"It is for you to judge," he said, "how much aid Britain should receive."

His implication, Churchill declared, was that Britain would be "a united European army," but the number of divisions and the strength of its arm and air force would depend on the aid it received.

"We in Britain," he added, "have not asked for an aid of \$100 million, but for an aid of \$1 billion."

He said he had learned through long experience not to mix in other people's political affairs but that Britain the people should develop a "bi-partisan habit of mind" by which they distinguish between the actions necessary to win political position and the actions necessary to the survival of the country.

He then paid tribute to the late Republican Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan, an exponent of "bipartisanship" in foreign affairs and declared that "all great governments should be organized for the things that matter most."

Urges Speed Control

Discussing the problems of the Middle East, Churchill proposed international control of the Suez Canal under the four-power auspices of Britain, France, Turkey and the United States.

With regard to the present situation, in which Egypt and Britain have come to an open clash, he said that he would be glad to negotiate the pact.
