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Bars Delay At Trial of Ex-Convict

Hartford, March 14.—(AP)—A request by paralyzed ex-convict Frank Wojewicz for a temporary adjournment of his first day in court trial, on the grounds that he was in too great pain to continue, was rejected today by Superior Court Judge William J. Shea.

Shea's decision was delayed for an hour and one-half until Judge Albert S. Hill and Public Defender James D. Cogrove consulted about the situation and a physician examined the accused.

Dr. Raymond F. Lowry, resident surgeon at McCook Memorial Hospital, was then called to the witness stand by the committee. He testified that Wojewicz had been in the room at the hospital this morning and later in the room at the Hartford institution from New Britain General Hospital several weeks ago.

"I find that his condition is such that he can continue with the case," said Dr. Lowry. "It is a fact that he is in great pain. He is unable to receive medication. Everything that can be done to make his discomfort as slight as possible."

Dr. Lowry said further, in an answer to another question, that the medication he had given Wojewicz would sometimes be in pain and sometimes not in pain.

Wojewicz, who observed his 25th birthday Monday, was paroled by the warden when a police bullet cut through his spine at New Britain on the night of Nov. 3 in which he was shot by voluntary reprobate and hand-picked by the warden and his other top level delegates on the trial subcommittee.

The committee of negotiators working on parole supervision for Wojewicz is over two months long session yet.

Col. Andrew J. Kinney said the committee has a "very high opinion" of the parolee's character and that he is a "good man."

"Nonetheless, Kinney said, 'we now have a clear circle drawn around the things that might be allowed.'

Kinney said the committee approved the parolee's application on the scope of a case handling parolee's parole supervision.

The Reds indicated they would approve insertion of "Korea" in the clause. This would allow UN forces to enter Korea at any time along the 38th parallel or in Formosa waters.

In return, Kinney said, the Allies would drop demands that each side report the location of all military and air bases and to concentrate its armies to pose a threat to the other side.

Second Tax Agent Refuses to Testify

Washington, March 14.—(AP)—An Internal Revenue agent from New York City refused to tell House investigators today whether he ever accepted a bribe or whether his sworn statement regarding the case of a defunct company was true.

It was the second agent in two days to turn back questions of House Ways and Means subcommittee on the grounds his answers would tend to incriminate or degrade himself.

Today's reluctant witness was Charles Vance, 41, who submitted his resignation Feb. 13 as non-deputy chief of the New York City office of the Internal Revenue Service.

After half an hour's unproductive questioning, the committee headed by Rep. King (D., Calif.), decided to stand down and take a brief recess.

Vance, who was accompanied by an attorney, Robert Mitchell, had the same reply to all the pointed questions by the committee as to his case. It was: "I refuse to stand down and take a brief recess."
