

Defeated Democrats May Contest Results

Members of the group of insurgent Democrats who were defeated at the party caucus Monday night in their attempt to gain control of the town committee, will probably try to challenge the results of that hotly contested caucus. The announcement followed the withdrawal of charges of "irregularities" in the caucus by the members of the victorious organization. It is still a matter of conjecture whether the group will attempt to challenge the results of the caucus. The group, which includes the claim that one of the members of the victorious organization is still a registered Democrat.

Director Katherine Bourne, a member of the defeated slate, which was headed by Town Council member John D. LaBelle, said this morning there were "irregularities" in the caucus. She said she had been elected as a result of which her group will probably challenge the validity of the caucus result. Although she would not elaborate on what these "irregularities" were, she said she had been elected on the organization slate as a registered Democrat and will carry as a Republican on the party's last caucus, which is held April 1, 1952. She stated that there were a number of other persons who voted illegally in the caucus.

A complete statement of charges, she said, which would present her group's position, is being prepared and would be released tomorrow.

Her charges, in a new bill, brought a quick rebuttal from Attorney Wesley C. Gray, who led the organization's forces at the caucus and who last night was elected chairman of the town committee, and from the alleged registered Republican member of the Democratic Town committee.

Both Gray, who labeled the insurgents leveling the charges "poor sports" and the charges themselves "unsubstantiated," and Adams said that Adams had abandoned the Republicans for the Democrats in 1950 and that this was being carried on the voting rolls as a Democrat was not his fault.

Corporal Taft and the other graduates will go back to their units to train other men in water safety and combat swimming. Besides learning the necessary swimming and life-saving skills of civilian life, servicemen must learn how to swim under combat conditions. This involves such aspects as swimming across a river under fire, fully dressed, wearing a helmet and wearing a life preserver, and carrying a rifle out of the water so as not to get it wet.

The Water Safety Instruction program is conducted by American Red Cross Auxiliary units. Cpl. Taft is a graduate of the Rockville High School. The Red Cross instructors at Camp Crawford were John Kraft, 4501 Arlington avenue, Riverside, Calif., and Wm. Porto, 4150 West, 40, Cleveland, Ohio.

Captain Taft received his basic training at Fort Dix, N. J., and also at the Infantry Leadership School. On Oct. 15, 1951, he left the west coast for North Korea, heading at a camp near Seoul. He was transferred from the 7th Cavalry Regiment, and later was sent from Korea to Camp Crawford, Japan.

Administration's Conduct Will Supply Key, Bush Tells Republicans

President Bush, candidate for the Republican nomination for the U. S. Senate in opposition to the incumbent Sen. William Benton, told the members of the Manchester Women's Republican Club their luncheon meeting at the Country Club yesterday that the administration's conduct in the field of foreign policy, taxation and inflation and administration of the nation's affairs gave the Republican party the "trump card" in the coming election.

Mr. Bush said that he had been very interested in the remarks of John Foster Dulles, who said that a Republican victory would not bring to an end a bipartisan foreign policy, because such a policy, instituted by the 80th Congress under Republican control, had been destroyed by the Truman administration. Bush said that he believed that it was vital that the next Congress reconstitute such a policy.

The second major point upon which Bush expressed his views was the field of taxation and inflation. He said that the Republican party is in a position to hold our promises that the inflationary trend can be stopped and that immediate steps can be taken to lower taxation. Furthermore, he said, the Republican party is in a position to have a definite position on the average voter who goes to the polls thinking of what his vote will mean to him and to his family. The Republicans can win with the "people's" book instead.

In the field of administration Mr. Bush expressed the firm opinion that the only way that a thorough cleaning up of the corrupt methods now being revealed can be accomplished is by the election of a completely new administration which will wipe the slate clean. This issue was attacked by a great deal of effort in their campaign.

The prospective senatorial nominees were introduced to the audience by Mrs. Natalie McIninch. Also seated at the head table was Mrs. Frances Burke Redick, former secretary of state for Connecticut. The luncheon was conducted in connection with the annual meeting of the Manchester group and a meeting of the Hartford County Board of Republican Women, to which the local group was host.

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House Favors Aid for Spain

Washington, May 22—(AP)—The House today rejected a measure to deny military and economic aid to Spain and to cut deeper into economic help for Austria.

Amendments to these bills were beaten by top-heavy votes as the House drove for a final vote late today on the administration's already-nattered \$7,900,000 foreign aid bill.

Rep. Gross (R-Iowa) proposed that the \$7.9 million be cut to \$5.9 million and the floor vote was 183 to 118.

The vote marked an initial victory for supporters of the House. It was the first time since the outbreak of the Spanish civil war that the House has voted to deny aid to Spain.

Washington, May 22—(AP)—Joseph W. Weinberg, a scientist who helped develop the atomic bomb, was indicted today on charges he lied when he denied under oath to a Congressional committee that he had been a member of the Communist party.

Weinberg is a man who was long described only as 'Scientist X' by the House in a series of investigations during the years of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Based on testimony by other witnesses, the committee concluded that Weinberg had perjured himself in his testimony before the committee in 1948.
