Tehran, Iran, Dec. 6-(AP) -At least three persons were killed and more than 200 injured today in a five-hour battle between 5.000 yelling Communists and 2,000 police and troops backed by angry mobs of Nationalists.

It was the bloodiest violence in Tehran since June. when riots resulted in more than 20 dead. Police and troops got control of the situation early this afternoon

after using tear gas, fire hoses, rifle butts and clubs. At least tw oters were wounded by police sunfire, although most of the poe fired into the air.

A grand jury had accused Dr. Gibson of causing Miss Ayres' death by the "reckless and grossly negligent" administration of drugs. It acted following a coroner's finding which attributed to him these motives: To be free of a woman "madly in love" with him, so that he could marry his nurse, and to get sole control of valuable property he and Miss Ayres held under survivorship
