The Doctor Says

Several Causes Can Contribute to Sterility in Both Sexes

"I have been married a year and a half" writes Mrs. M. "I cannot seem to have a baby. One doctor has told me I have a cyst on my left ovary, and another has said I have an operation. No one knows exactly how many married couples there are who are unable to have children but are unable to have them. Judging from what I know, I think the subject, however, there must be hundreds of thousands of involuntarily barren marriages.

Until comparatively recently, the inability to have children was always blamed on the wife. It is now known that the husband is actually responsible in a high proportion of cases.

Many possible causes for sterility exist in both men and women. Structural defects in the male are Mrs. B's case, disturbances in the menstrual or internal secretion (hormones) and absent or abnormal sperm or eggs are among the possibilities.

In many cases, the difficulty, regardless of whether it is in the husband or in the wife, can be discovered and rectified, either by medical or surgical means.

In women, for example, the Rubin test which is used to discover whether the passageways by which the sperm enter the womb are open, has been of great help in diagnosing sterility caused by obstruction of the tubes.

Sterility May Be Reversed

In addition to the more definite causes for sterility in men and women, it is now known that in many cases the inability to have children is a temporary and merely caused by some minor ailment.

A slight anemia, a vitamin deficiency, severe underweight or overweight, or other signs of being below par may be at fault. In such things are corrected, fertility may be restored in some cases and the desired child may soon be on the way.

Considerable skill and experience is necessary to properly evaluate the possibilities for sterility. Both husband and wife must be investigated if there is a real desire to find the solution.

It cannot always be found, but in an increasing number of cases the results are quite outstanding. The successful outcome to problems of this kind has meant happiness to many discouraged couples.

A UN Command spokesman said he demanded that Pyongyang be designated Communist ports of entry and agreed to substitute Sinanju. The Red refused to do so.

The Red's refusal to do so, the Communist spokesman said, was "a deliberate attempt to delay the armistice talks."

Both sides will send detailed maps Friday showing areas around each port they want opened to UN inspection teams.

The staff officers agreed Thursday that either side could provide air transportation for neutral inspectors from Panmunjom to any part of entry.

Official spokesmen at this UN truce headquarters declined to comment on reports from New York, Fla. that President Truman may seek reelection if a "permanently peace" for Korea is agreed on soon.

"Officially it was pointed out that the current negotiations can end only in a temporary armistice and a permanent peace must be negotiated later by the nations involved."

Communist spokesmen hinted Wednesday that an armistice might be reached by mid-April, correspondents here have reported. Red correspondents have reflected official Communist opinion, but Allied negotiators were skeptical.

Promote Flynn To Master Sgt. With the Eighth Army in Korea—Edwin N. Flynn of Manchester, Conn., has been promoted to master sergeant, the top enlisted grade in Korea. He is a personnel expert with the U. S. Korean Military Advisory Group.

Flynn's wife, Marie, and three daughters, live at 8 Drive E, Manchester.

The sergeant served throughout World War II and returned to the Army in 1945. He was previously assigned to the Connecticut Military District.
