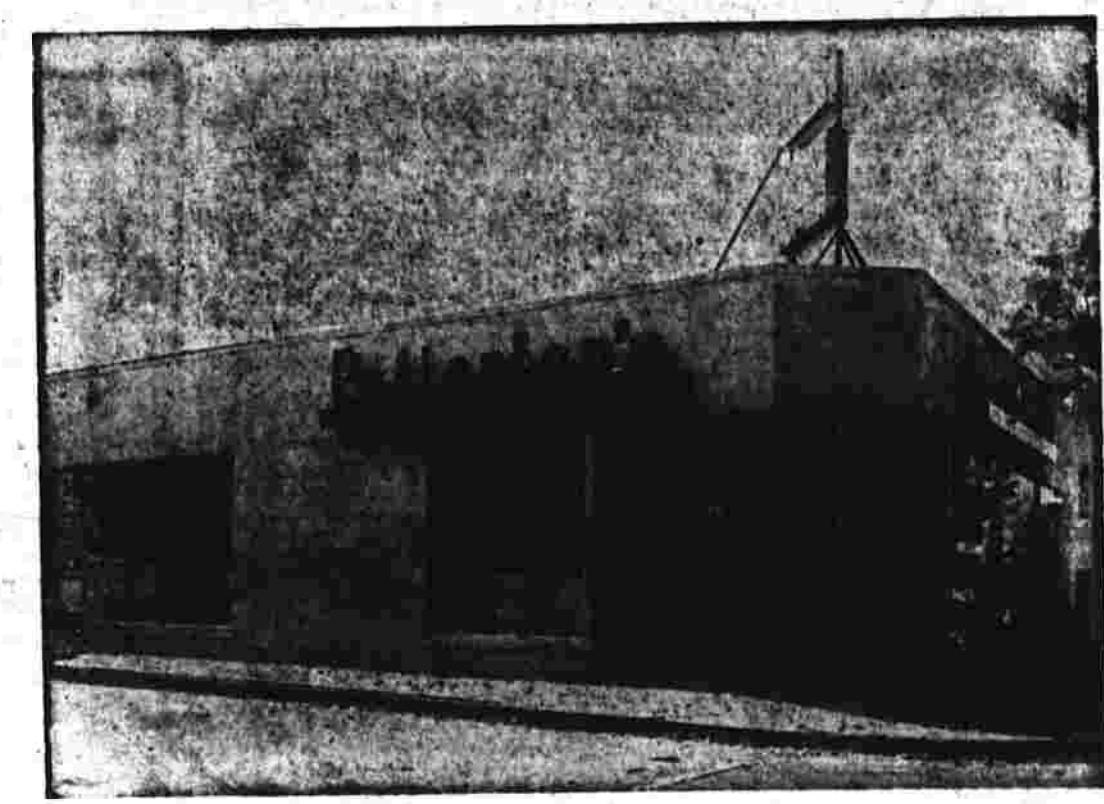
- To see if the Town will accept from the Bolton Hall and Library Association, Inc., the land and building now owned by said Bolton Hall and Library Association, Inc., located at Bolton Center, together with the income from the funds of said association to be applied towards the maintenance of said Community Hall and Library.
- To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred (1200) Dollars for the care and maintenance of the Community Hall and Library for the fiscal period 1951-1952 in the event Item 1 is adopted.
- To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (500) Dollars for the rental of the Community Hall for the fiscal period 1951-1952, in the event Item 1 is rejected.
- To see if the Town will appoint a custodian for the Community Hall and Library at a salary to be determined by the Board of Finance.
- To see if the Town will apply for membership and to participate in the Old Age and Survivors Insurance System under Title II of the Social Security Act, as amended, in accordance with Public Act No. 277 of the 1951 Public Acts as of the 1st day of October, 1951 for all its employees, with the exception of (a) Employees performing any services of an emergency nature while performing such services; (b) All employees performing services in any units or places of elective positions, part-time positions or positions of honor or compensation for which is on a fee basis while performing such services; and the employees excluded by Section 3 of said Public Act No. 277.
- To see if the Town will designate the First Selectman to execute on behalf and in the name of the town any and all agreements with the State Employees' Retirement Commission for the purpose of the regulations promulgated by the State Employees' Retirement Commission pursuant to said Public Act.
- To see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer and authorize him to make deductions from the wages of the employees participating in the aforesaid Old Age and Survivors Insurance System as required by Section 4 of said Public Act No. 277 and to forward the amount thereof together with the contribution of the Town to the State Employees' Retirement Commission in manner and form prescribed by the said regulations.
- To see if the Town will vote to elect members of the Zoning Board of Appeals and fix the terms of office of such members.
- To see if the Town will fix the hourly rate to be paid by the Town to its part-time employees.
- To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed Five Hundred (500) Dollars for the completion of the Town Garage.
- To see if the Town will accept from the Bolton Hall, Books and West's selected and include the same as a part of the Town Road system.
- To transact any other business deemed proper to come before said meeting.

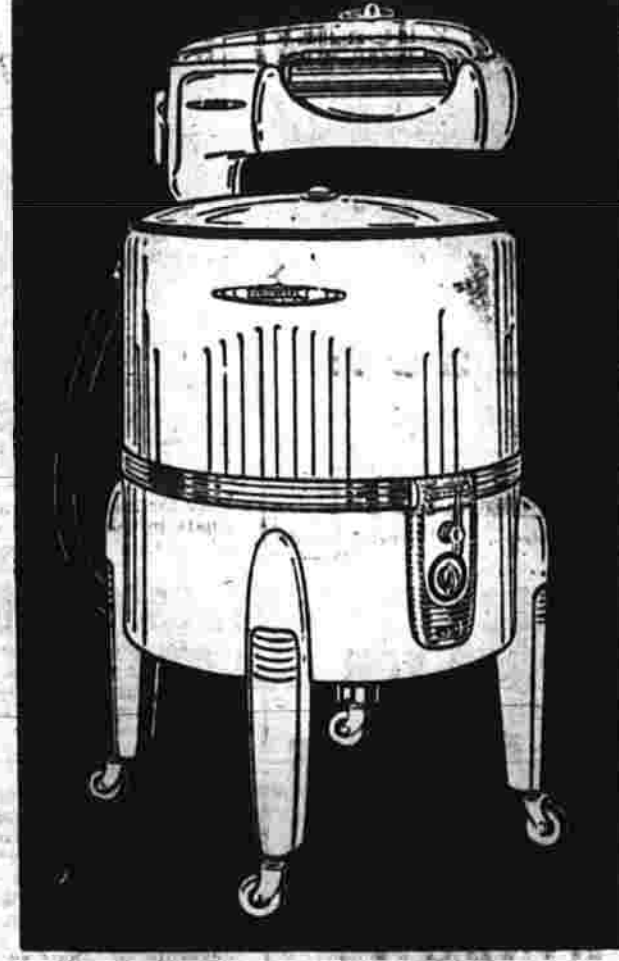

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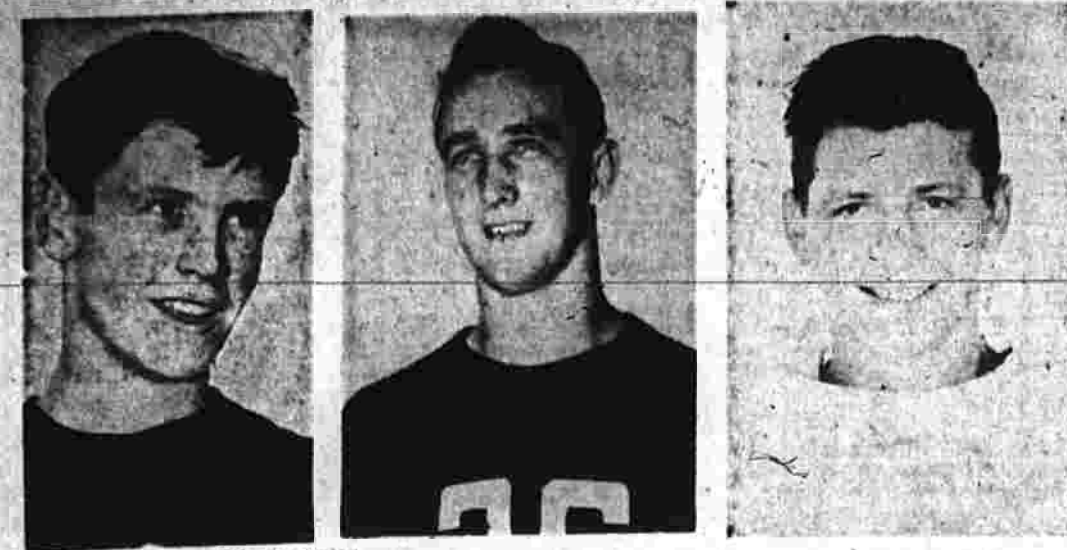

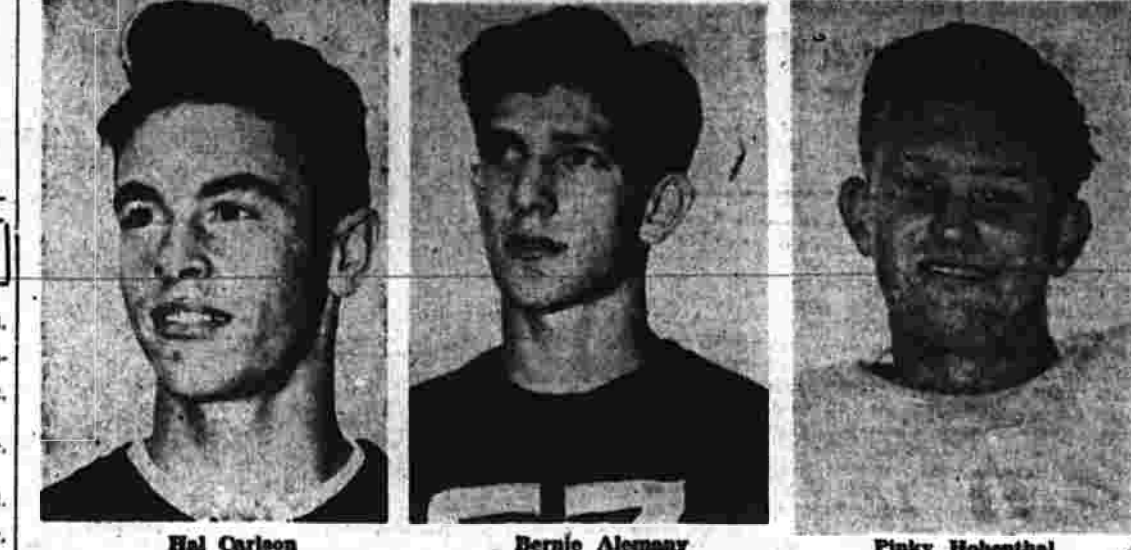

Hilliard Will Is Probated

Leaves \$750,000 to the Hartford Hospital, Art Objects to Museum.

Under the terms of his will, filed in Hartford Probate Court Friday, Elias E. Hilliard, president and treasurer of the E. E. Hilliard Company in Buckland until his retirement in 1941, has left \$750,000 to Hartford Hospital.

A resident of 36 Woodland street, Hartford, Mr. Hilliard was born in Manchester and maintained close ties with this town all his life.

The will provides that the money be turned over to a committee appointed by the Board of Directors of Hartford Hospital for investment, but stipulates that the income derived from the investment cannot be used for 14 years.

Each succeeding year, more of the income may be used under provisions in the will until the total reaches 75 per cent. From that point on, 25 per cent of the income will go back into the fund annually.

According to his will, Mr. Hilliard made these provisions in order to protect the principal and to provide for a continuing increase in the size of the fund.

Other provisions in the will left his large collection of Chinese and Japanese jade, ivory, agate and quartz art objects, all of his paintings, porcelains, glassware, lacquerware and Wedgwood to the Washworth Athenaeum.

The value of this collection, not yet determined, but it is believed large.

To his niece, Alice B. Brown of Haverford, Pa., and his nephew, Lucius H. Barbour of Hartford, he left the remainder of his estate in equal shares.

The Hartford National Bank and Trust Company was named executor of the will.

Mr. Hilliard was a leading contributor to the Hartford Hospital during his lifetime, and donated generously to its building fund several years ago. He was also the donor of \$25,000 to the Manchester Memorial Hospital for laboratories in its new wing.

He had also given a valuable tapestry collection to the Moran Memorial in Hartford.
