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Escapes Injury in Fighting But Loses Eye Behind Lines

A trial of fate allowed Capt. William H. Spelman, 28, of 28 West Street, a translated Red Cross volunteer, to get through two months of Korean warfare without injury, only to cause him to lose an eye in a fight behind the lines.

Spelman, who has made his name with his two months in Manchester since his arrival in this country in April, 1950, and who was drafted into the Army 17 months later, landed in Korea in February, 1951. He moved with the 38th Infantry Division to a spot just across the 38th Parallel before a splinter of metal struck off a block by a fellow G. I. one of his eyes and sent him back to the States.

Had Luck

At the time of the accident, which occurred on Oct. 24, his unit, the 11th Combat Engineers, had moved across the Parallel to engage in North Korea, following participation in the fight for Bloody Ridge a couple of months earlier. He was helping in the construction of a well and was working part a bored soldier who was checking out tools and was busy hammering away at a block of metal.

At the wrong moment, a piece of the metal chipped off and struck Spelman's right eye.

He was taken immediately to a hospital in Tokyo, where the metal was removed. There was no

Chances of saving the eye, however, and it was removed after it had been shipped back to San Antonio, Texas.

Spelman now, on 30-day convalescent leave from San Antonio, the slender, sandy-haired Red Cross volunteer is being prepared for his return to the States. He is just one of those things, he said, speaking of the accident that cost him an eye after he had escaped injury in nine months of Korea.

Grateful for Aid

He was also very grateful for the aid and comfort given him throughout his tour of hospitals in Korea and Japan to this country by the Gray Ladies and the members of the Red Cross. "They would read to the boys and write letters for them, and just do anything they could to make them comfortable."

Spelman doesn't know just what the future holds for him, but he doesn't expect a discharge. He will be getting his plastic eye in about a month. "They're painting the veins on it now," and then he expects to be assigned either to a post or some part of a desk job.

For the Year of the Mood

The one we can wish every one a happy New Year, is the one that is comparatively at least, the wish we can be true.

The resilience of human character, of the trend of human events, of the power of individuals to live their lives and make their own decisions and govern the course of their own destinies, which has been weighted down by an atmosphere of imperious and uncontrollable fate.

It has psychologically speaking, been a year in which people have been dominated by events, in which the normal instincts and buoyancy of the human spirit have been clouded and blunted by the vague sense of a weight which would not be lifted.

The scenes which make up adequate living—the sense of freedom of choice, the sense of purpose, the sense of a reachable goal, the sense of clear guiding principles, the sense of power of influence and decision have all, during the past year, been at low ebb.

The outstanding character of the actual events in the year just past has been one which forced ordinary people into an attitude of confused waiting for developments seemingly far beyond their control and perhaps beyond their comprehension. For one thing, these events have been aimed toward the making of peace, and the making of peace is always, it seems, a more nerve-wracking and confused process than that of making war. Actually, perhaps, it has been a year of good news, fundamentally. But the good news has always been pending in such uncertainty and so far beyond the reach of any ordinary individual to grasp it and help it, that there has been more anxiety than joy in it. The two outstanding news events of the year—the recall of General MacArthur and the inauguration of true negotiations in Korea—produced a confusion and uncertainty and a tension which has often obscured the fact that it was good to have these things happening.

Under the impact of news and developments of such a character, the individual seemed to shrink into a passive powerlessness with regard to world events, which, in turn, robbed his own private living of its zest and spirit, until many of us felt more and more like automata playing out a pre-ordained role, which might be pointed out, but which we could do nothing to change.

And nothing positive happened to lift us out of such doldrums. If we turned from the oppressive weight of world events, what did we find to engage us? The foul hand of corruption upon sports, our favorite relaxation safety valve, and upon government, which is our management of our own affairs.

And yet, in the midst of so much oppression by large events, and disillusionment in smaller ones, one could feel the quest burning in many minds for a quest for a restored human grip upon fate, a quest for clearer principles to go by, a quest for values which would give buoyancy above such storms, a quest for reassertion of individual decision and dignity, based on principles which would not be clouded by mere events.

It is this quest which is going to come into larger view into greater fruition in the year ahead. The cycle of mood, the pendulum of the spirit, can bend in only one direction. We are going to begin to possess some mastery over our confused fate. We are going to be more like people and less like automata.

List New Prices For Cemeteries

A readjustment of prices for burial lots in the three town-owned cemeteries, which becomes effective tomorrow has resulted in price increases ranging from \$10 for a two-grave lot to \$250 for an eight-grave lot, according to a letter sent out to local undertakers by George W. Elliott, action of cemeteries. The price on a single grave lot, however, will drop from \$120 to \$75. Affected are the East, West, and Burialland cemeteries. According to the list of prices contained in the letter, which fixes the cost of the grave with the charge for perpetual care, a two-grave lot will cost \$150. Each additional grave in a lot will cost \$75, so that the price of an eight-grave lot will be \$600. The price of a two-grave lot in the past has been \$40, plus \$100 for perpetual care, and for an eight-grave lot, the price was \$80, plus \$25 for perpetual care. Service charges will also be affected by the new price list. The price for opening and closing an adult grave will be increased from \$30 to \$40; for opening and closing an infant grave, from \$8 to \$12; and for a burial on Sunday and holidays, from \$15 to \$25. Elliott said that adjustment, which is the first increase since 1945, was made necessary by the upward spiral of the costs incurred by the cemetery department.

Bank Seeking Stock Boost Trust Co. Asks \$50,000 Increase to Establish Branch at North End An increase in the capitalization of the stock of the Manchester Trust Company "to make available additional funds for the establishment of a branch" of the bank in the North End will be sought by the Trust company's Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the Trust company's stockholders to be held on Jan. 22.

In a letter being mailed to stockholders today, the directors have recommended that the authorized capital stock of the bank be increased from \$200,000 to \$250,000, with the additional shares of stock being issued at some future time.

The capitalization of the stock would result from a subscription of 2,000 shares of common stock of \$25 par value, pending approval of the increase by the state banking commissioner and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The last increase of the bank's capital stock occurred in February, 1948, when the capitalization was doubled from \$100,000 to \$200,000.
