

Says Human Nature Holds Key to Peace

No Program for Peace Can Succeed Without Element of Charity, Editor Olmstead Says

"Any program of peace is more difficult than any question of actual policy because its solution lies in the depths of human nature," was the belief voiced by Alan W. Olmstead, editor of the Herald, as he gave three positive recommendations for peace yesterday in a talk sponsored by the Public Affairs Committee of the Manchester branch of the Hartford County YWCA, at the Community Center.

Mr. Olmstead's topic was "A Program for World Peace."

"None of the three policies can possibly succeed," he pointed out, "without a fourth ingredient which cannot be supplied by more statesmen or planners, but which must be supplied by people which we call charity."

He defined this ingredient as a charity consisting of many things: humility, understanding, compassion, love, the things we have in our hearts in order to make our good policies work.

At the beginning of his talk the editor stated that the moment in which we are living is a moment of tests, challenges and opportunities for which there are no true and adequate parallels in all previous history.

Citing the examples of Caesar at the Rubicon, Napoleon deciding whether or not to complete the unification of Europe by

The resolution of the poverty stricken people of the world for a better way of life, the Russian revolution which has temporarily fallen into the hands of dictators and the continuing revolution of America, the most radical of all revolutions, must be realized as part of the world picture today.

The three positive recommendations for a program of peace made by the speaker were, the strengthening of the United Nations, a more positive and stronger economic policy and finally, a more truthful approach in the realm of propaganda.

Speaking of the United Nations, Mr. Olmstead stated that "the world organization, in its long range goals, represents the logical result of man's intelligent analysis of the problem of his world. In its present structure, however, it represents man's inability to accomplish clearly that which he himself knows should be done. But it does hold, within its own possibilities, the only true political and military solutions for our problems."

These possibilities are that it will, some day, have the real power of a limited world government, which will possess its own direct control of the shipments of arms permitted in the world, and which will hold its authority by the consent of nation-states which are willing to be governed in all those matters in which war itself has hitherto been considered the only means of settling national disputes, even now, being acted upon by improvisation more than by the actual code of a world law, in Korea.

On whether the action in Korea is considered a war or a police action the speaker stated that in his opinion "the charging of world peace and life, in a political and military sense, is a matter of thought that rises, in this room, when the word Korea is mentioned. If we can learn to adjust our minds to the idea that we are living in a moment in which we think represent a crucial verdict on the course of history itself, if we can recognize the political and the moral reality, which is that this world will be what we are, we shall at least not be shirking our responsibilities through ignorance or unawareness of how great and decisive these responsibilities are."

In the field of economic policy Mr. Olmstead believes that some of the best business men of the Point 4 program should be reinstated and strengthened. These policies are those which demand nothing in return, except those benefiting from them are able to play their own positive part in the general enrichment of the world's resources and in the general interplay of all human beings.

Friendship, Not Bargain. The difficulty with the best of these economic programs is that they are not bargains. They are not deals. They are not the kind of progress to be represented by the program is an act of friendship rather than a bargain, a bold act of leadership in the revolution going on in the world today rather than a policy proposed to retrace present stability for cold war purposes.

In his third and last recommendation for a positive policy toward peace, the speaker stated that he meant by this not only official government information abroad but the whole business of meeting and representing themselves and their friends abroad that this country too is in a program of evolution and struggle and revolution.

Paul Painted Way. In conclusion Mr. Olmstead put the issue up to every individual by saying "What so much what we do, as what we are, that, in the final analysis, is what will determine the outcome of this phase of human history. There is no substitute, there is no plan, there is no policy, which can succeed unless it does entail and employ and represent the thinking and feeling of individuals."

"As we stand on the road to Damascus, awaiting that evolution of thinking and feeling which may enable us to deal with the climactic issues of all time, might note that Paul himself, in the famous passage on the quality he called charity, laid down the

Freedom of the Press Censorship of News Widespread in U. S.

(First of a Series)
By JAMES DEVLIN

New York, March 12.—You don't have to go to a dictator nation to find public officials shrouding their activities behind an Iron Curtain of censorship.

You can find the same thing here—perhaps in your home town. It is a censorship by closed meetings, buried records and "no comment"—rather than the direct "Don't print that" of the totalitarian countries.

But the effect is the same in providing a secret cloak for areas of government of the federal, state and local levels.

Some examples: Officials of one town knew for 15 years that the federal public health service had condemned its drinking water.

The newspapers didn't know. Neither did the people. A county employee handling public money stole marriage licenses. Fee County officials went into secret session, decided he wouldn't do it again and kept him on the job. The matter was kept quiet.

A burglar robbed a filling station and escaped—but residents of the community took no precautions to protect their homes. Police simply did not report the robbery because it would "interfere with our investigation."

These examples show that official secrecy is not a remote matter involving only high government circles, but something that can affect your health, your money and your protection.

High diplomats may meet in private, but so does many a state agency, local school board and town council.

The newspaper fight to smoke out tendencies toward censorship—except on matters involving national security—is commonly known as a battle for "Freedom of the Press." It is far more than that. It is a fight for freedom of information for every individual American.

People Lose: The James S. Pope, executive editor of the Louisville Courier Journal and Louisville Times and chairman of the American Society of Newspaper Editors' Committee on Freedom, put it this way: "When news is suppressed, all the newspapers lose—a story. But the people lose touch with and control of their government."

The right to know is denied more often than you might realize. The Associated Press conducted a nationwide survey of official suppression of news and what is being done about it.

It found instances of concealment, and determined newspaper rights against it from coast and from the Canadian border in the Gulf of Mexico.

Some of the newspaper exposures like the St. Louis Post-Dispatch revelation of public officials taking fees from private firms, attract wide attention.

Broad Picture: Many of the news blackouts and fights against them—are local. But added together they form a broad picture.

The survey showed: "There is some degree of news suppression at every governmental level, from Washington to the town."

2. The suppression almost always can be beaten when there is a determined challenge by spirited newspapers, especially when they are backed by the people.

The pattern is reflected in Wisconsin, where the Milwaukee Journal conducted a detailed study of official efforts to smother news.

Edwin R. Bayley, the Journal's state political editor, reported every city of more than 15,000 population and found that in most there are some governmental bodies which met behind "closed doors," hidden from press and public.

He found, too, that: "In some cities, reporters are denied access to police and sheriff's reports, and news of this kind is carefully filtered through the chief officer."

General Embarrassment: "Newspapers suspect, and sometimes are able to prove, that news of crime and accidents is concealed to conceal circumstances embarrassing to the department or to protect prominent persons or political friends from unfavorable publicity."

The water incident shows how a vigilant press can break through the secrecy veil.

A reporter for the Lacrosse, Wis., Tribune learned that railroad trains did not take on water at Lacrosse. He found that the United States Public Health Service had reported it had a high bacterial count.

The Journal, reviewing the incident, said: "The reporter also found that the first report on the poor condition of the water had been filed 10 years before and repeated every year since. The former city engineer and some members of the city council had known about it, but never made it public."

"The ensuing clamor led to chlorination of the city's water," Bayley reported that "there is no more, and probably less, secrecy in government in Wisconsin than in other states."

National Situation: Instances of suppression can be found in the North and South, East and West.

In North Carolina, editors found that in some local courts judgments were changed after regular court hours, warrants were withheld from public scrutiny and prominent citizens were allowed to enter pleas without public appearance.

In California, Jack Cramer, managing editor of the Independent at San Rafael and chairman of an Editors' Freedom of Information committee, said "attempts at censorship and other restraints on free dissemination of public information are constantly recurring."

The Providence, R. I., Journal and the Evening Bulletin fought a successful court battle, carried to the United States Supreme Court, to open to public inspection the tax abatement records of the City of Pawtucket.

The papers took the attitude that "everybody who pays a tax is entitled to know whether someone else has been shaved off the tax list."

It was not contented the abatements were illegal—only that they were a matter of public record. But no abatements were granted after the court action was begun.

Local school boards have a particular penchant for meeting in private.

This situation was recognized by the American Association of School Administrators, which declared Feb. 21 that such meetings should be conducted openly.

It said efforts at secrecy "can boomerang with devastating results" and suggested the most sensible thing to do was to make certain the newspaper "gets the facts fast and gets them straight."

The Biddeford, Me. Journal reported the local Board of Education holds "public" meetings, but boomerangs with devastating results.

Grab Contests Ike Recall Move Stirs Senate Row

... against the resident's policies. The vote-broke all New Hampshire primary records. It was stirred, in part, by the personal campaigning of three candidates, Taft, Kefauver and Harold Stassen, who received 500,000 votes in the "popularity contest" and expressed himself as well satisfied.

The campaign leaders conceded defeat shortly after 3 a. m. (last) P. M. Johnson, secretary of the State's Bob Taft Club, declared "New Hampshire Republicans have expressed their desire in the preferential primary."

Johnson added, "As Republican, we shall support the nominee elected at the Republican caucus."

Truman's political leaders in the state could not be reached for a statement and up to a late hour they had issued no comment.

5,000 For Stassen

In the Republican primary, Harold E. Stassen, ex-governor of Minnesota, had approximately 5,000 votes out of the nearly complete ballot count. Stassen was elected only in the preferential ballot; he had no delegates in the caucus.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur was given approximately 2,500 Republican write-in votes. None of the persons who ran as delegates favorable to him was elected. MacArthur had requested his name to be entered in the "popularity" primary.

Stassen names appeared as write-ins on the Democratic ballot—half of them Republicans. New Hampshire Democrats cast more than 100 votes each for Eisenhower and MacArthur, adding with a smattering for John Foster Dulles, Taft, Stassen, Gov. Earl Warren of California, Sen. Hiram Bingham of New Hampshire and William R. Schneider, St. Louis attorney.

Democrats receiving write-in votes included ex-Postmaster General James A. Farley, Governor Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, Sen. Paul Douglas of Illinois, Vice President Barkley and Sen. Russell B. Long of Louisiana.

Some observers considered it significant that Paul Hoffman, former administrator of RCA, was the first to issue a victory statement for Eisenhower. It came at a time when the general was trailing Taft by a few hundred votes.

May Replace Sen. Lodge

There have been recurring reports that Hoffman might be asked to take command of the national Eisenhower campaign. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts is now national chairman.

Lodge, however, argued some of the New Hampshire incidents in the Eisenhower camp during the campaign. They did not put themselves to be replaced, but privately they sharply criticized Lodge's statement to a news conference that the preferential ballot in this election "would prevent nothing."

The senator said that the only lead voters would be the election of delegates.

The preferential results were an astonishing triumph for Eisenhower. But before the election, some of his state supporters had Lodge's remark would be of great help to the Taft campaign.

The preferential ballot is not binding on delegates to the national convention. It was considered supremely important, however, as a direct gauge of Eisenhower's popularity with the rank and file voters, and also as a barometer of Taft's ability to win votes.

The most repeated argument by Taft's foes was "He can't win. Taft entered the state in the closing stages of the campaign, returned, 'I have always won' and then staged a whitewash campaign for three days that some observers thought might be enough to give him the victory."

Eisenhower made no political statements at any time.

Taft Ahead for Time

For several hours last night, Taft was out in front of Eisenhower, holding a slim percentage lead. His delegates were running strongly, and it appeared that at least four of them might win. Then returns came in from Manchester, the state's biggest city and a highly industrialized section. Taft carried the city over Eisenhower by almost 2,000 votes.

Since Eisenhower's greatest strength was believed to be concentrated in the cities, Taft's chances appeared infinitely strong.

The lead changed hands an hour or so later when Eisenhower carried Concord, the capital by an even larger margin. He took the lead at that point, and steadily drew away from the Olson, until his popular total reached proportions beyond the fondest hopes of his backers.

Kefauver, on the contrary, was out in front of Truman practically from the first.

Even among neutral observers, Kefauver was a conspicuous underdog before the election. He had conducted a leisurely, almost laud campaign, shaking hands and simply sitting around, talking with farmers and especially workmen.

Democratic Marked Hunt

But the politically experienced, while conceding that he had made "quite a few friends," said the Democratic machine in the state would be turned out to smother him in the popular vote and swamp his delegates vote of whom he is well known in the state.

Emmet J. Kelley, Democratic National Committee member, said Kefauver would never make a dent in New Hampshire.

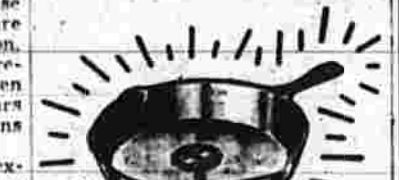
