Voters Grant Added Funds

Sum of \$212,462 Voted for School Budget; \$110,070, Selection

South Coventry, Feb. 28 (Special)—The estimated expenditures of \$212,462 and requests for additional appropriations of \$110,070, recommended by the Board of Finance, were approved by voters at an adjourned annual town meeting and a special town meeting last night at the Church Community House in North Coventry.

Of the estimated expenditures of \$212,462, \$102,500 was voted to the school budget for 1951-52, and \$109,962 was voted to the town budget for the same year.

The \$110,070 additional appropriations voted at the special town meeting are for the highway fund, \$1,500; the bridge account, \$4,000; and the town aid road account, \$104,572.

Other actions taken at the adjourned meeting included authorizing the selection to enter into agreements on behalf of the town with the State Highway Commission for expenditures of funds available to the town for town aid roads, and for the improvement of dirt roads.

The selection were also authorized to turn back to the State a \$10,000 Congregational church's quit-claim interest of \$10,000 in the basement of each church.

At the special meeting the voters also accepted additional state aid grants on the George Hersey Robinson school project of \$110,000, payable in 24 annual installments of \$5,000 beginning April 1. About 70 voters attended the meeting. Arthur J. Vinton was moderator. Clearly for the meeting was Mrs. Walter F. Billings, town clerk.




