thing at all. Here again the Communists seem to be agreeing with us, and we seem to be rejecting their agreement. We are accusing them of obstructing the armistice talks, but they seem to be complying with our demands just about as fast as we make them.

What the troops in Korea apparently do not seem to do is not appreciate favorably if they do sense it. It is the fact that our negotiators see themselves holding an advantage and are determined to press it to the utmost. They must be, by this time, fairly certain that the Communists are determined upon truce in Korea at almost any cost. They are, therefore, exacting a United Nations diplomatic and prestige victory from the situation—a victory of a nature which was not believed possible when the truce talks began. They are in no hurry to get the talks over with. They think that the Communists in the hot seat and they like to keep them there. They are necessarily hard-boiled with regard to the additional lives in the field which diplomatic strategy may cost. And so far, it may be conceded, their strategy has worked.

Nevertheless, the longer they avoid taking what they can get in Korea, the greater responsibility they assume for the possibility that negotiations may break down and peace be lost, after all. Wherever their own real bargaining power may be, it is in the troops in the field, and to some of us at home, that they have some major and totally unexpected concessions already in hand.

**Liquor Count Is Dismissed**  
**Gill Charge Is Dropped**  
**When Alleged Truce Is Found Not Guilty**

In what Town Court Judge John G. Rottner believes was the longest trial of its kind on record here, Fred Shea, 56, of 26 Kerry street, was found not guilty on a charge of intoxication Saturday. The verdict, reached at 1:28 p. m. after a trial in which seven defense witnesses and three state witnesses testified, was a dramatic and surprising one.

The defendant's attorney, W. David Keith, had asked the court to dismiss the charge against Shea, who had been arrested at the home of a friend, Stanley S. Gill, 42, of 69-71 North street, owner of a North End restaurant where Shea was arrested Wednesday afternoon on the complaint of a state liquor control inspector.

The verdict hinged on defense attorney Herman Yulet's success in establishing the fact that Shea, who in the opinion of Judge Rottner gives the appearance of being "a hard-drinking man," has characteristics in speech and walk which could be mistaken for the characteristics of an intoxicated person.

In handing down his verdict, Judge Rottner said that Shea's appearance in court—his flushed face and his thick lips—would have left him in the impression that the defendant was intoxicated.

The judge also said that he was particularly impressed with the testimony of Thomas J. Waddell, 18 Horton road, one of the seven defense witnesses called to the stand, all of whom were in the restaurant at the time of the arrest, which stated that the witness had been in the restaurant for about 10 minutes at the time Shea was arrested.

Judge Rottner said he was struck with the similarity between Shea's account of what happened after he had been brought to police headquarters by the arresting patrolman, Milton Stratton, who was at headquarters at the time all of which satisfactorily indicated to Judge Rottner the sobriety of the defendant.

The defendant was arrested Wednesday about 1:30 on the complaint of a liquor control inspector, who was in the restaurant at the time Stanley S. Gill, Jr. who was tending bar, served Shea a second beer. According to Judge Rottner's testimony, the liquor inspector, who suspected Shea was intoxicated, took the beer away from him and asked him to walk a straight line, which he did, although he did not know who Prohibition was.

**Driving The Best Bargain**

It appears from a despatch in the New York Times this morning, that the troops in Korea are somewhat the same impression of the course of the truce negotiations which we have, back home.

"Recent developments in the negotiations at Panmunjom for an armistice in the Korean war," writes the Times Correspondent, George Barrett, "have convinced some troops on the fighting front that their own commanders, for reasons unknown to the troops, are throwing up blocks against an agreement."

"At the same time, the Communist negotiators are being recruited by some confused soldiers in the role of peace-seekers..."

"Most of the circulating proceedings and extensions of argument that have marked the negotiations at Kaesong and Panmunjom are lost on the troops who have to fight the war. The unadvised way that an apparently increasing number of them see the situation right now is that the Communists have made important concessions, while the United Nations Command, they say, it continues to make more and more demands..."

"The United Nations truce team has created the impression that it switches its stand whenever the Communists indicate they might go along with it..."

"A widespread view among the troops is that Kaesong is about as much Communist as Seoul is non-Communist. For many officers and men, in the United Nations demand in this instance is mystifying."

"Unlike Correspondent Barrett, we do not think the attitude of the troops reflects any real inability to follow the details of the truce negotiation. We think it reflects a rather close analysis of these negotiations."

"Take, for instance, the present phase of the negotiations. This phase began when the Communists suddenly made their great major concession, which was that they would accept the battle line as the truce line, instead of the 38th parallel, as they had long insisted."

"No sooner had they done that than, as the soldiers have noted, we insisted that the battle line be altered in one special instance to give us Kaesong."

"This was perhaps merely a delaying and bargaining tactic on our part. It was, in any case, not a demand we could hold to comfortably. So the next thing that happened was that, just as the cease fire line seemed about to be fixed, we proposed that the whole question of the cease fire line be passed until we had taken up the other items on the cease fire agenda. In other words, the moments the Communists yielded, we threw in a new demand of our own."

"Our purpose in this was to prevent the Communists from getting what would amount to a cease fire and a guarantee of a certain truce line before other questions had been determined. This was well considered, even though we had not stipulated any such procedure when we stipulated the agenda for the truce talks."

"But what happened next was that the Communists made a counter-proposal which was actually saying that it accepted our proposition, nevertheless did so in reality. The Communists proposed that the cease fire line be agreed upon now, as of present military conditions, but conceded that military action would have the right to change it, whenever there would have to be a new agreement later on before any cease fire line became final."

"What this amounted to, it seems to us, was acceptance of our own proposal, that the actual cease fire line be left open until the other items on the agenda had been settled. But our negotiators have been attacking the Communist proposal as if it were no such

**A Russian Trade Mission**

No sooner has western diplomacy begun the business of letting Japan stand on its own feet than a Russian trade mission popped up in Tokyo, seeking to negotiate trade relations with Japan.

What do we do about that? Russia, for instance, offers coal at \$10 a ton, while Japan now pays \$20 for American coal.

Furthermore, although Japan is fairly prosperous today, that prosperity is largely based on the large American war orders placed in Japan. Should Japan ever have to go back to a peace-time economy, Japan would need a regular market in either of two places—the mainland of Asia, in Russia, and in China, or the United States.

If we want to stop supporting Japan, as we are doing with dollars and orders of our own, we have to face the fact that the only way we could hope to wean Japan out of its natural commerce with the Asiatic mainland would be to admit more Japanese products into this country, where they would compete with American products on a basis which, American industry has usually held, is sharply unfair to American enterprise. The only method we have for keeping Japan away from its natural customers is to pay heavily ourselves, in one way or the other. And we may not be capable of paying the price, even if we should want to.

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# High completes season with 27-6 conquest Over Windham

## Roach Scores 21 Points to Establish New School Record

### Shifty Fullback Thrills Crowd with Running

Register Three Times, Two Other Gallops Into Pay Dirt Are Killed by Penalties

Jimmy Roach and his Manchester High team clinched the greatest football season in the history of the sport at the school last Saturday afternoon with a convincing 27 to 6 triumph over Windham High at Mt. Nebo. The triumph, registered before approximately 2,000 fans, was the seventh in eight starts for the charges of Coach Walker Briggs and Tony Albino.

Lined Up To Notch

A majority of the fans in attendance came to see the great Roach in action and were pulling for him to break Ray Zemanek's individual school scoring standard for one season. Roach entered the game with 87 points, one less than the record of 88. The 17-year-old fullback didn't disappoint the fine Alumni Day game gathering as he more than lived up to previous game exploits. Needing only 11 points to break the record, he went on to do so with a 27-6 victory over Windham High in the first half of the game. Roach scored three touchdowns in the first half to smash Zemanek's mark and then went on to add 10 points in the second half. He finished with three touchdowns and three successful conversions for a grand total of 108 points. In addition to the three touchdowns he scored, Roach scored on the part of his team.

Scored 17 TDs

The amazing Roach, sought by at least 11 colleges, scored 17 touchdowns during the eight-game season and added six conversions for a 108-point total. He was not stopped in any game, scoring at least once against every opponent in compiling his outstanding scoring mark. When the opposition was the toughest, as in the losing Middletown game, Roach was at his peak. Manchester this year won seven of its eight games. Every rival football coach whose team Manchester defeated this year acclaimed Hurlin Jimmy as the greatest back they ever had. Football officials who were present at the game in which Roach played set his high mark on a dark, rainy afternoon. In between his 14 TDs, the swiftest of all runners kicked a dozen placekicks.
