Manchester residents for the second month in a row topped their blood quota donation yesterday when the Bloodmobile visited town at the Center Congregational Church. The 150-pint quota was met and passed by five. Bloodmobile officials stated, as 135 pints were donated.

The over-subscription of the quota was made possible, officials said, by 60 "walk-ins" who more than made up for the 25 prospective donors who were rejected for one reason or another and 41 persons who failed to keep appointments. Originally, 164 appointments had been scheduled for the afternoon.

### McGrath Admits Helping Ex-Libian

#### Will Cost an Estimated \$163,700 According To Chamber's Report

McGrath admitted he helped the Ex-Libian by getting the reducing machine built and reported: "It was a hairy thing they saw fit to print without bothering to find out the facts. It probably strikes a new low in journalism. I will take care of the Philadelphia Inquirer in due time."

The Attorney General acknowledged receipt of the \$500 campaign gift from Gauda and said, "I must have reported a contribution from him when I reported to the Senate."

McGrath said Gauda and his wife once lived in his 10-room town house in Providence, R. I. He called the Gaudas "probably among our closest and dearest friends for many, many years."

Gauda was interned as an enemy agent early during the war. He was meeting citizenship when, on Jan. 24, 1948, a bill was introduced in Congress to shorten his waiting period.

The bill—sponsored by Sen. Theodore F. Green (D., R.)—McGrath's fellow Senator—failed to pass.

McGrath became Attorney General Aug. 24, 1949. His post includes jurisdiction over the Justice Department's immigration and naturalization service, which handles citizenship matters.

McGrath, here for a speaking engagement, said Gauda "has been a naturalized citizen now for a year or more."

### Issue Permits For 13 Homes

#### Will Cost an Estimated \$163,700 According To Chamber's Report

Permits for 13 new dwellings were issued in November at a combined estimated cost of \$163,700 and six garage permits were issued at an estimated cost of \$5,067, according to a report by Building Inspector David Chambers.

Average cost of the dwellings was \$12,500, the report shows. Total fees collected by the building inspector were \$1,089.50 in November as compared with \$1,685.00 for the preceding month. Dwelling permit fees amounted to \$388 and fees for garages totaled \$12. Alterations and additions fees totaled \$151 on construction estimated at \$31,750.

Among the dwellings was one built by Edward H. Gimney on Boulder road at an estimated cost of \$21,500.

The report also indicates that 10 heating permits, 46 plumbing permits, 47 oil burner permits, and 37 electrical permits were issued during the month with fees totaling \$405.

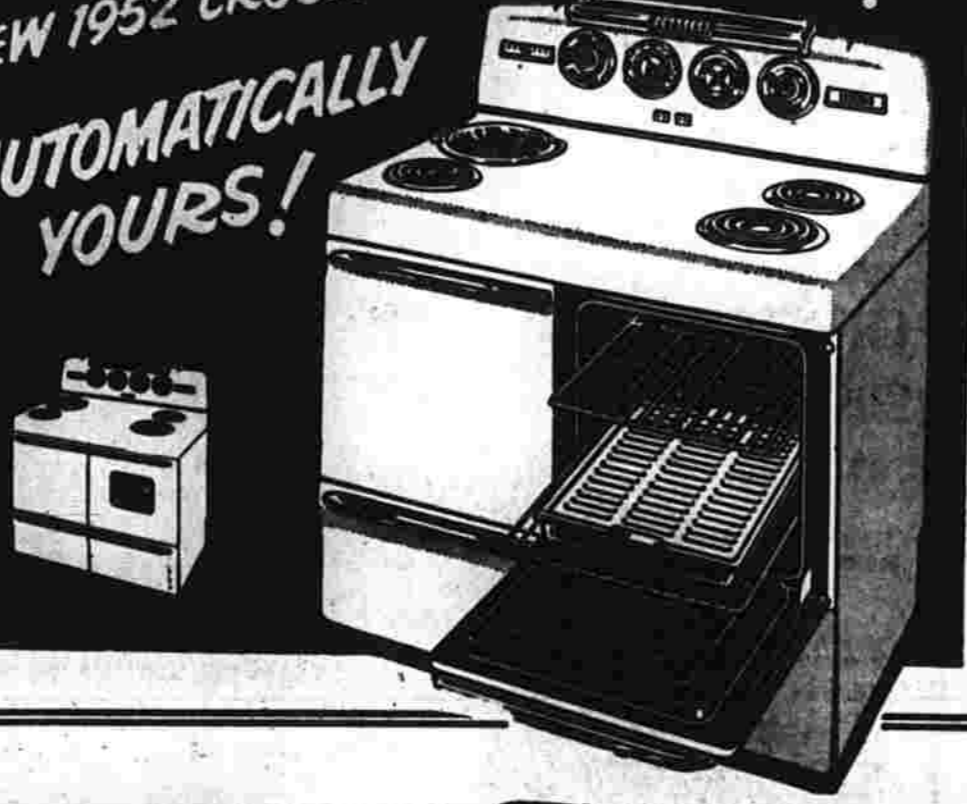

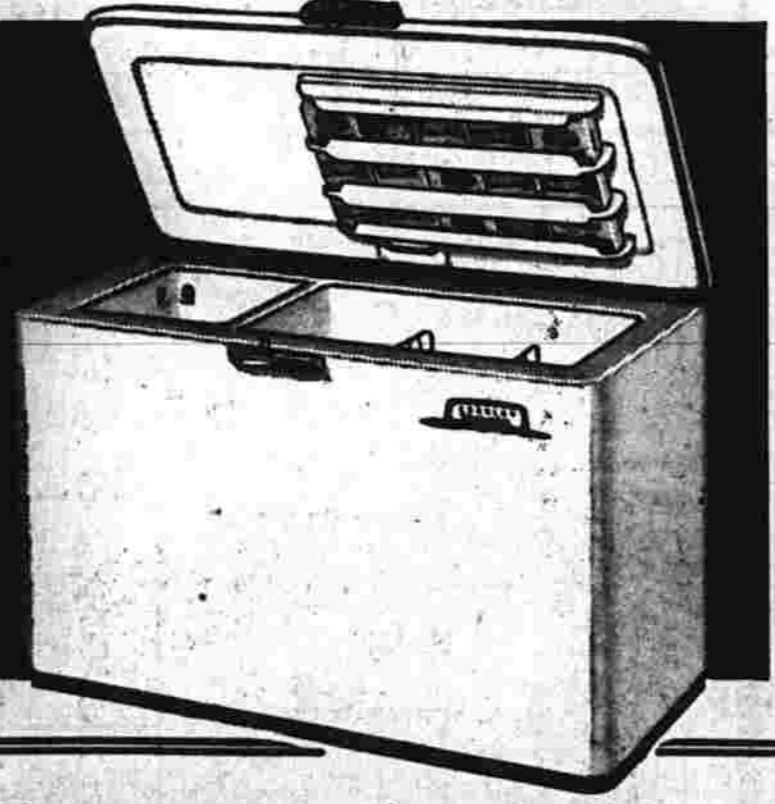

**Blood Donor Program**

Yesterday's visit of the Bloodmobile to Manchester owed its success again to the men and women—40 of them—who "walked the beat" during the past few days, Saturday through next Wednesday, the results of his accession to power were described yesterday. The attitude of Britain now that the champion of European unity heads the British Government in London is more realistic and uncompromising than ever. Prime Minister Churchill seems, in his official policy, more realistically against what Crosser Churchill fought for than ever Mr. Attlee. What is the answer? It is the old answer that there is a difference between being a free agent and being a responsible government official. It is the disappointing answer that private individuals have more freedom to strive for the ideals in which they believe than do public officials. One would assume that Mr. Churchill now believes in the ideal of European unity, and in British participation in that ideal, as much as he did while he himself was openly crusading for it. But one also notes that his sense of public responsibility leads him to hold back, now, on the very policy he himself was advancing only yesterday. When he was out of power, he wanted Britain to do what his intellect told him was right. Now that he is in power, he wants the same embarrasment and the same hindrances Mr. Attlee felt before him. He is now the one who feels the weight of tradition and of relatively narrow interests as compared to the lure of the bold new history he was so willing to write when out of power.

There seems something radically wrong with this, and we think much to have adjusted itself to his standards, but today's news brings the first instance in any one of the Senator's long list of charges against individuals, when they are acting for a national goal forced to follow a different code than that they would follow as individuals. And this has happened, not as such, outside the standards of morality and intelligence which individuals would expect to observe, but as a result of the responsibility for much of the world's ill.

**Slightly Overdrawn**  
 If you have the right connections, it's a very easy, comfortable world at least until the checkbook runs dry.  
 Take for instance, this sequence of events involving an Alabama bank, a lumber company, and a Congressman.  
 The president of the bank was "prominent in church and civic affairs" of his community. One of his bank customers was the president of the lumber company. The lumber company didn't do very well in its business, and overdraw its bank account by the modest sum of \$780,000.  
 This was not something to conceal from the Congressman, if they were sharp and there came a danger, one day, that they might notice something.  
 So the head of the lumber company, who had a contract with the Alabama Congressman to cut timber on his land, had the Congressman take him up to Washington and introduce him to the REP. in the days when it was operated by a five man board. The REP. granted the lumber company an emergency loan of \$450,000. It took only three days for the transaction—and the lumber company then paid back the bank \$300,000 of its overdraft debt. That apparently fixed the situation, temporarily.  
 Just about every step in this process was illegal. Yet it seemed to be working.  
 Unfortunately for the permanent success of their scheme of operation, a Senatorial investigation of the REP. exposed something fishy, and asked the Department of Justice to investigate. So, the other day, the FBI swooped down and arrested the Congressman and the lumber company president, charging them with an embezzlement of \$1,000,000. The bank shortage still existed, but the Congressman's investigation has now agreed with him in this instance, may also be right in the instances in which it dismisses his allegations as baseless.

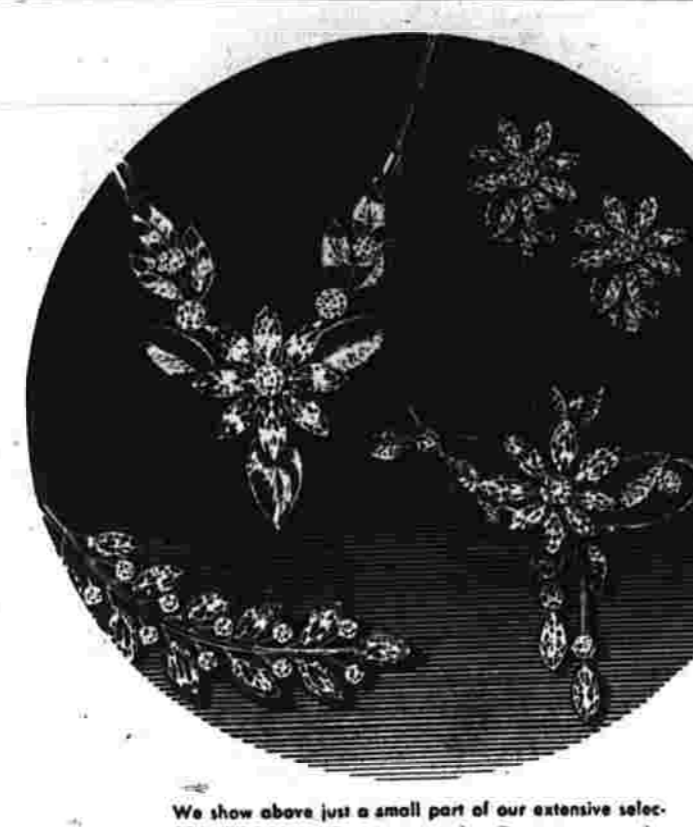
**The Crusader in Power**  
 Winston Churchill's end-of-power chickens are having difficulty trying to find a roosting place in his scheme of things now he is back in power.

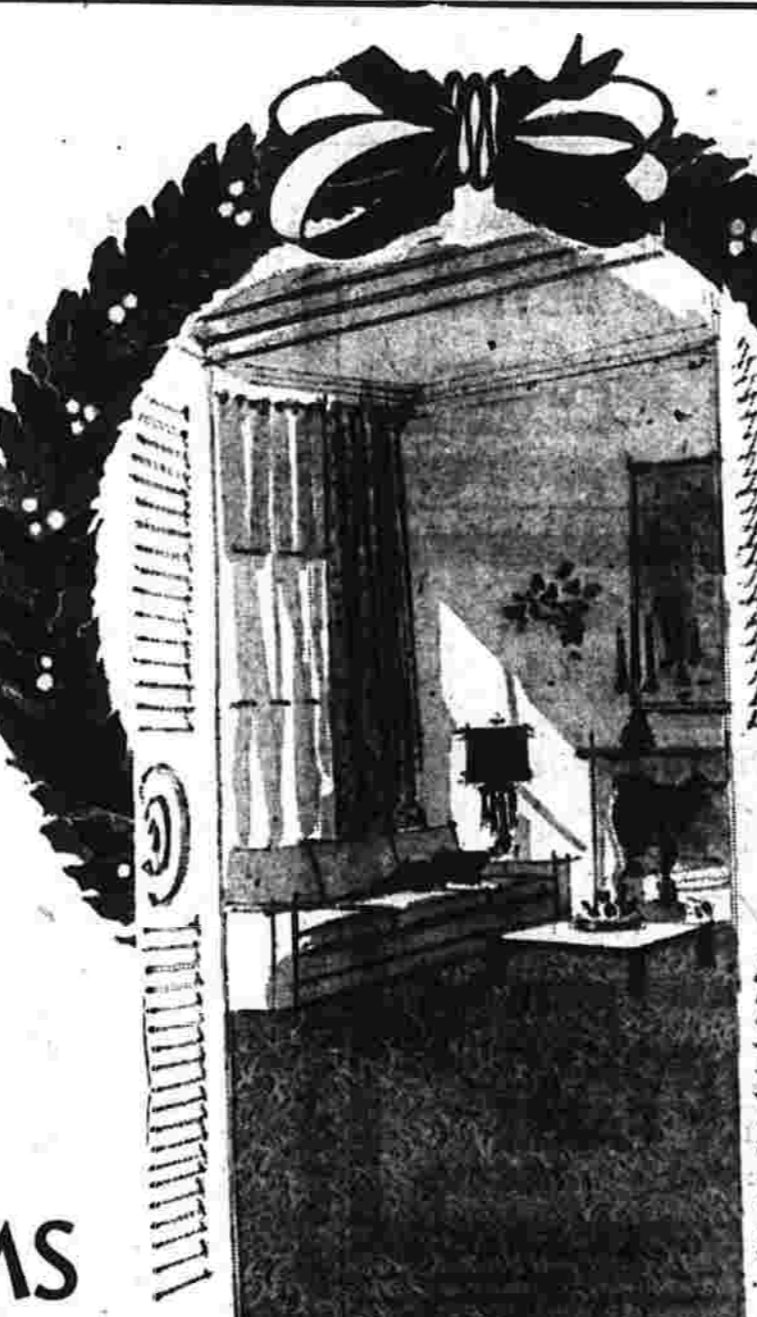

 "Must mesh, must go hand in hand."  
 John Kameron of New London said that his city had been able to cut welfare costs by thorough and frequent checks, the establishment of an employment bureau and other steps.  
 Harry O. Page, New York state deputy welfare commissioner, said the public has not lost confidence in the objective of welfare but had become critical of how it's being administered.  
 Fire Selectman Elbert H. Curtis, head of the Connecticut Association of Local Public Welfare Administrators recommended:  
 1. That local welfare administrators "be consulted on all policies emanating from the welfare department" when they affect municipalities.  
 2. Elimination of all duplication of payments and overlapping of functions between the local and state welfare departments.  
 3. Close cooperation between assistance workers and local welfare administrators before a public award is granted . . . and closer supervision of the family while the award is in effect.  
 4. Uniformity of residence requirements in all categories of public assistance.  
 5. Uniform administration of all welfare programs on a local level with financing by grants in aid from the state to the town.  
 Most of the welfare administrators present are members of the Connecticut Association of Local Public Welfare Administrators.

**Pioneering Spirit Seen Vital Force in U. S. Industries**

The group of Dutch visitors representing management, labor and engineering in The Netherlands rayon and cotton spinning and weaving industry, whose six-week study trip in this country included an inspection tour of Cheney Brothers on Nov. 26, believes that the pioneering spirit is still a vital force in American industry, and probably its most important feature.  
 This was the conclusion expressed in a report of the Dutch team's observations and findings that was presented by the Economic Cooperation Administration which sponsored the trip through its productivity and technical assistance program.  
 The purpose of the trip was to allow the Dutch team to observe the policies and methods of the American rayon and cotton industry which produce an output per man about 30 per cent higher than that of the Dutch industry.  
 But what they saw in the mills of New England and the South and their observations drawn from discussions with industrialists, engineers, labor union officials and workers went far beyond the rayon and cotton industry, the report stated.  
 Vigorous Country  
 The impression they have taken back to the Netherlands is of a young and vigorous country whose people "are not set in their ways," said the leader of the team, John Panhuysen, managing director of the Central Bureau of the Textile and Cotton Industry.  
 "All of us were impressed by this fact," the report quoted him as saying. "For we Europeans are rather set in our ways and it's hard for us to change our habits."  
 This spirit, the visitors felt, went hand in hand with the "unusually" attitude of American and industry leaders in particular. "I found that workers in the mills had a high opinion of their work and were still working the problem," they too, is refreshing.  
 Theory in Europe  
 The Dutch group were also impressed with the observation that America was a country where men made men, while in Europe there was a tendency to be less practical and more theoretical. In this vein Panhuysen said that Americans seem to be full grown much earlier in life.
