### Propose 3 Plans to Ease Water Problem at Green

Three different plans are being proposed to ease the water problem at Green, which last summer suffered from a lack of water and poor pressure, with better service being suggested last night to the Board of Directors, which was sitting as the Water Commission to hear a report on the future expansion of the water department by Fred E. Threlkoff, assistant superintendent of that department.

Of these schemes, all of which were suggested to the town by Buck Bellet and Jost, Manchester's consulting engineer, the favored one was described as "working toward the overall picture."

The scheme calls for the construction of a pump house as designed for use later with the filter plant—a 20-inch line to the 10-inch pipe to the high point on town-owned property near the Rockledge development and a 200,000-gallon storage tank for excess drafts or fire use.

In this plan, the town would carry out this year would cost \$81,117, which would have to be financed. He said that the town had enough pipe on hand to do the job, but would have to order more for other work.

**Five-Year Plan**

Threlkoff also reported that proposed improvements to the distribution system which has been suggested by Buck, Bellet and Jost, would cost \$155,850, and recommended that such an improvement project should be undertaken as a five-year plan for 1952-56.

The Soviet Union does not particularly care if the leadership of the Czechoslovak Communist regime purges itself out of existence, so long as Moscow continues to hold the reins. And Moscow holds the reins today.

Gottwald has poor prospects of doing any better than those before him. Czechoslovakia's product is not going back into Czechoslovakia. The better part of it is going to Moscow—the heavy industrial production—to feed Moscow's hungry war machine.
