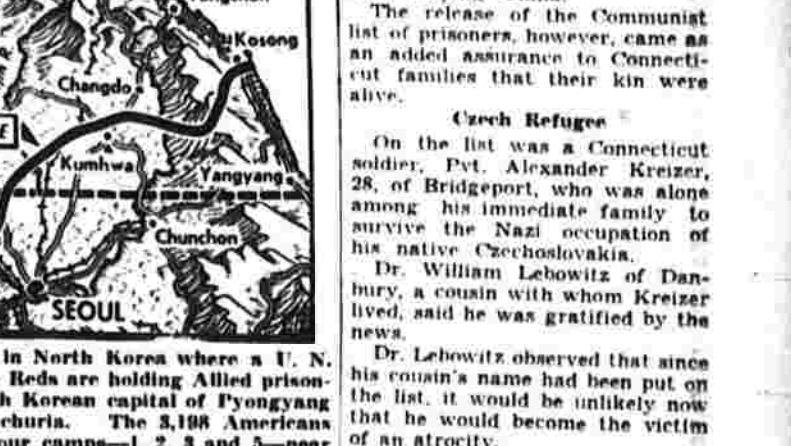

Town Highway Crews Plow as Others Sleep

Snow Storm Brings in to Operation Coordinated and Efficient Road Clearing System

When the first real snow storm hit Manchester last Friday evening, most of an adept, smoothly coordinated road clearing system was in operation. The town's highway crew, which has been in operation since the late 1940s, was called into action. The crew, which consists of about 50 men and 25 trucks, was in operation by 10 p.m. and was clearing the main streets of the town. While we stumbled, spoiled walking their boots "took a squalling" now and then and when the snow was about three inches deep, police headquarters notified James H. Sheehey, superintendent of highways and town engineer, now doubling as general manager. Sheehey in his turn phoned Fred Lewis, the assistant superintendent.

Call Crew Referring to lists posted by telephone at their homes, the two then called key men in the Manchester Highway Department. By the time the lists had been arranged, the first ones began arriving at the department's garage on Harrison street.

Some went to work with plow, "fat out" the entire force while others began attaching plows to the trucks. When the drivers and helpers arrived, the trucks were ready to start out on their appointed routes.

Ready to Go Weeks ago the engineering department had divided Manchester into 14 routes and had prepared a note book to be placed in the cab of each truck. Into the notebook they had placed maps of the area to be plowed, lists of the streets in the order they were cleared and report blanks which drivers filled out at the end of the long day.

Their trucks loaded with five cubic yards of sand for ballast and for use later on, drivers and operators started out about 3 a. m. Saturday morning.

Driver and Pilot In each truck, one man drove and a second directed at intersections and acted as a pilot through difficult places—and then worked plenty Saturday morning. Districts which look no more and well-defined to most of the time, resemble a vast plane of white in the early morning when the snow is still tumbling down.

Drivers rely on their intimate knowledge of the town and on landmarks available to determine where the intersections are. On rare occasions they misjudge a bit and damage someone's lawn as they round a corner. Usually, however, the plow blade merely hits the curb and a springing prevents it from breaking. When that happens the driver backs away and tries again.

Four Passes As always, the men plowed each street four times. First they plowed the right and then the left side. On a second four of the route, they widened on the right and again on the left. They did the widening operation in second and third passes. When the snow piled up in hopeless mounds on the walks.

And as always residents showed out their drives after the first time around. When the plow passed by the second time, the empty spaces along the curbs were filled up. Drivers hasten to explain that this is a natural result and not malice on their part. As the plow proceeds, the snow moves along in front of it, edging out toward the right because of the shape of the blade. When the snow finds an empty space it gradually dumps itself into it.

Sand Comes Next When they finished widening the streets, the department began spreading sand. Two adapted line spreaders mounted on Chevrolet chassis do the job. The spreaders have a slotted bin which looks like a corn crib. It holds 2½ cubic yards of sand which covers about a mile of slippery street.

Endless Chain with Ladder-like rungs carries the sand slowly toward the rear of the bin. From there it falls onto a rapidly revolving horizontal disk and is flung by centrifugal force to either side. When the vehicle is moving at high speed—25 miles an hour—the sand can cover an area as much as 50 feet wide.

Tied 500 Tons The spreaders ate up the 500 tons of sand stored at the Harrison street garage before the day was over.

Tuba Player Loses Battle Charges AFL Union Forced Him to Lose Job With Orchestra

Washington, Dec. 19.—An angry tuba player yesterday laid out a case for justice, charging that the AFL-CIO union forced him out of his job with the Philadelphia Symphony orchestra.

The player, Clarence O. Karella, had won an earlier round before a National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) trial examiner, but the board itself tossed out the complaint.

In its ruling the board decided unanimously against mixing up an orchestra labor discord—just as it has steered clear in the past of

professional sports and vaudeville employment problems. Karella was a contented tuba artist in Chicago before he learned of a tuba vacancy under Eugene Ormandy's baton at Philadelphia. He applied and got the job. Records indicate Musicians' Local No. 77 in Philadelphia would have preferred seeing a local boy playing tuba on his home-town symphony.

At any rate, Karella was out, fired that is, after the 1948-49 season. He charged that his rights under the Taft-Hartley law were violated by union pressure to have him removed, and by the orchestra itself, for yielding to union strike threats.

ever fought within a half mile or so of the monument, women and children, besides a large quantity of provisions, was consumed.

There is a spot on a solid hillside surrounded by the great swamp that would make an admirable place for 4,000 or 5,000 Indians to live.

"It is a place well protected in line of war. It is large enough so Indians might have planted and sown their corn. Even today, 275 years later, it is so surrounded by swamp that it is almost unapproachable."

Wright and Andrews say they are convinced that history has erred in placing the monument where it now stands.

The only factor that led historians in selecting the present location as the great swamp fight scene, is that burned corn and provisions were dug up on the hill by John G. Clark, who owned the land.

"As far as can be found," said the publisher of the Western Sun, "there is no previous record of the fight having occurred there."

Not until today has the swamp area been accessible to permit inspection of the uplands and marshes. And now that there has been time to study the nature of the land, doubt on the exact location of the fort has been heightened.

No longer do people accept the fact that the fight occurred where the monument stands to perpetuate the ground.

"There are those who believe it very improbable the battle was fought on the hill," Wright says.

The bloody conflict lasted three hours, with no decided result. The commanding general was advised to set fire to the wigwams of which there were said to be 600 within the fort.

This was contrary to the advice of Captain Benjamin Church, Massachusetts, who insisted the battle be practically over. But the Indians, who were advised, and the English killed some of their own men.

The troops met such heavy fire they were forced to fall back and in the smoke and confusion the English killed some of their own men.

Most Connecticut Business Doing Better Than in 1950

"The program should be set up so that he could or would meet the people without screening, so that they could bring their problems directly to him and that he in person could explain to them his program and the reason for it.

"No one in this room has more personal loyalty for the state confidence in the governor than I. I have worked with him, under fire, in Washington and know whereof I speak. I have complete confidence that he himself can do this job better than anyone else can do it for him. I also know, speaking solemnly, that the sooner he starts on this type of program, the better for the state of Connecticut."

Now District Seely-Brown said that in his travels in eastern Connecticut he learned that many people have "complete disgust with the present administration in Washington."

Chinese Reds Hold Another Catholic Cleric

Hong Kong, Dec. 19 (AP)—Another American bishop has been arrested by Chinese Reds.

A spokesman for the Hong Kong Catholic Mission identified him as Bishop Philip Cote of Lawrence, Mass. The spokesman said eight Canadian Jesuit priests in Cote's mission at Suchow had been placed under house arrest.

At the same time, the spokesman added, Catholic missions on the Communist mainland have been instructed not to pay extortion money to the Reds.

The spokesman said Bishop Raymond A. Lane of New York, Superior General of the Maryknoll Mission, had written Hong Kong that to meet such extortion demands would only place priests in "daddy jeopardy" and that there was no assurance... pressure would be lifted or the men would be freed.

The police was affirmed here by the Apostolic Internuncio, Archbishop Anthony Riberi, and applied to all Catholic missions in Red China.

The spokesman also reported that Bishop Adolf Paschauer, 66, of Marlinburg, Miss., was severely beaten a second time Dec. 17.

Bishop Paschauer, who had been in Suchow since his arrest in December, was taken immediately to jail. The eight Canadian priests were placed under house arrest more than a month ago.

The spokesman said there suffered "previous bodily mal-treatment" when he refused to meet the Reds' bargaining price of \$3,850.

Bishop Cote was arrested while saying mass, the spokesman said. Two hundred Red soldiers surrounded the mission. The bishop and three Chinese priests were taken immediately to jail. The eight Canadian priests were placed under house arrest more than a month ago.

The spokesman said there were 1,800 Catholic missionaries still in Red China, including 500 Sisters. Ninety-eight are Americans.

Fatal Accident Driver Fined

LaTulip Also Given 90 Day Suspended Sentence in Court Today

On the recommendation of County Judge John E. G. Rotter, George J. LaTulip, 28, of 88 Hill street, guilty of negligent homicide today and fined \$200. LaTulip also received a 90-day suspension, execution suspended. He was arrested following an accident Nov. 1 at the intersection of Oak and Cottage streets in which Ernest Steinberg, 75, lost his life.

LaTulip has been out under \$2,000 bond since arrested on a technical charge of criminal negligence. The case was held Dec. 10. Attorney Philip Bayer represented LaTulip.

Coroner Schaefer recommended charging LaTulip with violation of Section 2415 of the General Statutes. In his brief on the case, Coroner Schaefer said he could not find LaTulip guilty of criminal negligence, but said LaTulip failed to have his car under proper control, failed to stop when the stop sign and his speed was greater than reasonable. He could find no evidence of intentional passing of the stop sign.

LaTulip was traveling south on Cottage street the day of the accident. He told police he did not see the stop sign. Continuing through the intersection, he struck the left side of Steinberg's car, which was going east on Oak street. The impact spun the Steinberg car around so that it was headed south on Cottage street. Steinberg was thrown from his moving vehicle and fatally injured.

The Steinberg car proceeded south on Cottage street and struck a parked car owned by Frank Devoto while LaTulip's car ran southeast on a lawn into the house at 67 Cottage street, smashing the front end. When handling down his decision, Judge Rotter said he didn't like to see anyone in jail during the holiday season and this was the only thing keeping LaTulip out of jail.

Will Prosecute. "Most people think a stop sign violation is a minor thing, but this is what happens in many cases," the judge said. "I am sure the accused has suffered since this unfortunate accident occurred. Nothing in this court does will restore the life of Steinberg or brighten the holiday season for the Steinberg family."

F-80 Inferior Charges Pilot

Wethersfield, Dec. 18 (AP)—A 26-year-old jet pilot from this town, who is presumed to have crashed in his F-80 jet airplane in a Korean hillside, said in his last letter to his mother that the plane was "inferior and no match for the MIG."

Richard E. Cronan, Jr., of 151 Church street, said, "We have inferior aircraft over here and not enough equipment for the pilots. The F-80 is no match for the MIG but our boys have the fighting spirit."

"If the MIGs come down," the pilot said, "the 80's turn into them and put up a real scrap. I'm on pins and needles waiting to get a crack at them—maybe it will be next week."

No Sign of Life. However, it was not to be. Two days later, on Dec. 12, Lt. Cronan's plane "was seen to crash, explode and turn over upon the impact with the side of a mountain. There was no sign of life or evidence that he parachuted."

The Air Force said in a telegram to the family. In the same letter, the pilot described to his family the pathetic scenes he had seen since his arrival in Korea early this month. "There is nothing left here," he said, "but people, many of them little orphans, along to that last scrap of life, living in cave sand huts."
