Notified of Dad's Funeral Man Loses Money for Trip

Victor J. Herring of 37 Avon street received word yesterday morning from his family in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, that his father had died and that the funeral was Friday.

This, just two months after he had attended the funeral of his mother, in New Glasgow, on August 29.

Since he was traveling by train, he knew he would have to leave almost immediately to be in New Glasgow in time for the funeral.

He left his place of employment, the N. H. Rhodes Co., in Hartford, where he is a toolmaker, and returned to Manchester, where his wife helped him pack.

He also went to the bank to withdraw money for the trip—\$130.

Nervous and distraught by the second funeral trip in two months, he then went to Norman's Variety Store on Hartford road, which is near his home, to buy some magazines to read on the train.

In the store, Mrs. Mildred Martin told him she had selected two magazines and paid for them with a dollar bill. When he put his hand in his pocket, he felt the comfortable bulk of the \$130, folded in his pocket.

Practically he dashed back to Norman's. He searched the few dollars of ground separating the store from his home, but \$130 could not be found.

There was only one other person in the store at the time Herring was in. "But he dashed in and out so fast," Mrs. Martin could not identify him.

It was now 1:30, and his train was scheduled to leave Hartford at 2:30.

He contacted his wife, who hurried down to the bank to withdraw enough money to cover the trip and then drove him into Hartford.

The \$130 represents a big loss to the Herring family and they are offering a reward for its return. Their phone number is 5814.

The Fundamental Intangibles

If, as seems likely to happen, the British Labor Government is voted out of office today, it can probably thank its own preoccupation with those same "creature comforts" which, on its accession to power back in 1945, it considered, perhaps quite accurately, them, to be Britain's greatest need.

The Labor Government has carried forward in material and physical respects—perhaps more than any other government in its history. The British people have better homes, they have healthier food, particularly for their children, and they have more medical care than they have ever had before. They themselves were insistent upon having these things. It was high time they had them. These were things worth missing in their living.

Yet both they and their Labor Government miscalculated if they thought that these things were in themselves all of living. If they thought these things alone could make a happy and satisfied people, there is a surfeit in the creation of the "creature comforts" just as there is a gathering hunger in the prolonged absence of them. The need, when it exists, is urgent. But when it is satisfied, the very satisfaction creates something of a spiritual vacuum in which a new need begins to develop.

There is a need of the mind and spirit just as there is a need of the body. A people living with hopes and aspirations and concepts as much as it lives by bread and medical care. Yet those who concentrate on supplying creature comforts always tend, inevitably, to neglect the other elements of life. They come, in the end, to think they can satisfy a spiritual need or a need of morale or a need for purpose with some new material benefit.

The British Labor Government, for some time now, has been summing its repetitions list of creature comforts in competition with stirring and dramatic world events. When it has a new world crisis to meet, it turns about and proposes some new domestic reform. In these days of war with Russia, "Look," it tells its constituents, "what pink cheeks your children have."

Perhaps the British people will still retain their gratitude for what the Labor Government has done in the past. But it seems to us that the Government's line is about played out, and that the British people are about ready to turn from questions of food and rent and medical care to somewhat larger questions—such as that of whether or not there shall be a Britain, what kind of world these pink-cheeked children shall inhabit, what kind of role British civilization should play in the present world crisis. They may consider Mr. Churchill's talk of the intangible, peace, more alarming than that all Mr. Attlee's calories.

The truth seems to be that, once the Labor Government had run through its gamut of creature comforts, it then became bankrupt. It does not seem to think on other issues. It does not seem to lead on them. It does not seem to have a sense of history. It does not seem alive to those things which made Britain great, even when the common people were ill-housed and ill-fed and often conspicuously lacking in medical care. And Mr. Churchill, who from his personal acquaintance sometimes almost seems to treat such creature comforts issues with disdain, may have struck the new popular note in his contention that not these things, but the intangibles, are the funds of life.

Connecticut Yankee
 By A. H. O.

The press release on the formation of the "Eastern Connecticut Republican Association" tells the official facts concerning that organization and also the real purposes in state Republican life.

The outstanding fact about the new organization is that its temporary president is State Comptroller Fred R. Zeller.

The purpose of the organization is given as "to strive to practice, through its members, the highest type of patriotism; to foster, through inspiration and education, the development of better citizenship by men and women of all ages; to propagate and transmit the principles of the Republican party, as enunciated by its leaders and adopted at party conventions; and to encourage the interest and participation of the finest citizens in the work of the Republican party."

Even that official statement of purpose, contains some gentle hints that some other brands of Republicanism, not Eastern Connecticut in spirit, may not be upholding the desirable ideals of the party.

But such vague and gentle hints are made a little more direct in the accompanying statement from Temporary President Zeller. We quote the press release as follows:

"President Zeller said that the motives of McCarthyism are no more honest than its techniques. These motives are motives of political power, a brand of political power based on ignorance and hate and prejudice and cleverly inflammatory oratory—the same things that totalitarianism come always embolden on its victims. Nor is the aim and the technique so new to us that we are safe from it because of its shocking novelty. Huey Long flourished in the same way, and mastered one state with it, and no one can say safely how far he might have gone with it in the nation as a whole. McCarthyism has launched itself on a national scale from the beginning, and is correspondingly clearly a nationwide problem, all the time."

"It got so big. We got big. Too big."

That somewhat unqualified explanation, on the part of one of the Kentucky basketball players who has now confessed that his team, too, was in the clutch of the professional gamblers, comes close to telling the whole story about the whole nationwide basketball scandal.

These three monosyllabic sentences summarize the whole process of recruiting athletes on scholarships to get bigger and better teams to win higher honors and draw bigger and better cash rewards. And the result has been almost automatic. The athletes recruited into such a scheme of things came to feel that they were playing for money. And money was the great, it was all too easy for them to start grabbing some of it for themselves, when it was offered.

"It got so big. We got big. Too big."

That is how decency and honor and sportsmanship and character and principles have run into tests they could not withstand, in more fields than that of basketball. It is almost the universal modern malady.

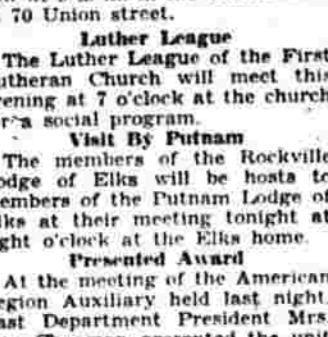

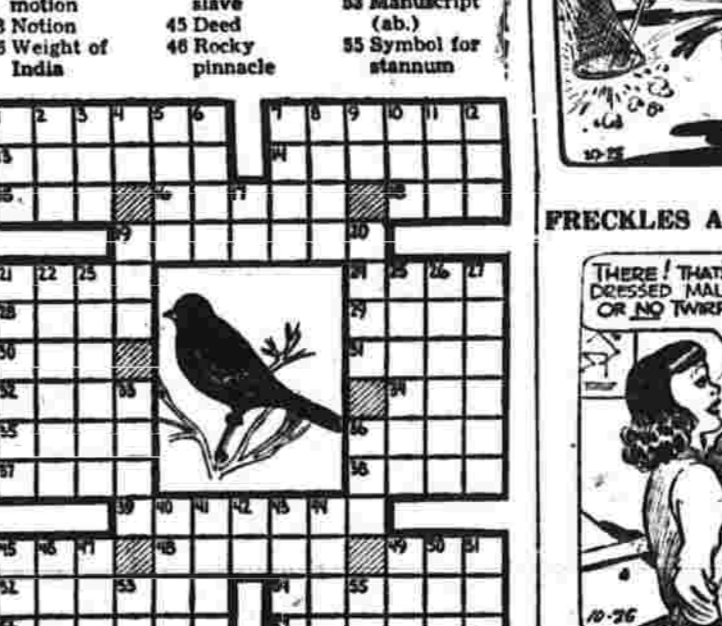

State, OPS Weigh Tax On Smokes

This means that cigarettes bought by retailers at the \$1.79 wholesale price per carton, could not be sold to consumers at less than \$1.86.

Commissioner Connelly has been hoping that the federal OPS would relax its policy toward cigarette prices. He maintains that a 10 per cent margin is "very modest" and not inflationary.
