



Economy Balance Seen Necessary to Security

J. M. ROBERTS, JR.
Associated Press News Analyst

Maintenance of a balanced economy in the United States is now recognized as just as essential to the national security as development of military strength.

Conduct of the cold war, then, cannot be solely a matter of military purposes only. Nor is it to be seen as a mere struggle to out-produce the other side in the production of steel, planes, ships, and other material goods, a partial operation for the sake of time might seriously endanger the health of an industry, those full vigor must be maintained in the face of world trends.

President Truman's emergency message to Congress mentioned the need for a balanced economy in the present situation, which is the supreme test of our ability to maintain peace and might not work any way.

The President's contention that the economy must have a rate of growth as high as any comparable with the industry's production that increased costs must be covered by increased prices.

The basis of compromise is contained in his proposition, however, with a suggestion that compensation for the industry be considered by a board to be set up under the Economic Stabilization program.

This cost-price business line at the very root of the whole dispute, despite the fact that negotiations between management and labor revolved around union security and wages.

And this ties right back into the question of a balanced economy. The government has been struggling for years against inflation. For the moment, the economy seems to be resting on a narrow level ground. On the one side is the pressure of deflation and possible depression. On the other, the rising tide of continued inflation leading to money collapse and chaos.

Government is extremely afraid of what any important increase in steel prices will do in such a situation.

Postpone School Bond Action After Critics Assail 'Waste'

Cost Factor Again Sparks Opposition; Board Will Resume Discussion Friday

The Board of Directors postponed action on the \$1,750,000 school-building bond issue last night after the proposal was assailed at length as "extravagant" and "wasteful" by its critics in a public hearing in the Bowers School auditorium.

Director Walter T. Mahoney and state Rep. Sherwood G. Ewers also attacked what they considered the high cost of the program. Both charged poor planning had been demonstrated in the new schools already built and said the plan for the proposed program should be more carefully studied.

Walter H. Hibbard of 300 North Main street, another opponent of the proposal, said it was the responsibility of the Board of Directors to examine the costs involved wisely and to cut them down. He also said he was against schools, but that he wanted a sound, economical program.

Little Opposed. But the opponents of the program still thought that the price of the school project proposed by too high. Walter Little, a former member of the school building committee, angrily labeled the program as "the most extravagant, the most costly, and the most wasteful" any school building program in the state.

He said it represented an "utter disregard for economy" and referred to the new school in Vernon, which, he said, was built at one-third the cost of the proposed school.

Along with the 18-room Vernon school, which was completed two years ago, was taxed to capacity and the library and two arts and crafts rooms have been present.




