We, The Satellites Skirted Tyrant Rules Over Romania

Communist bosses ride high in Romania, but they never know what is just around the corner. Here as in the other nations captured by the Red hordes—two things—the people and the Kremlin. Romania has U. S. possessions, but many of the things that go on there can be learned by reading the news and checking the stories of travelers, editors and diplomats. LONDON NEWS—As the sirens shriek, traffic and pedestrians scatter. A sleek green American car approaches to a halt opposite the State Bank building on Bucharest's Kiseleff street. Three men, dressed in military uniforms, get out of the car, crammed with bodyguards, pull up behind the green 1950 Oldsmobile as a guard opens the door. Grim and unsmiling, the hammer-headed first lady of Romanian Communism steps out and walks rapidly into the building. Through a battalion of security militia and police agents, she does not even notice the stiff salute of her personal security chief. Ana Pauker, for all her new titles—her four cars, her lavish villa, her legion of personal bodyguards and attendants—seems worried. Normally, the foreign minister, she has just managed to get rid of a few high Communist who may have been her mortal enemies in high places—but how many more are there? How much longer will she last in the place of power she has held since the Russians obligingly evicted the monarchy?

The Rumanians have been watching her. Even the defense minister, Gen. Emil Bodnareu, a Ukrainian by whom she had considered her ally—how long would he remain her friend if she should lose the confidence of Moscow? And there are rumors It was a close episode with Vasile Luca, the finance minister, but a threat for her. Even Bodnareu has feared her. For Ana it was fortunate Luca's recent currency reform caused so much chaos in the country. It was her ally, she and Bodnareu had him fired as finance minister and Vice Premier. They put in a less ambitious man, Dimitrie Petrescu, former President of the state public commission. Petrescu, coming from the management division of the Workers (Communist) party, is himself manageable.

Luca, at 54, had felt he was going places. A leading Communist since 1918, veteran of many fights, he had been a confidante of George Dimitroff. The present boss of the party. It took some doing to get rid of him. Luca had been secretary-general of the National Democratic Front in 1945, and had a big role in making the government's anti-Communist motto to bow to Soviet military demands. That was even before Soviet Moscow's Andrei Y. Vishinsky stormed and raged at young King Mihai and forced him from the throne. Destroyed Opposition Luca soon became secretary of the Central committee and showed his mettle by destroying the anti-Communist opposition. He took part in the Cominform meeting that drove Yugoslav Communists out of the Balkan family. He helped and passed party leaders to prison.

But as finance minister, Luca ran into trouble in January of this year. He decreed that old lei notes be exchanged at rates ranging all the way up to 400 old lei one new, on a sliding scale. At the same time prices were reduced. The result was a hummer. Before currency reform, the average Romanian worker earned 6,000-7,000 lei a month. Prices before currency reform were like that: a man's suit, rationed, up to \$275 lei, or up to 19,000 on the free market; rationed shoes for women up to 4,800 and a little higher for men; rationed sugar, 56 lei a kilo and 200 on the free market; jam 240 a kilo, and so forth. There were no wage increases with currency reform, but prices were reduced at 20 to 25 per cent. Bread, beer, and footwear for adults went down to 10 per cent. The result was a rude jolt for the workers. There was a humming movement of indignation. Luca was fired, but the workers still were badly exploited. The currency reform evidently had been dictated by the Moscow Communist government. Each Romanian ministry has a Soviet "counselor" who has more power than the minister himself. Major problems of government are submitted to Moscow. The Russians also direct the army. The Soviet parade step has been introduced by special Soviet inspectors. Soldiers find the peculiar step difficult. Soviet officers boss the Romanian army, but consider it unreliable. They have taken over the nation's youth, too. The Young Workers Union (UTM) is a mass organization of the Communist to control youth. Only UTM members can hope for higher education. Romanian children at 14 are considered ready for manual labor. If a child is of "bourgeois" origin, he likely will be sent into manual

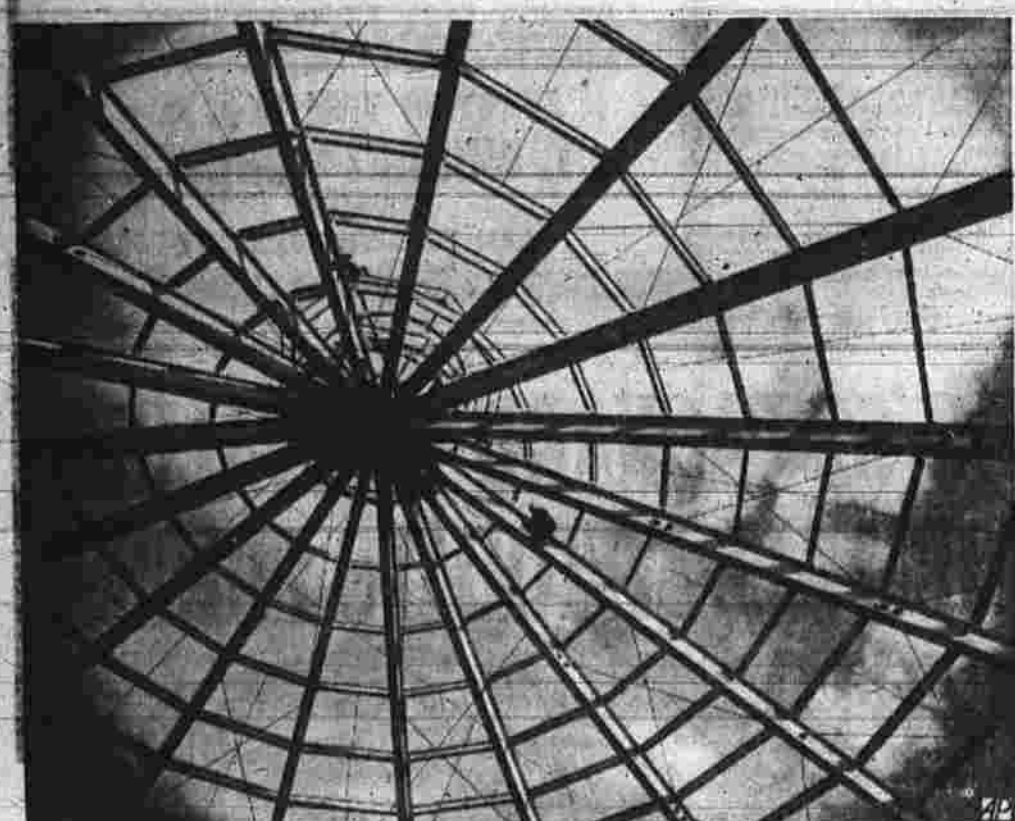

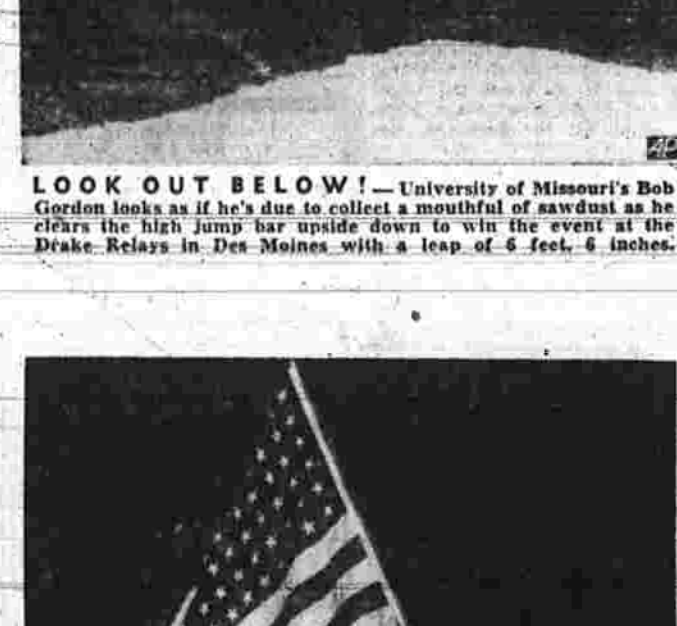

The Doctor Says

The name for the disease called leukemia, was originally proposed by the famous German pathologist, Virchow, more than 100 years ago. Translated it means "white blood." Of course, the blood does not turn completely white in leukemia, but there is a "whiteness" about it which is caused by the destruction of many normal red cells and their replacement by colored cells, known as white cells or leukocytes.

Leukemia is really a condition in which the white cells have grown wild. Not only are there more white cells than there should be in leukemia, but also there are abnormal forms and kinds.

Under normal conditions there are between 5,000 to 10,000 white cells in a cubic millimeter of blood (a cubic millimeter, incidentally, is an extremely small quantity). In leukemia, the number of white cells normal and abnormal rises to 20,000, 40,000 and sometimes as high as 100,000 or more in a cubic millimeter.

There are several kinds of leukemia named according to the type of cell which is predominant and whether the condition is acute or chronic. Regardless of the type, however, the "cells" of leukemia are not known, although many theories have been suggested.

In the rapid or acute case of leukemia, the body is overwhelmed with these abnormal leukocytes. The patient weakens rapidly. Bleeding may take place from the gums or into the skin, and the latter is usually pale and slightly yellowish looking.

In the slower or chronic case, enlargement of the lymph glands in the arm pits, groin, or neck may be the first sign of the disease. The spleen also is usually enlarged, increasing in size to about the size of a "soft-boiled egg."

No Foreseeable Sign The person who discovers a cure for leukemia should be highly honored. As things are today, however, a cure for the disease is not immediately in sight.

These who are afflicted with leukemia, especially the chronic varieties, can be helped temporarily in many cases by blood transfusion, by X-rays over the spleen or by certain kinds of arsenic preparations taken by mouth. Radioactive phosphorus, methane, nitrogen mustard, ACTH and cortisone, and many other substances have been tried and may have a place in some cases. However, up to the present, no reliable method of cure has become available.

Mrs. Bollinger advised the members and friends who filled the banquet hall of the Y to have a pattern in mind when beginning an arrangement, the said it makes a difference whether the flowers are to be used as a small table centerpiece, a mantel decoration, in a small hall space, or between windows. In the latter case a vertical arrangement is best and she proceeded to do one using an artistic Chinese container in green and white, in which she placed upright branches of "Little Devil" white spirea, a variety of red-purple lilac and white jonquils for the focal point. She placed the arrangement on a Chinese mat in the color of the lilacs and at the side a white Chinese figure. She advocated placing almost any arrangement on a standard of some kind, whether of teakwood or driftwood, with a harmonizing or contrasting figure in pottery or metal at the side.

Swing Is Very Simple Claims Jackie Burke

The swing is very simple. The club is taken straight back from the ball in the backswing.

It is brought back straight through the ball in the downswing. That's all there is to it, and don't let anyone tell you differently.

Many good golfers know what they will play well the instant they pick up a club. The feel of the club tells them.

If the hands are sensitive enough to feel a good shot, it must be that the hands and forearms are the most important factors.

If the hands and forearms are properly coordinated, the shoulders, hips and pivot will follow naturally.

Those obtaining an early start, especially as caddies, usually fall naturally into a simple, correct swing. Like the player, so do the other players who play in their extreme youth have a decided advantage over late starters.

Adopt a comfortable and relaxed stance. Take the club straight back from the ball and bring it back to the ball in the same smooth arc.

Just think about making the shot as well as you can. Don't try to do anything more. A good swing will take care of the results you want so forget the results while making the swing.

That makes the simplest, most mechanically sound swing you can hope for. And remember—no swing, no chance.

Swing Is Very Simple Claims Jackie Burke

The swing is very simple. The club is taken straight back from the ball in the backswing.

It is brought back straight through the ball in the downswing. That's all there is to it, and don't let anyone tell you differently.

Many good golfers know what they will play well the instant they pick up a club. The feel of the club tells them.

If the hands are sensitive enough to feel a good shot, it must be that the hands and forearms are the most important factors.

If the hands and forearms are properly coordinated, the shoulders, hips and pivot will follow naturally.

Those obtaining an early start, especially as caddies, usually fall naturally into a simple, correct swing. Like the player, so do the other players who play in their extreme youth have a decided advantage over late starters.

Adopt a comfortable and relaxed stance. Take the club straight back from the ball and bring it back to the ball in the same smooth arc.

Just think about making the shot as well as you can. Don't try to do anything more. A good swing will take care of the results you want so forget the results while making the swing.

That makes the simplest, most mechanically sound swing you can hope for. And remember—no swing, no chance.
