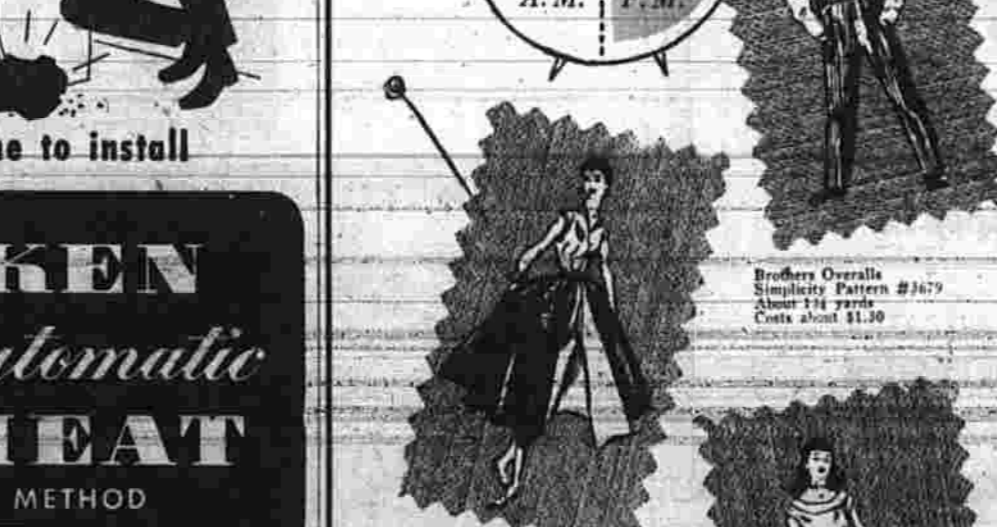

Adenauer To The Germans

Chancellor Adenauer of Western Germany, whom Secretary of State Acheson relies upon to bring Western Germany into a European unity which would leave Germany itself divided, and which is himself seemingly anxious to carry out that same policy, felt his position to be somewhat precarious last week, and what did he say?

He said that Germany can have only one goal—its own unity. He said this unity would have to be achieved by talks between Russia and the three other occupying powers. He urged the Western powers to be more specific in their demand of unity for Russia than they have been in their past answers, which have tried to reject Russian offers without actually accepting responsibility for doing so.

Then Chancellor Adenauer defended his own policy for integration of Western Germany with the West. But the significant point is that of how he defended it. He defended it as a policy which does not interrupt nor interfere with the other policy he recommended—that of the Western Powers conferring with Russia for the unity of Germany.

And how did he seek to prove to his fellow Germans that it would not interrupt or forbid the effort for German unity? By arguing that, even after the agreement to enter the Western European army had been signed, there would have to be ratifications of this agreement by Germany itself, and by the other powers involved. These ratifications, he said, would take time. During this time before the actual ratification of the policy he proposes to follow there could, he said, be new offers from Russia, and agreement with Russia.

But, by such an argument, Chancellor Adenauer made an inferential admission which is quite likely to lose him his whole case, as the Germans think it over. For his admission was that, after such ratification had taken place, after that last chance had come and gone, there would then be no further opportunity for the unification of Germany, the thing which he said, at the beginning of his speech, was Germany's number one need.

Adenauer's final defense of his own policy, then, seems down to this: that there was a 100% more time than most Germans realized, maybe a few months more time, before the time for the irrevocable decision for the permanent partition of Germany would be taken.

No Adenauer's speech can be roughly summarized as follows: Germany's number one policy must be German unity. Its number two policy must be that of taking one half of Germany into a Western alliance, leaving the other half under Russian domination. But Germans should not worry about the fact that policy number two would mean that policy number one is impossible. They should not worry because, although it would do for just that, it wouldn't do it for a few months yet.

Chancellor Adenauer is obviously battling as hard as any German could battle to stick to Acheson's policy. Perhaps he may still be able to pull it through. But, in the realm of logic, his very defense of his policy confirms its basic weakness. And it will be strange if he himself, in the end, does not shrink from those steps which will place the problems of Germany, and the problems of the whole world, beyond the possibility of peaceful solution.

Massachusetts Tomorrow

Over the weekend, two more states originally considered safe for Senator Taft broke over and headed into the camp of General Eisenhower.

These were the states of Colorado and Georgia.

In Colorado, the Eisenhower forces, obtaining a swift buildup of their own strength, took 15 of the state's 18 delegates, with two pledged to Taft, and one uncommitted.

Senator Taft's campaign manager said, not long ago, that Taft to take any less than 12 of the state's delegates would constitute a serious defeat for him. That defeat has now obviously taken place.

In Georgia, Eisenhower has taken 10 delegates to one for Taft. In both instances, Taft lost delegates which had once been counted upon to constitute part of the first ballot strength at Chicago.

This, it should be pointed out, is the kind of loss which must soon, in the eyes of professional observers, collapse the Taft candidacy, unless he soon accomplishes the feat of picking up elsewhere strength that had not originally been calculated for him. He cannot afford the loss of old strength unless he picks up new strength. And that is something he has not succeeded in doing, anywhere, to date.

The next chance to do this comes in Massachusetts tomorrow, where he and Eisenhower will engage in a write-in contest in the state's preferential primary.

No one can, of course, predict the result in Massachusetts, but Senator Taft himself has made a candid admission of his own chances during his tour of the state last week when, once again, he was greeted by good crowds. Senator Taft said he was encouraged by the turnout, but that, at the same time, he was wary of "enthusiastic support" because of his experience with them elsewhere. It has indeed been a typical experience for Taft that his own supporters are very enthusiastic and good at turning out to greet him, but that their enthusiasm does not spread very far beyond their own ranks.

In every test between the two leading candidates so far, it has been Eisenhower who has had the broader appeal, even though the rallies staged by his supporters have obtained smaller crowds.

This circumstance, "our" in some measure, we think, to the opposing character of the two campaigns. Taft's slashing attack of just about everything is a vigorous appeal to the most elemental partisan emotions. The more positive and balanced approach of the Eisenhower campaign, as it stems from the philosophy and personality of Eisenhower himself, obtains less surface enthusiasm, but more serious conviction among rank and file Americans.
