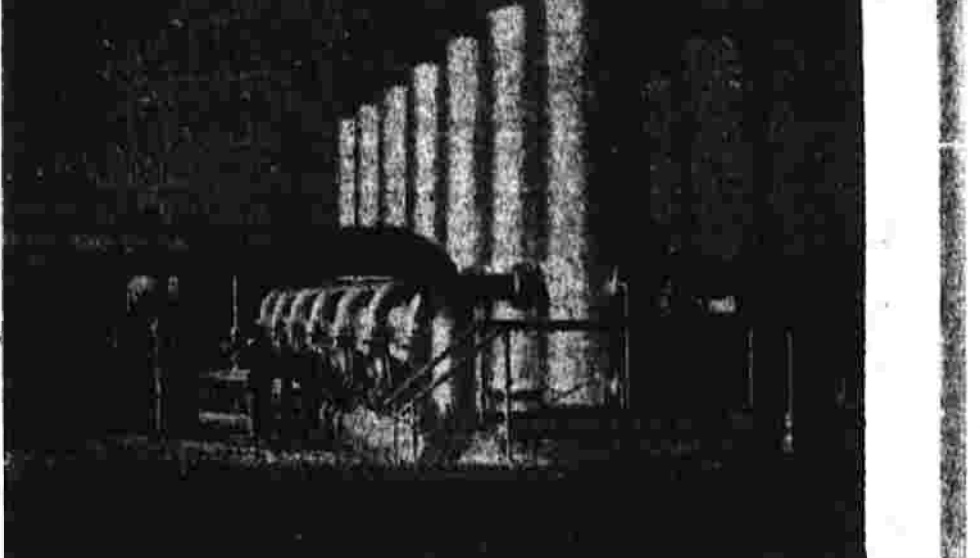

Connecticut Yankee
 By A. H. O.

When we surveyed the town of Bridgeport, we held that it was, despite all claims to the contrary that purely local issues always dominated, an inevitable seeping down of state and national political atmosphere in local elections. We held that a good state Republican atmosphere, and the somewhat unwelcome aroma, which had been thrown about the national Democratic administration, were subtle factors in local voting, leading voters and conviction to the Republicans in the small towns, and cutting into the morale and the appeal of the Democrats. But we said the cities were less sensitive to these top level factors than the small towns, and that the forthcoming November elections would be won by watching to see whether the Republican trend in the small towns would be reflected in the city results too.

But the actual municipal results are such as to outlaw any attempt to establish a trend. In every instance, purely local conditions, records and personalities seemed to dictate the results. When all these factors headed one way together, as they apparently did in Waterbury, with a good record for the administration in power, a popular personality as mayor, the Republican party well unified, and the Democratic organization split and demoralized, the result was a Republican victory which was historically based.

When, in Meriden, another Republican administration, which also seemed good in record and in the personal standing of its mayor, the formula consists of bread and circuses for the people at home and the creation of bogeymen in the outside world. Person draws the people of Meriden toward himself with welfare state boons and drives them with a good record for the administration in power, a popular personality as mayor, the Republican party well unified, and the Democratic organization split and demoralized, the result was a Republican victory which was historically based.

There is no proof that the election had to be actually crooked in order for that result to be guaranteed. Person exists on the formula of peace—his career of public service is coming to Washington in January. Winston Churchill, already committed to one style of diplomatic procedure, will come to talk to President Truman, who is committed to a conflicting style of procedure.

Mr. Churchill, because of his buoyant self-confidence and his confidence in his own style of diplomacy, believes in top level personal diplomacy, and it is that kind of diplomacy he is pledged to seek in a conference with Stalin himself. Mr. Truman, perhaps because of his own sense of inadequacy for the kind of history, perhaps for reasons of principle, is set dead against this kind of diplomacy. Mr. Churchill is obviously willing to go anywhere, quite sure that no concessions of prestige or dignity on his part can really diminish his own standing. Mr. Truman still stands on the somewhat surly statement that he will talk to Stalin if Stalin comes to Washington—something Mr. Truman does not expect Stalin ever to do.

Mr. Churchill believes in getting a few heads of the most powerful states together and having them talk turkey with each other behind closed doors. Mr. Truman, faced with such a prospect, has developed a touching loyalty to the procedures of the United Nations, claiming that it should be honored as the vehicle for any diplomatic procedure between East and West. We may add that, whatever his motive, it is good to see Mr. Truman building up and honoring the United Nations. There was a time, of course, when he ignored it as any real factor in world policy.

So the situation adds up to this: that Mr. Churchill is pledged to one kind of policy, and Mr. Truman to the exactly opposite kind of policy, and that the two are going to confer together in January. What seems likely to happen, then, is some sort of compromise arrangement, in which Mr. Truman keeps himself in Washington while Mr. Churchill serves as a traveling intermediary between Truman and Stalin. It is something of a comfort to the world to have a western statesman in harness wise enough to know that to go seeking peace will increase, not diminish, his own stature. And, assuming there is any sincerity in Russia's desire for peace, the mere prospect of Mr. Churchill's activities should do something to lessen world tensions. If there is big talk ahead, the big war may be at least delayed.

Not In His Character
 We don't often rise to the defense of President Truman, but we think the father of a dead Marine Korean hero was entirely correct in his publicized protest that the President interfered with the kind of citation for the dead son because he, the father, had indulged in some criticism of the President's policies in the Korean war.

In the third place, although Mr. Truman is not without his vindictive qualities, as some of his letters have illustrated, they are at least honestly and directly expressed. He uses the frontal as-

not the behind-the-back attitude. And it would not be in his character, as this nation has seen it, to strike at the memory of a dead Marine. The mere fact that the opinions of the Marine's father, even if he knew about these opinions as he knew about these as he well have been, as the President's secretary suggested, that he was reacting from natural grief and emotion. But as for the reception and exploitation given his charges when they were sent to the front, that is another matter. We are, it must be remembered, getting near the season for political mud-throwing. But Mr. Truman is vulnerable enough to attack with in his own character and performance without being subjected to attacks which do him an obvious injustice. This was not the kind of thing Mr. Truman would do.
