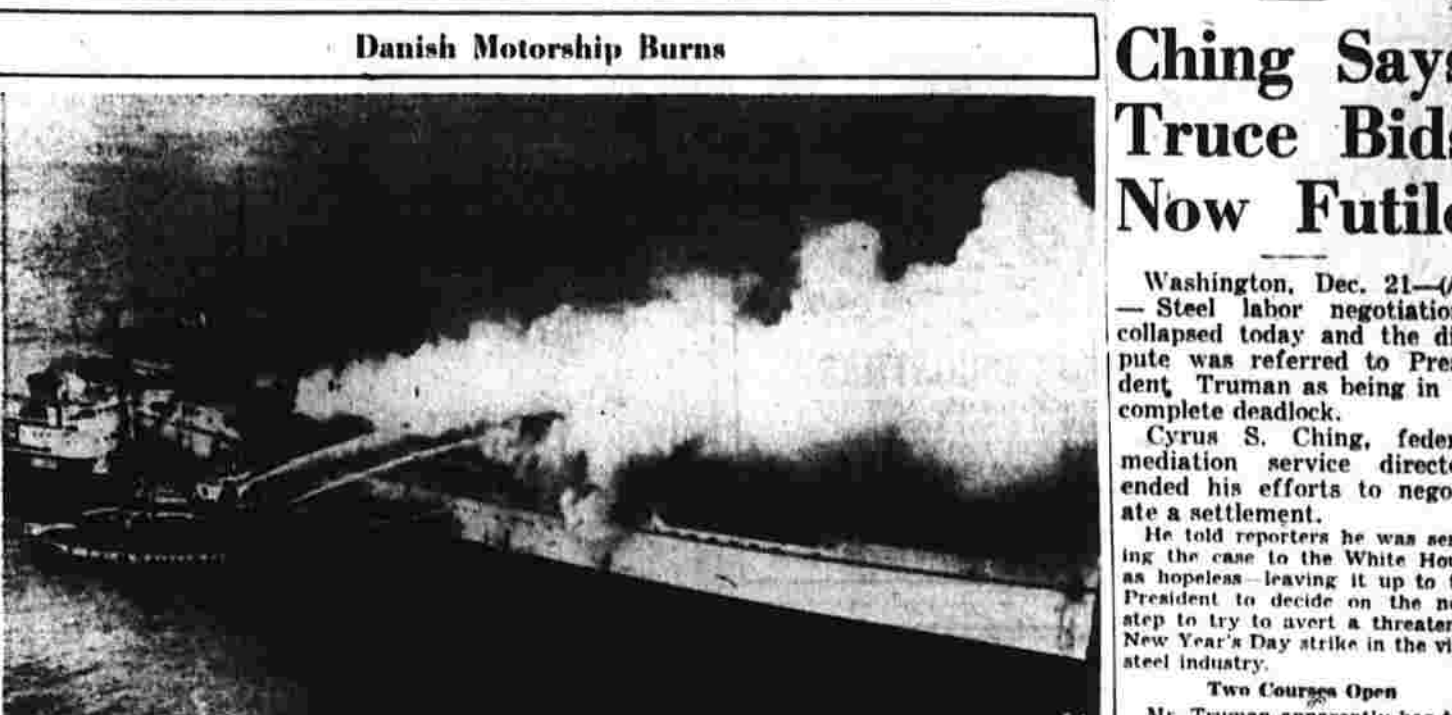

forth each celebration throughout the world.

Presented at Desk
Stalin was presumed to be spending his birthday at his desk, behind the thick walls of the Kremlin.
His health was described here as satisfactory for a man of his age.

(Observers outside the Soviet Union have noted his recent public appearances have been feeble, and that the Soviet press has been publishing old photos showing him in glowing health, instead of newer ones which might show him to be failing. He has been reported ill several times since the war, and scraps of information indicate his health is poor. He is said to puff at the slightest exertion. Medical circles indicate he may have some kind of heart disease.)

Since the war he has taken an annual autumn holiday in the warmish of southern Russia, usually returning by his birthday. No public announcement of a holiday has been made this year, but he is presumed to have taken his annual rest as usual.

The winners of this batch of Stalin prizes are mostly writers and professors, advocates of Communism.
Mrs. Felton, in her office was described by the prize committee as having done "great good" year job in the British Ministry of Town and Country planning after saving publicly the evidence of "atrocities" by American and British troops during a trip to North Korea. The committee said she was persecuted for honesty and saved from a treason trial only by public protests.

Nenni is a member of the Italian parliament. Dimitri Skobeltzin, chairman of the prize committee, described him as an implacable foe of imperialist aggressors who unhesitatingly takes action to fight against threats of war.

Kuo became a vice-minister of the Peiping Communist government in 1949. Skobeltzin called him one of the greatest writers in China and an active participant in the International Communist "peace" campaign. He was a leftist novelist and critic before entering the Peiping government and last February advocated a favorite Kremlin project. Perhaps if Santa Claus pressed his views 365 days a year, as Jesus did—be might, even in those enlightened days, risk a similar persecution.

Because We Want It
 The reason we have inflation is not because, as we so fondly think, of forces beyond our control. It is because "We All Want Inflation."
 That is the title of an article in the current Atlantic Monthly, and its author, John Harrison, financial columnist for the Boston Globe, makes a convincing argument for his title.

"The business executive, though he speaks dourly of the way things are going, cannot help feeling that he is actually in clover."
 "The worker today is equally content to see his money disappear in the inflationary spiral."
 "To the farmer, of course, inflation comes as pure delight. In effect it seems to make two dollars grow where only one grew before."
 "Even the housewife, the nation's primary consumer, has shown only a fragmentary inclination to revolt at the prices she encounters at her corner grocery or supermarket. . . . What the housewife does is to ask for a larger housekeeping allowance."
 These quotations indicate the contentment of various groups under inflation.

Of course, everybody talks about fighting inflation. But business wants to fight it by freezing prices but not prices of labor. Workers want to fight it by freezing prices but not wages, and each group "is anxious that inflation be checked, providing that others do the checking."
 Even the government itself, which pretends to be fighting so hard against inflation, is in love with the increased tax revenues which come as the result of our inflationary prosperity.

But, as the article points out, all this property, all this inflation of the dollar, is based on the most explosive and treacherous of foundations—our huge armament program.

Behind that artificial pump primer, behind the happy illusion of all groups that they will some day become the one group to escape with profit and avoid inflation, the real situation is a mental danger—the unpleasant facts which may some day have to be reckoned with—are growing stronger. If they find the opportunity to exert themselves more violently, dollars turn to mud, and our phony prosperity becomes impoverishment.

"No one, of course," says the article, "understands this tragic result of inflation better than do the Marxists. It is Lenin who said that the most effective way to destroy capitalism was by inflation of the currency, which is a process bringing ruin to the middle class."
 That is the eventual possibility which looms ahead. But it is all of us prefer to take our chances on the fast-multiplication of the dollar being in our own favor, if we grab fast enough to have inflation "because, very foolishly, we want it."

Disarmament — Next Phase
 The somewhat feeble Communist attempt at Paris to produce some faster, more direct action on the problem of disarmament than that involved in the Western schedule of operation on this issue may have represented all of three things. They may have represented a Russian strategy for a quicker toning down of the cold war, they may have represented a Russian propaganda emphasis, and they may have represented the smaller nations what it is that it might be possible to stampede them into a position where they would dispose of the Russian Plan together with the basis for UN consideration of the problem of international atomic energy.

Whatever the Russian object, it has been defeated, and the General Assembly has approved the Western schedule and method of proceeding with the disarmament problem, which is to establish one new commission to consider all types of disarmament, but on international basis, which remain the Bureau Plan as the basis for atomic discussions.

The West has already made some concessions from the main framework of the Bureau Plan, but it is still insisting that it shall remain as a framework, and something better and more satisfactory has been designed.

So the next phase of disarmament discussion is to begin with surface disagreement even over the method of procedure, and any one who senses that the big powers do not have their own hearts in disarmament anyway must feel some despair over proper procedure.

And yet—if the big power should come to mean disarmament, if they should decide to concentrate upon their shadowy agreements instead of upon their vivid disagreements—the actual situation would be far from hopeless. Even in those discussions at Paris, which ended in a new deadlock, the two sides made some approaches of the same grudging, reluctant, indirect nature which, as in Korea, seems to be emerging as typical of East-West negotiations. Should a greater willingness of spirit some day arise to capitalize on these relatively small changes, they would certainly be revealed as ground gained. Let us hope that, as the new discussions begin, the conferees will still feel that world pressure which has nudged them, to some degree, in the present Paris meeting.

Second Rate Fifth Column
 Pretending that we are not doing what we are doing is putting behind the propaganda eight ball with Russia again.

We are busy denying Vishinsky's charges at Paris, to the effect that we are engaged in the business of supporting anti-Communist elements inside the Iron Curtain. Delegate Jessup has said the charge is "an outrageous lie." Secretary of State Acheson says the same thing. The State Department terms the whole allegation "propaganda."

All this in face of the fact that Congress, in its latest appropriation bill for the mutual security, wrote in a special appropriation of \$100,000,000 for the express purpose of underwriting work inside the Iron Curtain.

So long as we continue to deny this obvious fact, we are going to delight Vishinsky, and he will continue to keep on talking and talking. For what he gets out of it is the rare privilege of catching American diplomats by a fit lie.

Later the board ordered a recheck of 565 other federal employees under the same rule. It also directed agency heads to take a new look at the records of 214 other employees who entered federal service after Oct. 1, 1947.
