

### Bleak Holiday Facing Families Hit by Fire

#### Sellers Lose New Four-Room Home and All Belongings; Rowe Boy Suffers Serious Burns

Rocheville, Dec. 15 (Special)—A bleak Christmas is in prospect for a Manchester family split up because of the housing shortage and for a family of former Manchester residents whose Vernon home burned down at 2:15 a. m. Sunday.

Gray Rowe, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Rowe who live in a boarding house at 21 Elm street, is in Manchester Memorial Hospital today suffering from third degree burns about the hands and face received when fire destroyed the Sellers home, where he was staying for the night.

The boy's aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Rowe, 1000 Main street, lost their new four room home on Tenth road in Vernon when fire broke out in the fire which swept the structure before flames could be checked.

Collections of clothing, money and furniture have been started for the Sellers.

Hospital authorities described the youngster's condition as "unimproved" this morning after a good night last night. His mother also reported that he seemed to be resting comfortably last night.

Family split

The four children in the Rowe family, ranging in ages from 6 to 11, have been split up among friends and relatives because the family is unable to find permanent quarters. Gary was visiting with his cousin, Eugene Sellers, 9, at the time of the fire.

Members of the Vernon Fire Department report the fire was out of control when they arrived on the scene at about 2:15 a. m. Sunday. Firemen laid hoses to a ground about a half mile away and worked nearby houses to prevent spread of the flames.

According to Stanley Olander, captain of Vernon Fire Company 2, "The house was a mass of flames—it was beyond saving. It sold homes on either side of the Sellers residence are about 60 feet away. Fire fighting was made extremely difficult by the near zero weather and by the occasional gusts of wind." Olander said.

Origin of the fire was not determined, he added.

Companies 1, 2, and 3 responded to the call.

Arrested by Smoke

Mr. Sellers was awakened by smoke and flames about 2 a. m. He broke windows to let himself, his wife, and his son, Eugene, 9, out of the house.

While the blaze raged through a window to get the Rowe boy who had apparently become excited and run into the flaming kitchen.

The Sellers were given some clothing by a neighbor, Mrs. Anne Greenwood, and taken to the local hospital by another neighbor, Miss Virginia Jones. The Rowe boy was admitted and Mr. Sellers was released after treatment for treatment for treatment.

Loss Over \$10,000

Mr. Sellers estimates the loss at more than \$10,000 today. Besides the home, which the family was still completing, they lost all clothing and possessions and a sum of money. Mr. Sellers said they carried fire insurance.

The family is now staying with Mrs. Sellers' father, John Galliano, 111 1/2 Main street.

**The Mud Does Appeal**  
**Did we say, the other day, that this might be a different kind of presidential campaign because no one would be able to throw mud at General Eisenhower?**

We did. But we reasoned without the mud. We were reassured by the Hearst columnists who are fiercely determined that this year's election will be a "Christmas party" for the American people. That shall be removed by one means or another.

So far, from their writings, we have gleaned inferences to the effect that Eisenhower is a dirty Communist, to the effect that there is something wrong with his family, and to the effect that he is merely a Communist or a Communist dupe masquerading in American uniform. We gather that he is not even much of a general. Also, we have been informed that if he tries to run for the Republican nomination, General Douglas MacArthur will be very much displeased, and will have something to say about that.

**Amazingly, Life Goes On**  
**We are, this Monday morning, very much surprised to find community life going on pretty much as usual.**

That is because we had been under the impression, beginning about last Friday noon, that life-halting developments were on the way. We got that impression from a confession, from listening to the radio, which then began prophesying that all of us would soon be staggering under "winter's first great blow," and which, after a mild and somewhat insignificant snow had indeed fallen during the night, resumed Saturday with ringing declarations that "winter's first great blow" had fallen, with a "paralyzing" snow soon to be followed by a "great cold wave."

**Another Cicero Grand Jury**  
**We are forever uncertain how far we would carry government policing of a thing like racial intolerance. Assuming that it is our national goal to wipe out such intolerance, there always remains the swiftest and best route, promise to bring us to that goal by the swiftest and best method, and there is no really swift method. Ideally, we think, progress is to be made in a blending of teaching in human hearts with the symbolic establishment of standards in the law. Neither method perhaps, can do the job alone. And an exaggerated or over-emphasized use of law alone may retard the very cause the law is supposed to serve.**

We indulge in such remarks because Cicero, the Chicago suburb, is in the news again, this time with a federal grand jury acting on the racial riots which occurred there last July when a Negro tried to be the first of his race to move into the community.

The federal grand jury has, in the first place, done a job which is, creditably, the reverse of that done by the Cook County grand jury which was the first to sit and report on these events in Cicero. That first grand jury, in an act of defiance of the issues involved, returned indictments not against those who rioted against the coming of the Negro tenant, but against those who tried to help him. The Cook County grand jury held that it was those who had been on the side of the riotous social prejudices who had committed the crime.

The federal grand jury has, at least, stayed on the right side of the issue. Its indictments have been returned against those who encouraged and incited and participated in the riots in question, and not against those who suffered from the riots. This grand jury, at least, is against racial prejudice, and not for it, as was its predecessor.

it sets the record straight, and wipes out what was certainly a gross distortion of justice in the work of the first grand jury.

It is on the question of what happens next that we find ourselves uncertain. Those indicted will face trial, with penalties, if they are convicted, ranging up to \$1,000 fine and a year in jail. Such punishment, if it matures, will be a little like punishing Americans of stone-age mentality for suddenly waking up in a modern, progressive world. We are not forgetting the fact that these stone-age Americans out in Cicero committed a grave and brutal injustice. But we are looking toward their education and mental and spiritual growth rather than toward any vindictive satisfaction in their punishment. We have a vague idea that the forces of tolerance ought to be tolerant of those who do not yet understand what American democracy really is. We would be quite satisfied if this particular case went no farther.


